AUTUMN STAMPEX COMPETITIONS

The national competitions, organised by the ABPS, are expected to take place at Autumn Stampex from 30th September to 3rd October at the Business Design Centre, Islington. The competitions will feature all the usual exhibition FIP/ FEPA classes as well as the Cinderella and Ephemera classes. Exhibitors can submit from one to five frames (of 16 sheets each) or eight frames if they have achieved a Large Vermeil at a previous national exhibition. Full details of the rules and the process for sending in your entries can be found in the Exhibiting section of the ABPS website www.abps.org.uk

Also taking place at Autumn Stampex will be the Inter-Federation Competition. A regional Federation can enter a team of three people, each providing a display of one or two frames (16 sheets per frame), one of each must be a thematic, open philately or picture post cards entry. Only one exhibitor per team shall have achieved a higher award than Large Vermeil at any national or international exhibition. At least one exhibitor per team must not have entered a national exhibition before, and each such exhibitor will gain an extra five points. The Inter-Federation Competition Trophy will be awarded to the Federation achieving the highest aggregate of the marks scored in the three classes. Full details can be found on the ABPS website. Simon Richards, Chairman of the ABPS Exhibitions Committee, commented "The InterFed rules are designed to get the novice to exhibiting going and are weighted to achieve that. We hope this new initiative will encourage new people to take the step of showing their collections in national events."

A Good Suggestion

These difficult times have highlighted a problem which has already developed for some societies and could easily affect many more in the future, not just as a result of Covid-19. This was highlighted by Giles du Boulay of Germany & Colonies PS. Personally I am very grateful to Giles for this.

Philatelic societies in normal times should have resilience plans in order to cover rapidly changing circumstances such as the incapacity or death of a highly organised official. Many already have developed this but now, at this hugely difficult time, societies who have not done so should address this with some urgency. Where a key officer lives alone or in a household where no else has access to their computer, or even has no knowledge of how to use it, there need to be some concise instructions for someone in the family explaining who to contact in the society in the event of their death, and how to identify and forward vital files to those who need them.

One suggestion is that all key officers of a society produce information on the workings of their specific role(s) which are posted to a central 'cloud' for others on the Committee to access. Others are known passwords to a generic email address eg sec.anytownps@gmail.com, and multiple account signatories.

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

I think he might have had thoughts of doing something along these lines. If you would like to access any of these videos, Google search – "Graham Winters ABPS Youtube". I have a few more planned as an ABPS contribution to the hobby while we are not able to meet as usual.

In the meantime, if you have any ideas about what the ABPS could do for you or your society in these difficult times, please let us know. Remember, stay safe, stay at home and follow the Government guidelines. Too many of us are in the "at risk" group because of our age! Let me know if you like the videos.

Society anniversaries, 2020

According to the date of foundation shown in the societies' information on our records, significant anniversaries include those shown below (though several societies have not let us know their foundation date, so there may be more).

Heartiest congratulations to all involved in these milestones:

30 Years - The Revenue Society

The Revenue Society was formed in 1990 and now has over 400 members from all corners of the globe. Founded to promote the research and display of revenue stamps and associated documents, we also publish *The Revenue Journal* every quarter and hold regular meetings in London as well as at national and international philatelic exhibitions.

The founding members included philatelic doyens of the highest calibre who also had enthusiasm and collecting interests in the subject of revenues. These members included Robson Lowe (who was the first President), Ron Butler, Gary Ryan, John Whiteside, Brian Lucas and Clive Akerman. In 1990 we started in our endeavours to raise the interest and popularity of revenue collecting, such as had existed nearly a century earlier. In the days before WWI huge numbers of revenue stamps were issued, as was shown in the Forbin revenue catalogue, and revenue collecting was almost as popular as traditional philately. However, with the outbreak of the Great War, interest in revenues fell into a decline which lasted really until the 1950s.

Slowly the 'Revenue Awakening' began to take hold, led by the USA and many of the larger European countries. Robson Lowe was instrumental in taking a leading position in revenue commercial philately, especially through his Bournemouth Auctions and his keen American interests. Ron Butler succeeded Robson Lowe as President of the Revenue Society, and he was succeeded in turn by Gary Ryan. Gary worked tirelessly to have Revenues recognised by FIP by having their own Commission.

During the past three decades revenue collectors have exhibited at all FIP internationals worldwide. As yet we have not won a Grand Prix, but Revenues have been nominated for a Grand Prix and have achieved runner-up status on two occasions.

The End of an Era -

The Invalid & Lone Collectors' Society Closes.

The society was the brainchild of Leonard Gibbons. He realised that a lot of people had been invalided after the 1st World War and thought stamp collecting would be a hobby they could enjoy which would also give them contact with people in similar circumstances. It also applied to people who lived in small places who didn't have contact with other collectors. In 1921 he set up the group within the Junior Philatelic Society. To join you had to be a member of the JPS. The JPS became the National Philatelic Society.

Contact was by means of a circulating magazine, the articles being provided by the members. Members were encouraged to contact other members. There was no subscription to the group but members had to post on the magazine and had to be JPS members. It proved very popular and went from strength to strength.

There were a number of rules, one being that any articles must be the work of the author with his name stated and any other work referenced must also be stated. Queries, philatelic experiences, useful hints and favourite countries were also perfectly acceptable. All members were expected to contribute something each month.

All members seeing the packet had one vote as to what they considered the best article in that magazine and that article was then submitted to "The Stamp Lover" - the magazine of the JPS - for publication.

Round about 1990 one of our members attended the National Congress and asked if we could be affiliated to the ABPS explaining that we had limited funds. We were made honorary members, which pleased us all very much.

I joined the society in 1972 when I was a lone collector. We were no longer part of the JPS. In the early 1980s our editor and secretary, Den Wells, who had been trying to get someone to replace him for a while, said he was going to wind up the society if no one was found. I became editor and a secretary was found. I also became treasurer in 1987 when no one else volunteered. In 1996 Harold Mason took over as editor and ten years later I became secretary. Due in part to my work for the ILCS I was awarded the Congress Medal in 2016.

Now we are down to 12 members with very few contributors to the magazine so with the 900th edition of the magazine in January this year we reluctantly decided to call it a day. We were 99 years old.

The Federation of European Philatelic Associations (FEPA)

Many readers of ABPS News, especially those who have exhibited internationally, will have heard of the International Philatelic Federation (FIP), the organisation based in Singapore that regulates philately around the world. Are you also aware though that there is a European Federation that brings together the national organisations in 44 countries to promote philately? I received the somewhat unexpected honour of being elected its President at a Congress last November and, when I communicated this to your editor, he suggested that you might like to know a bit more about what FEPA does.

Some brief background. FEPA was founded in 1989, largely on British initiative. Its first President was **Dr Alan Huggins**. Its members are the national

federations of almost all European countries as well as Israel and Egypt. The UK is represented by the ABPS. FEPA's aims are to promote philately, to support the national Federations and to represent a European viewpoint where necessary, working in cooperation with the FIP. We do this in several ways such as running a website and producing a magazine (FEPA News) twice yearly to communicate news and best practice to our members; giving patronage and recognition to European exhibitions; and presenting honours and awards to individuals and societies for outstanding achievements.

FEPA is run by a board of seven, all in different countries, that reports to the members at an annual Congress. While this may all sound a bit remote from the individual collector, we are well aware that our purpose is to promote philately for the benefit of collectors, existing and new. The benefits are felt at different levels. Members appreciate the international support FEPA can give them in their activities as I remember well from my experience of organising LONDON 2015, which had FEPA Patronage. Clubs are also very grateful for the recognition they receive for their work.

The ABPS has always been a strong supporter of FEPA, not least in proposing candidates for awards, and I am pleased to say that this year the medal for exceptional service has been awarded to **Chris King**. Certificates of Appreciation were also awarded to the Stamp Active network for its work in promoting Youth Philately, and to the late **Edward Klempka** for his book on *Foreign Military Activity in the Russian Civil War 1917-1923*. These awards fairly reflect the high international standing in which philately in the UK is held and I am grateful to **Yvonne Wheatley** for ensuring that candidates from the UK are nominated for recognition each year.

The Roll of Distinguished Philatelists The new 2020 signatories

An invitation to sign the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists is the highest and most prestigious honour in philately, which recognises achievement, research, publication and service in many areas of philately. The Roll was instituted in Harrogate in May 1921 and the signature of His Majesty King George V appears at its head as the first signatory. In its design, it contains the names of 42 so-called "Fathers of Philately", names of great philatelists who would have been invited to sign had they been alive at the time. At the first ceremony in Harrogate the signatures of the initial 39 names were added to the Roll.

This year's signing ceremony, on the occasion of the 100th anniversary of the establishment of the Roll, was to take place on Monday 4th May 2020 at The Royal Philatelic Society London, 15 Abchurch Lane, London EC4N 7BW during the London 2020 international philatelic exhibition. It is now hoped to be in October. The new signatories join 81 other current RDPs from 24 countries spread over six continents. At the annual meeting of the Board of Election of the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists on 5th March 2020 it was unanimously agreed that the following five philatelists be invited to sign the Roll:

Dr John H Barwis RDP from United States of America John Barwis brings together the study of science and philately. He was a founder member and is current president of the Institute for Analytical Philately and has led the organisation of the three international symposia on analytical methods in philately. John has formed several important collections. In particular, his early Victoria (Australia) gained many high awards at exhibition and his study of these stamps formed the basis for his large gold medal book *The Half-Lengths of Victoria: The*



Stamps and Postal History, 1850-59. His other award-winning collections include the three cent Continental postage stamp of 1873-79, China's Large Dragon issues and aspects of Philadelphia postal history from Colonial times to UPU.

A leader in organised philately, John has been President and Chairman of the US Philatelic Classics Society and a member of the long range planning committee of the American Philatelic Society. He was awarded the Luff Award for Distinguished Philatelic Research in 2017 by the American Philatelic Society and, in January 2020, the Collectors Club Lichtenstein Award.

James L Grimwood-Taylor RDP FRPSL from United Kingdom

Generally accepted as one of the most knowledgeable individuals on the subject of pre-20th century British postal history, James has been active in philately from a young age and has held a number of senior positions, including as president of the Great Britain Philatelic Society and president of the Society of Postal Historians. He has collected a wide range of subjects, including the British postal reforms led by Rowland Hill, postal history of the British offshore islands, the postal history of Derbyshire, and New South Wales overseas mails, receiving many high awards at exhibition. His recent research into postal reforms across the globe up



to 1850 covers every continent and is the subject of a major book *International Postal Reforms to 1850* to be published by The Royal Philatelic Society London later this year.

James has always given freely of his knowledge both to researchers and to other collectors and he is author of hundreds of articles in numerous journals. His displays to hundreds of societies around the globe are notable for their erudition, originality and humour.

Michael M Y Ho RDP FRPSL from Chinese Taipei

Michael Ho has been active in Taiwanese and Asian philately for many years. He was an executive member of FIAP (Federation of Inter-Asian Philately) since the mid-1990s, including being secretary-general from 2005 to 2009, and today remains an honorary member. He has been a jury member at many international exhibitions and was FIP co-ordinator for the Bandung 2017 World Stamp Exhibition. He has also participated on the expert teams at several exhibitions.

Michael has formed several significant collections, with his collection of China's Small Dragon issues winning the Grand Prix International in Bangkok 2003 and the

Grand Prix d'Honneur in St Petersburg 2007, and his book China: The Small



Dragon awarded a large gold medal and special prize in Bandung 2017. Others of his collections, including the postal stationery of Nicaragua, the American Bank Note issues of Bolivia, and the postal stationery of Honduras, received high awards at exhibition.

Yamil H Kouri Jr RDP FRPSL from United States of America



Yamil Kouri is involved in many areas of philately, both in the United States and internationally. He has been the USA commissioner at a number of international exhibitions and is an accredited FIP juror in postal history. He is a board member of the Spellman Museum of Stamps and Postal History and was vice-president of the American Philatelic Society from 2013 to 2016. As vice-president of Boston 2020 World Stamp Show, he is significantly involved in delivering this major, once in a decade, exhibition.

His collecting interests focus on the stamps and postal history of Cuba and he is author of several monographs.

His book *Under Three Flags; The Postal History of the Spanish-Cuban/ American War (1895-1898)* received the literature grand award at StampShow in 2019. Initially forming award-winning collections of postal history, his traditional collection of the first postal issues of the Spanish Antilles received the Champion of Champions Award at StampShow 2019.

Charles J. G. Verge RDP FRPSL from Canada



Arguably the leading philatelist in Canada, with a worldwide reputation as an author, exhibitor and FIP judge, Charles Verge has been involved in large numbers of philatelic events in Canada and worldwide. Today he is leading the organisation and presentation of the FIP Jury Academies, whereby international judges get together to discuss and hone their skills in judging and assessing competitive exhibits. In the field of literature judging, Charles has had significant influence in the development of methods of assessment of philatelic literature and, in particular, electronic/digital literature.

As curator of the Brigham collection of Canada, he has prepared and developed exhibits from probably the finest and most comprehensive collection of Canada ever formed, winning many large gold medals and several grands prix. His own collecting interests are wide ranging and he has written numerous research articles, including regular philatelic articles in non-philatelic publications such as *The Ottawa Citizen*. He is currently vice-chairman of the Vincent Graves Greene Philatelic Research Foundation and is involved in their expertising and issue of certificates.

Requiescat in Pace

William Charles Earl (Bill) - 31.01.1924 - 23.03.2020

Bill died peacefully in his sleep on Monday 23rd March 2020. He was born in Westminster but brought up in Dagenham where he trained as a toolmaker. During the war he tried to join the RAF three times, but was turned down on each occasion because of his. reserved occupation. He worked for Ford in Dagenham until the end of the war, when he married Enid and moved to Northampton to work for the toy maker Metoy. In 1958 he moved to Knowle and worked for Briscoes in Tyseley. He later became a director at Quinton Hazel and then Burma Oil. His last role was as



director at Metalrax in Moseley. Bill was one of the early members of the newly formed Solihull Philatelic Society in 1970, and held the post of Secretary 1983-1994 and President on two occasions. Bill will be best remembered for his beautifully written up collection of Coffee House Covers. He also collected and studied the Penny Black and Penny Red and was helpful in plating these stamps for members. He later collected Japanese overprints on the stamps of Burma, accepting reluctantly that some of them were probably forgeries. Over the last 10 years he managed to build a very good collection of KGVI and a near complete collection of the 1935 Silver Jubilee issue, all beautifully written up. Bill was a keen tennis player in his youth and was Ford champion for several years, and with his tennis partner Ozzie, was just one match from qualifying for Wimbledon. In later years his main activity was playing golf, maintained into his early 90s. Bill played to a good standard and I never managed to beat him. One of his other collecting interests involved trying to find as many lost golf balls in the lakes. He was always being encouraged by his opponents to hurry up. He was a staunch Chelsea FC supporter and watched most of their games on Sky. Bill was popular, always smiling and never spoke ill of anyone. He will be sorely missed by his extended family and his many philatelic friends. Bill was survived by his wife and sons, Bob and Ian. Paul Woodness Solihull PS

...but did it really? What was the real reason? How could a Dealer pay a higher price than a Collector? It doesn't make sense, does it? Collectors are customers. Customers usually pay the highest price, unless for a Collector, this was.

- Lucky for the seller that 2 well-healed bidders saw the potential value that day or it could have been given away... the seller could easily have lost out couldn't he? or she?

So, by un-pecling the layers of obfuscation, hopefully we can all agree:

The Secret is Simple -

TO ALL ABOUR TIMING

Plus the 3 Philatelic 'P's -

Presentation Place and

Understanding problem... I always remember the car trade had their own little 'bible' - Glass's Guide, I've no idea. I've not even looked - in this internet-dominated world, it may even have disappeared. Well, there's an insider Stamp Trade publication for Stamp Dealers called 'The Philatelic Exporter". There's nothing that special about it—and you won't learn much or find massively reduced prices by subscribing - BUT - it is a forum, a paper focal point, a last bastion in this on-line transparent world that we inhabit... whereby dealers (and auctioneers) can try and communicate with each other. I publish my own articles there.

Recently I discussed the outcome of my 10 years' simple research, asking dealers and auctioneers 'what is your biggest problem?'

To a man. (why are we almost all men), they replied — "my biggest problem is stock, if I can get more of the right stock I can sell it easily"

Strange that, nobody ever asked me the same question back – because my answer would have been entirely different (and I don't treat it as a problem) – I seek to satisfy collectors

This is the reason why my company has such massive advertising. This is the reason why we spend up to 8% of turnover – up to \$290,000 per armum in marketing costs. (Most deasers don't even self \$200K per armum).

industry norm and therefore desirable – but genuine never-hinged commands a premium. Europe sells but at reduced levels, Americas is good, as generally is Asia but the heat has come off China which is still good – and Russia which can still be good. East Europe is weaker.

Overall, Rarities throughout can command their own price levels and real Postal History has good demand.

Social distancing in the 17th Century


Martin Brumby, **Mervyn Benford**, **Bill Hedley** (**FEPA News**) brought this to my attention. As those of you interested in postal history will know this was in the time of Charles II who set up a post office system. I wonder if they kept riding during the plague.

These are the Orders issued by the Lord Mayor and Aldermen of the City of London in 1665 to combat plague.

ORDERS CONCERNING LOOSE PERSONS AND IDLE ASSEMBLIES

That all plays, bear-baitings, games, singing of ballads, buckler-play, or suchlike causes of assemblies of people be utterly prohibited, and the parties offending severely punished by every alderman in his ward.

Feasting prohibited. That all public feasting, and particularly by the companies of this city, and dinners at taverns, ale-houses, and other places of common entertainment, be forborne till further order and allowance; and that the money thereby spared be preserved and employed for the benefit and relief of the poor visited with the infection.



Despite these measures the London plague lasted for 18 months and around 100 000 people died.

The New Year started with a meeting on 10th January under the heading Gems from My Collection. This gave members a wide scope for interpretation, which some of them took. The displays started with some of the highlights from David Rossall's collection of York Postal History. followed by Willie King with some Philby correspondence, a Penny Black used on cover 100 years before his birthday, and 50-year-old Congress covers. Fraser Murray showed some SG 1 Stamps - the first issues from various countries, followed by Dennis Grav's Lundy collection and some superb George V issues from the Caribbean from Ian Smith, Dan Ross started the second round with the 1929 PUC set followed by Modern Machin Booklet Rarities. David Bowman showed the Stars and Stripes on US stamps, with Steve Clark displaying Early Austrian Day of the Stamp material. John Chalmers put up an Austrian miniature sheet decorated with Swarovski crystals and Ken Gibb

brought the evening to a close with Gems on Stamps from his minerals collection. We continued with a Postcard Night when seven of our members brought along selections of postcards from their collections. David **Rossall** started the evening with items bought to complement his Swiss collection with Gruss Aus cards, Swiss mountain railways and Pro Juventute. He was followed by Brain Keutzer's display of Art on Cards collected from museums and galleries that he had visited. David Bowman had an excellent display of the Royal Family from the 60s to the 80s, and lan Smith showed what could be picked up in charity shops including Ceylon, France, Gibraltar, West Indies and the Peoples' Republic of China. The first half concluded with **Jim Irving** showing Peter Howson's Paintings of Robert Burns and other cards with Burns connections. More Swiss material from David Rossall was followed by a lighthearted and amusing selection of Seaside Postcards from Dennis Gray's vast hoard, and **Dan Ross** brought the evening to a close with a selection of Postal Stationery Cards from around the World. We continued our 2020 programme with an Alphabet Night. Traditionally members are requested to bring display relating in some way to the President's initials - this time K and/ or G (for Ken Gibb), lan Smith started the evening with four boards on the Life and Times of John F Kennedy, followed by postmarks from up-country post offices in Sierra Leone beginning with the letter K from Roy Wickham's collection. David Rossall showed German Castles on stamp, cover and postcard, and David Bowman ended the first round with items from the Glasgow Garden Festival and Royal

Garden parties. Dan Ross showed originality with a General Knowledge guiz, and lan Baker followed with Postmarks of Ayrshire post offices starting with G - Galston, Garallan, Glenapp, Girdle Toll and Glengarnock. German booklet panes was John Chalmers' theme, and Willie King homed in on General Gordon. Our president ended the evening with Gems from a wide variety of countries -GB. Gilbert & Ellice. Greece. Greenland, Grenada, Kosovo and Kyrgystan - and finished with a souvenir of the Garden Festival with the logo made of gemstones. For our February meeting there was an excellent turnout for a display of *Jersey* by one of our own members, lan **Smith**. Ian recounted that he had been collecting Jersey for 50 years and this was reflected in the range of material that he had been able to accumulate and have available for display. His postal history section started with a letter from 1732, with ship mail from Southampton and a selection of the various early post marks, including mail from Scotland. This was followed by mail between Jersey and France, plus later UK type cancellations. The first round continued with a superb crosssection of material covering the German occupation period, with field post offices, Red Cross message sheets, internee and POW mail as well as the Jersey-produced stamps used during that period. The second round was equally interesting, with postcards, postage dues, post-and-go labels and a selection of commemorative and definitive stamps from 1994-2000. lan brought his display to a close with a display of stamps, covers and postcards of the Jersey Railway and the Jersey Eastern Railway. At our last

meeting we ran two of our annual competitions. The first on display was the three-sheet competition which attracted five entries ranging from British Empire Tax on Stamps in the Great War to Robert Jameson. *Professor of Geology*. 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
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

competitive entry. Sadly we report the deaths of two of our oldest members: Bill Kirby (100) and Tom Head (90+). February has been relatively quiet. We started with the society table at the monthly Azelia Hall Fair. Next lan **Reed** presented a half evening of Channel Islands Postal History, much routed through St Malo and later via Weymouth when regular Packet Mail services were established. A range of 18th century material was shown and early 19th century, including private ship mail, forwarding agents' mail, Ship Letters etc. Many stamped letters were shown after 1840, both incoming and outgoing, including a late-use 1d Black in March 1841, postcards, parcel cancels on QV values to £1 green. In the second half six members showed two frames each with subjects as

follows: 6th June 1944 D-Day leaders illustrated covers and Morocco Agencies Overprints on GB, with all sub-office postmarks suitably placed on an enlarged map: a good run-through collection of Sudan from overprints on Egypt to 1950s: St Vincent QV 1861-

1893 mint including multiples and panes, with values to 5/-: British 836 Force FPO135 postmarks, NATO Council Meeting covers from 1959-60 to more recent: a wide range of

Oil Company Share Certificates with fine vignettes, often reused for different companies: and finally Tristan da Cunha 2019 Children's Designs accompanied by personalised certificates for the individual artists. On the 26th Tony Hickey showing Germany 1917-1933 gave an

extremely interesting, informative and educational account of the politics and disquiet in Germany during this troubled period. This included the unrest in Germany at the end of the War, the Wilson 14 Conditions. the surrender and armistice, followed by the negotiations and imposition of the terms of the Treaty of Versailles, where reparations and re-defining of borders was to determine the course of the next twenty years. Throughout the whole period large numbers of picture postcards were produced of the leaders, the parties and especially propaganda messages helping to stir up unrest, to promote or oppose the territory changes, and to promote or denigrate particular ideologies. Tony showed dozens of these all written up with suitable background information

and other relevant photos, press cuttings and documents such as voting papers etc. The rise of the various Nationalist parties and Communism came about because of the resulting economic situation in Germany which led to major shortages and deprivation, especially with soldiers returning to civilian life to find a shortage of jobs etc. The German fleet had been scuppered at Scapa Flow; there were restrictions on army numbers; no military planes were allowed. Germany had lost its colonies, and a number of plebiscites meant various territories in Europe were amalgamated into Denmark, Belgium, Holland, and France, Poland and Czechoslovakia became independent countries. The status of Danzig and Memel was determined, and Bavaria incorporated into Germany. The League of Nations had been established but without the participation of the USA, Germany or Austria. By 1923 inflation and hyperinflation had reached a peak, until the "Gold Currency" helped to restore some normality. All of this nurtured a deep feeling of resentment within the population, but many of the newly formed but short-lived nationalist parties disappeared or amalgamated

and eventually the Nazis established supremacy. The Weimar Republic was established. Hindenburg was elected President. Many relevant stamp issues were also included, particularly the plebiscite issues, but also the blackedged Cinderella issues mourning the loss of both European territories and overseas colonies. The inter-state borders were finally accepted in 1926. and Hitler after his early release from prison determined to achieve power by "democratic" means rather than revolution. He eventually became Chancellor when the Third Reich was established on the 30th January 1933. Our big event for 2020 was to be our Fair on 18th April when playing host to KFPS for its Federation Day and AGM. We were also having a table at London 2020 on the Wednesday but both of these have been Coronavirused. One happy note: two new members have enrolled. With over 100 members, an active packet circuit, two auctions a year and a lively programme of displays, competitions, members' evenings and social events, we are still actively looking for new members, particularly general stamp collectors who want to expand their interests. First to display was Paul Green who showed Envelopes and other Postal Stationery for Mosul, which is in today's Iraq, illustrating the various changes in ownership of the area both pre- and post-WWI. Next up John Copeland displayed Postcards illustrating places beginning with M including Muscat and, nearer to home, Mountnessing. Thor Torkildsen followed with L & M both represented with stamps and postal stationery covering Latvia, Lithuania, Luxemburg, Macedonia, Malta, Moldova and Montenegro. Chris Norton then entertained us with his display covering Military Post from Field/Forces Post Offices in Hong Kong whilst under British Control. The second half of the meeting began with a presentation from John Rawlins with Letters to Kentwell Hall, Long Melford, one from Tasmania to Maldon as well as material covering the *Lithuanian* occupation of Memel. Pat Adams gave a detailed display of Money Letter Envelopes posted in Norway and explained the information and processes required to send money through the post. Finally, Eric **Lienhard** showed *Postcards displaying* Swiss Mountains, Myths and Legends, Mule Transport and the Swiss National Museum. For the final afternoon meeting of our winter schedule before we revert to evening meetings we were delighted to have one of our members, Eric Lienhard, present a display

entitled Swiss Surprise. He began by showing sheets of stamps etc that he had displayed at a Stampex exhibition some 50 years ago which had earned him a bronze medal. These included different shades and dies as well as proofs of issues. He also displayed a range of labels, booklets, first day covers and mourning cards, followed by postage due stamps. Then came luggage labels, receipts with stamps affixed, postal stationery cards and details of a former British Railway's Office in Switzerland, hang glider post and telegraph office cancellations. For the second part of the meeting, Eric concentrated primarily on postcards displaying Swiss scenery with stamps showing the same scenes. Finally, we were treated to a display of stamps from international organisations based in Geneva. For our evening meeting of our spring/summer schedule we were delighted to have guest speakers from the Benfleet and District Philatelic Society visit us. Colin Evans presented first, covering a wide range of topics including Stampex 1980, The Ross Dependencies, Elizabeth Tower (Big Ben), SS Great Britain berthed at Portsmouth, Rainbows, The Postal

Strike of 1971 and Railways. The second part of the evening was divided between two speakers: Harry Tabeart and **Dennis Livermore**. Again a wide range of topics was covered including Stamps of Puerto Rico, Britain's Islands' lighthouses and the Sistine Chapel from Harry, whilst Dennis included a selection of engraved stamps designed by Czeslaw Slania. George Guiderson and Annemarie Kalina as well as Historic Mail Envelopes, and Churchill (including railway engines and boats honouring him by taking his name). Although not dead countries we were finally treated to a fine example of postcards showing Swiss Lakes with in some cases stamps depicting the same scene.

January and February were certainly monthly meetings where members could participate fully! January's title was Anything /Being British, while President Brown turned President's Night into a shared experience under the title Wonderful, Wild and Weird!. There was a fairly good chance that many held British items in their collections somewhere, and that we all had wonderful stamps. Whether wild or weird is another thing! 12 members contributed to these evenings with enthusiasm and panache. Topics were 1946 British Mediterranean Fleet Covers, Cricket on Stamps, 1878 Cyprus, Wildings, British Commonwealth and Australian Victoria. British and Irish Magnetic Telegraph Stamps, GB mint issues including some 'castles', London Parcel Delivery Company, Tax Bands on Cypriot Cigarette Packets, High values on Covers from the 1898-99 Turk/Greek War. 1938 USA Presidential set and other similar stamps, African issues and others with Presidents on them. Western Samoa, Siege of Paris 1870-71, Horizon labels, WWII cancellations on piece and USA Cavalryman's Territorial Covers, Oddities included

John Armstone's wooden box frontage with the stamp on it!; Horizon labels brought in by **Alan Bush**, with ghosting, stretched out fonts, double prints, and other weird markings on them; Mike Asteris' copy of the routing of the flagship in the British Fleet in 1946; **Tom Gillespie**'s inclusion of numerous photos that accompanied a fine display of covers and Mike Berry's description of the use of pigeons during the 1870 Siege of Paris. Howard Morgan's Western Samoa was wild for its location, but he described some head hunting going on which would be wilder! Fred Robinson included his presidential stamps in honour of the president of our society, for which I thank him for his thoughtfulness. Mr **Podger**'s cigarette tax bands are always interesting to see. Tax revenue issues are usually filled with intricate designs, and sometimes lots of colour. They are also examples of philatelic history that were just thrown away! Ray Butler's Wildings are beautiful. These fell under the heading "British" perfectly, but would've been good in the February meeting as simply "wonderful"! Chris Dudeney always teaches us a thing or two about Cypriot history. Martha Brown brought in collections that had been in her family for decades and Bob Tebbit demonstrated a full grasp of the cricket ball! As you can see, the Chichester and District Philatelic Society is going Martha Brown strong!

Croydon & District

Our first evening was a Members' Meeting to display material starting with the letter *D.* **Chris Hitchen** began with a display of *Decorative Envelopes*, mainly French, from the period 1870 - 1890 which included adverts for Beer & Syphon Manufacturers, a Brush Factory and Sewing Machines, all beautifully engraved. **Paul Percival**

followed with a colourful selection of stamps from countries including Dahomey, Danish West Indies, Danzig (now Gdansk), Dominica, Dominican Republic and Dubai from the early 1900s right through to the 1970s. Dave **Meaney** showed a number of Different Dublin cancellations on covers franked with British stamps including a Distinctive Dublin Maltese Cross, an 1855 Double Dublin spoon, with "Paid" in the cancel, which lasted for only 2 months. Brian Asquith presented two comic postcards which had been Disapproved by the Blackpool Postcard Censor. There followed mail which had been Delayed and/or Damaged and covers with Postage Dues and one with Duty Paid. John Ray produced material from Fiji including a cover from Dreketi, Dues used on pieces, ordinary stamps used as Dues, Airport Departure tax stamps, Diplomatic mail, Damaged covers, Fijian Dancers on stamps and a Postcard showing the International Dateline going round Fiji. Chris Board was the last to show with his Inspectors' Marks with D and a number in a circle on letters to Transvaal post boxes after 1900, from Canada, France and China, French "D" stamps on cover in 1991 and an Indian Coronation Durbar leaflet from 1911. Our next meeting was a visit from Kingston upon Thames beginning with a display by **Peter Wood** of *Ireland*, Uniform Penny Post to the Rising which started with an 1825 entire from Ireland to London with £1 13s 4d to pay which was indicative of the need for the eventual Rowland Hill Reforms and the introduction of the Penny Post. The standard rate was reduced to 4d in 1839 and examples of this rate were shown in script and also in hand struck "4s" which were only used in a small

number of areas. Mulready envelopes and letter sheets were introduced in 1840 along with the Penny Black. A variety of Mulreadys, including caricatures, were admired by all those present along with Penny Blacks cancelled by Maltese Crosses in red or black. Spoon Cancels bearing the distinctive Irish diamond shape, Christmas cards and Valentine cards introduced in the 1860s and fancy illustrated envelopes were displayed and the introduction of postcards in 1870 provided some fine pictures. Chris Oliver followed with his display of Booklets of the South African

Republic for the 50 Year Period to 2011. First, issues from November 1987 following the Natal Flood Disaster with 15 cent definitives x 10 overprinted 'Natal Flood Disaster/ Vloedamp Natal' and surcharged 10c, followed by 16c definitives x 10 similarly overprinted were shown. Next were booklets of Aviation in South Africa with 45c x 10 illustrating different types of aircraft used in developing aviation in South Africa. This was followed in 1995 by The World Cup Rugby Championships, Increased Rates booklets in December of that year and at Christmas 1996 the first of the Big Five booklets was issued showing lions, elephants, rhinos, leopards and buffaloes. There were a number of issues to promote tourism in different parts of the country over the years together with birds, including raptors and ducks. The display featured lots of colour and variety including proofs and prestige booklets, self-adhesives and non-denominational stamps. Our first February meeting was the Presidential Evening. President Graham Harker chose Croydon as his display, which was made up of various aspects of the philately of Croydon. There were 23 letters associated with

Croydon before 1840. The letters usually had a CROYDON stamp and often the cost of sending the letter written on the front. None of the letters had postage stamps. Then came 18 letters produced from 1840. Most of the letters contained stamps - many with Penny Red or other Queen Victoria stamps, followed by a number of labels used by the post offices for Parcel Post. Each post office had its own label and many of the labels had Queen Victoria or Edward VII stamps attached. Next we saw a selection of postcards each one with a stamp of Edward VII and the appropriate postmark, 25 Registered Letters each with a registration label, a small display of Croydon Head Post Office, including some official documentation and finally a large display of the Post Offices of Thornton Heath, which included photographs of the post offices and the letters and material generated by the individual post offices. Members enjoyed looking at the material which aroused much discussion. Our second February display was of Rhodesia UDI from John Schofield. It is not often there is a speaker who has actually lived in the country he is talking about so it was a treat to hear stories which came from personal experience. The

display started in 1891 with the Malawi District/Nyasaland through to 1893 when it became British Central Africa. In 1908 Nyasaland Protectorate came into being followed in 1924 by firstly Southern Rhodesia and then Northern Rhodesia. The three Territories joined as Rhodesia & Nyasaland from 1954 until 1963 when they reverted to separate Territories. In 1965 Rhodesia (Southern Rhodesia) made a Unilateral Declaration of Independence which was not recognised by Great Britain. On display were examples of mail to the UK with postage dues for the full postage as the Rhodesian stamps

There were letters from the United States to Prime Minister Harold Wilson urging him to accept Rhodesian independence. In 1980 it became Zimbabwe under the control of Robert Mugabe. On show were definitive and commemorative stamps, mint, used and forgeries throughout these various periods together with relevant covers showing their usage. It was a wonderful, colourful display of material illustrating the history of the territory and the turmoil which ensued. In March David Milsted presented his display of GB Army Overprints. The rare original Post Office Circular "War Office Overprints" dated 25 August 1896 set out the basis of the "Army Official Overprints" issue. David proceeded to show examples of the stamps both mint and used, with outstanding postmarks of a very high standard and clarity. Large mint blocks were much in evidence. All the different printings were on show together with many varieties which were well illustrated with enlargements which left you in no doubt as to what the variety was. Material of such high quality and rarity, covering a relatively short period from 1896 to 1904, was a delight to see. Fine examples of these stamps used

on cover included two used at the Siege of Ladysmith and two covers signed by Lord Roberts who was affectionately called "Bobs" by the troops under his command. Army Official Overprints were withdrawn on 12th May 1904 but examples of use between that date and 1914 were displayed. David made his article "Army Official Overprints 1896 to 1904" published in Gibbons Stamp Magazine Monthly available to all present which was a fine souvenir of an outstanding evening. *Graham Harker*

Halifax

The 2019-2020 season continued with **Mike Rego** who showed *Trinidad*. He displayed pre-stamp covers from 1800, just three years after the British took the island from Spain. The pre-stamp

period showed plantation letters from merchants and missionary letters on behalf of the Weslevan Church in London, who formed the first children's schools and education in the island. and throughout the West Indies. The private adhesive issue of 1847, the Lady McLeod, was displayed followed by a series of Britannia postage stamps from 1851 to 1882 which were eventually replaced by the QV head design. The Britannia one penny stamps in this period for about 30 years had no value printed on the stamp, purely TRINIDAD, and were issued in a variety of colours, and perforations. Examples of mail with the Anglo-French 1880 agreement accountancy marks were shown. The second part of the display showed postal cards from Trinidad, which were issued when the island joined the UPU in 1877, printed for use Inland, Regional and to UPU countries. Mike continued to the commencement of the airmails of Trinidad which were established on a regular basis in 1929 via a Pan Am service. The New York Rio & Buenos Aires Line started to call at Trinidad in Feb 1930, KLM broke the American airmail monopoly to Trinidad, but when the Netherlands were invaded in Mav 1940 by Nazi Germany, this service ceased and Trinidad established its own airline in Nov 1940, British West Indies Airways (BWIA). Our annual competitions produced an interesting selection of entries with **Douglas** Armitage, Mike Roberts (H) and Adrian Lee collecting silverware for 1st, 2nd and 3rd places respectively in the General Class and Max Smith and Mike Roberts with more cups for their entries in the Postal History class and Alan Eastwood with a successful and amusing thematic entry. The President

Mike Roberts (I) presented the awards and thanked Brian Wilkinson for sorting the scores and Steve Saville for providing interval refreshments.

The first meeting was a Postcard Evening with many topics from Old London, Old Reading, Cologne past and present, Norway and Mountain and Quarry

Huddersfield

The season continues at a new venue Lindley Liberal Club Lindley Huddersfield HD3 3EQ, meetings being held during the afternoon commencing at 13:30. During February we have enjoyed a visit from **Jack Lemm** with *Halifax Postal History from 1740 to 1866*. The current newsworthy item is a cover signed by Ann Lister (Gentleman Jack of Shibden Hall) together with 1d Red possible plate 11 and three Registered "Too Late" into Halifax Registered cancelled blue. Jack also produced some of his *Airmails collection*. He noted the changes

around 1910 when early air mail demonstrated the reduction in time for mail transportation over that of sea mail. Displayed items included Crash Mail City of Washington, Skipio, script issues to White Russian troops, Zeppelin mail, Alan Cobham's Flying Circus, Harry Newel covers and Persian Air Mail carried by Junkers 1924 to 1927. March brought us Mike Roberts with a display based on his presentation to the Royal in 2017 together with a paper Pakistan beyond the Catalogue. The display covered the period commencing with partition in 1947 (the birth of the nation) through marriage and then divorce, the separation of West Pakistan and East Pakistan to form Bangladesh. For the 1947 issues of stamps, Overprints on existing KGVI India stamps, the standard of overprinting was not all of good quality due to the postal authorities attempting to achieve a rapid change from India and promoting Pakistan. Items of Postal History shown included Brook Bond (tea) company correspondence from many regions. We saw covers used in Pakistan prior to 1st October 1947 with unoverprinted stamps attached, identified by the Zindabad cancellation. The display showed examples of machine-printed and hand stamp overprints. Mike explained that there are a great number of forgeries showing examples and how to identify them. Examples of SERVICE issues and postal stationery were also shown. 1961 Decimal surcharges commenced with a Paisa to Pies conversion chart followed by examples of the surcharges. Adrian Lee

Huntingdonshire

Our guest speaker was Robert Carr. His subject was Scouting from the Beginning. At the siege of Mafeking Baden-Powell as a soldier organized the local youths with uniforms, the town folk with homemade money and a local postal system with its own stamps. The stamps were unique in that they did not bear Queen Victoria's head. Robert showed examples of the blue stamps which were for local posting only. The book "Scouting for Boys" was published in 1908 and the Scouting movement came into being in 1910. We were shown stamps from many countries showing Baden-Powell and the Scouting movement. Some UK Islands produced private Scouts stamps for mail which when sent reached the mainland and needed a valid postage stamp. Examples were shown on letters. Costa Rica was too small to have an army so used their scouts when they needed a uniformed body of men. When the Post Office workers went on strike in 1971 many scout groups had their own stamps printed and delivered mail. This was also done by some scouts at Christmas when they delivered mail locally. This brought back memories for some of our members who had belonged to the Scouting movement. David Birkert

Our first meeting of 2020 was a display of *Philatelic Aspects of France* by **Roger Niven**. The first part included a substantial history of the growth of France, including its postal system. We learnt of the Ceres series of stamps, Marianne as the symbol of France and the difficult relations with Germany over

History lesson from the time of Cromwell, through Wolfe Tone and Daniel O'Connell, The Potato Famine, the Fenian League and the various para-military groups to the Easter Rising and ultimately to Home Rule and the Partition. All of this was illustrated by ephemera and postal history items which included Mulready Caricatures, 1906 Sinn Fein labels, GB stamps overprinted to the early Irish independent issues. It was a well-presented and fascinating explanation of troubled times. In late February **Susan Oliver** showed us some *Early Færoe Island covers* on the early ships

making the journey from Denmark. They had markings from Denmark, usually Copenhagen and an arrival mark on the reverse of Thorshavn, the Faroes capital. There were early letters addressed to the firm of Thomsen who lived in the south of the Islands and traded much around the islands as well as mainland Denmark. Covers were carried on the ships *Arcturus*, *Valdemar* and *Diana*. One 1884 letter was sent with a barrel of apples, and another with an 1852 boxed LERWICK mark from the Shetland Islands.

with both stamps and the superb postcards by the artist George Rankin. Adrian provided the second round with part of his collection of Early Netherlands and Colonies, covering the 1852 issues of William III through to Queen Wilhelmina who ascended the throne in 1890 at the age of 10. This was followed by illustrations of the work of three Czech engravers: Jindra Schmidt, Josef Hercik and Milos Ondracek. Following a very successful auction on 29th January when sales totalled over £500 including £60 for charity, our meeting on 12th February was an equally successful competition night. The general class competition for the Alec Hopkins trophy was won by lan Smith with his entry on the German Occupation of Romania 1917-18. Runners-up with equal scores were Bill Clark showing Tanganyika TPOs and David Rossall with The Fourth

Seebeck issue of Ecuador. The thematic section, also with three entries, was won by David Rossall's entry on The Swiss artist Albert Anker, with Britannia by lan Smith in second place and Roy Wickham's Unilever Postal History third. In the 3-sheet competition the winner again was lan **Smith** with an entry on the *Invasion of* the Falkland Islands, followed by David Rossall's Allenstein Plebiscite and John Chalmers' D4 Boxed Namestamps. Our new postcard competition for the Congress Cup attracted a very respectable eight entries which was very heartening for a new venture. The range of subjects was very wide, but local topics won out with first place going to a Snapshot of Portencross by Gordon Shepherd. followed by Postcards of Old Ayr and District by **Jim Irving**. Third place went to lan Smith with A Taste of Ceylon. The Tom Clark Trophy, which is awarded to the member with the best entry who has not previously won any competition, this year goes to Gordon **Shepherd**. one of this year's winners. who had not won before. Our next meeting took us to Eastern Canada. courtesy of our visiting speaker, Alan Blakely. Alan introduced us to the history of Canada's maritime provinces, originally settled by the French but taken over by British settlers in the 1700s. Nova Scotia. New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island were all separate colonies until the 1860s, all issuing their own stamps before they became part of the Canadian federation. Alan showed us examples of the early issues, denoted in pence at first until the influence of the USA caused a change of currency name to Canadian dollars and cents. We saw examples of post travelling between

the three colonies, and also international mail including letters to Scotland. Whilst not part of Canada, Alan has added St Pierre et Miguelon to his collection as it is in the same region, and we saw a range of the early French colonial issues used there, through to the specific issues for these islands up to 1948. A March meeting was entitled Members' Favourite Stamps, which was widely interpreted by those members who brought along material to display. Over half those attending had brought something, which was very encouraging. The evening started with Peter Smith who brought, amongst other things, a Tasmanian stamp postmarked for Daniel's Bay, where he was born. Roy **Wickham** showed a Zanzibar forgery that proved to be genuine. He was followed by Vic Currie's Composers and Martin McBurnie's GB castle series. The first round was closed by **Angus Dodds** with *The 75th* anniversary of Rotary International. The second round opened with *Early* Gold Coast from Robert Watt followed by Finland. variety of favourites and Jim Irving recalled A Family Visit to Durban in postcards. Launceston

Our January meeting was devoted to displays presented by the following Club members. Roger Winn had a display of some 24 Interesting Postal Items from Around the World including covers and stamps from Canada, Tangier, Natal, Ceylon, New Zealand, Australia, Gibraltar, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, Malaya, Singapore. Interesting features of the collection were several stamps issued by one country and then being used in one of its neighbours and finally a wartime correspondence between a soldier in Cyprus and his girlfriend. Evelyn Sandercock showed a nice collection of Covers and Correspondence from the USA Addressed to Members of the Noted Local Foot family. Then Barry Moody brought a collection of postal items illustrating many of the privations and living conditions of the islanders during the Occupation of the Channel Islands from 30th June 1940 until Liberation on 9th May 1945. The collection traces the progress of the Occupation with photographs, newspaper articles,

pamphlets, documents and postal items including correspondence between family members living in separate internment camps. A small but fitting tribute to the loyalty, courage and fortitude of the people of the Channel Islands, John Henderson produced an interesting collection based around 50p coins issued by the Royal Mint from 2016 onwards to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the birth of Beatrix Potter. The initial issue was a set of three coins. Beatrix Potter plus Peter Rabbit and Jemima Puddleduck. In 2017, 2018 and 2019 further issues of her characters brought the total to fourteen. John's collection comprises numerous sets of the special issue coins mounted on cards with appropriate postage stamps as applicable. As the issue by the Royal Mint of these 'special' 50p coins and associated presentation sets continues so John's collection has continued to grow. Viv Sandercock showed a collection of interesting Old Post Cards mainly associated with mining activities including Broken Hill, Australia, South Africa, Tanzania and Camborne. Mike **Tooley** brought a remarkable collection of individually illustrated *Folded Letters* and Hand-painted Valentine cards dating from the Victorian era together with later Edwardian letters and covers from the Boer War period. One had pen and ink thumbnail portraits of

Kitchener, and another portrays caricatures of British soldiers being defiled and attacked (probably attributable to European anti-war protestors). Another fine Victorian letter dated 1865 was illustrated with a series of hand drawn cameos of fashionable gentlemen of the time. Finally, Mike included a hand-painted illustration of the 1948 Silver Wedding Commemorative issue. Finally **Dave Richards** gave another interesting display of early postal and revenue issues from Trinidad and Tobago between 1858 and 1900 together with a series of postal covers issued in 1948 for deliveries to each of the three geographical divisions of the island. GEOFF GETS 'GOLD' IN **ADELAIDE** Geoff Reynolds our secretary achieved a Gold medal for his entry in the **ADELAIDE** AEROPEX 2019 Philatelic Competition. Who would have predicted the enduring appeal of 'Alice...' with all its amazing characters, circumstances and ethereal considerations?





We were superbly entertained to *Alice in Wonderland & the World of Gerald King* by specialist philatelist **Paul Leonard FRPSL**. Gerald King is a philatelist and talented illustrator with a powerful sense of humour. Moreover, his passion for Dodgson's masterpiece led him to implore the Post Office in 1965 to celebrate the centennial of the book's

publication by the issue of stamps. Considering the stuffy age, it is not surprising that a negative response was forthcoming! Gerald therefore launched his own philatelic 'Wonderland'! Over the decades he has produced numerous special stamps, illustrated covers and postmarks, all with a mischievous and amusing slant, and all totally unappreciated by the Post Office, who simply missed a trick! Reference to the internet will reveal a considerable wealth of information, about both the world of Gerald King and his amazing philatelic creations. In February we enioved a well-researched and eloquent presentation which revealed **Bob Small**'s passion for his subject combined with a wealth of associated material, all of considerable interest to both war historians and philatelists alike. Bob set out a broad sweeping tapestry of British political and military activity, from 1066 through to an insightful history of the RAF. This was a superb write-up making excellent use of charts, maps, documents, letters and photos together with early postal items, eventually leading into modern postal administration and linked stamp issues.

A particular emphasis was placed on Napoleonic history and the display contained numerous items of correspondence, including an original letter relating to 'The Glorious 1st June'. Much consideration was given to this period and the material shown formed

We saw changes in charges, many shipping lines and accountancy marks on the various covers. Julian finished off with a wonderful picture of Liverpool docks showing a post arrival shed on the right where late mail could be delivered and paid for and then ferried out to the ship (in the distance) within 10 minutes of sailing and this was followed by a letter sent from Philadelphia to Manchester on board the Eagle line's "Schiller" which was wrecked in the Scilly Isles in 1875 and just 14 bags of mail from 62 were salvaged. It was a fantastic

evening's display. March's members' displays were on *Spring & Yellow*. Heather Lawn showed us *Parrots* and Jim Andrews followed with *Flowers*. Royal

From the birth of the railways they have been extensively used to transport the mail. Records show that in the United States contracts existed from 1832 that allowed the carriage of mail by railroad. In his presentation to the Royal Philatelic Society London on 9th January, **Hugh Feldman FRPSL** examined the first four decades of mail by railroad in the United States of America. Hugh's focus was centred on the rail operating companies, an area of study not previously covered by

published research. In addition to a thorough presentation, Hugh displayed a wealth of magnificent covers carried by the various railroad companies. Claire Scott FRPSL achieved two 'firsts' on 23rd January when she presented On The Fringes of Eastern Seas: Brunei 1895 - 1988. It was the first time that Brunei had been the subject of an entire display to us, and the first time that an afternoon display had been accompanied by a PowerPoint presentation. The display revealed the fascinating philatelic story of the country, the study of the stamps being accompanied by essays, colour trials and proofs, as well as usage, while also shown were airmails, forces mail, postal stationery and postcards. Claire's illustrated presentation complemented the display by providing a clear insight into the historical and postal background of the country. Extracts from the collections of members living in the Thames Valley area were shown to us on 6th February. The displays had been coordinated by Dr Patrick Reid FRPSL, and clearly demonstrated the diversity of interests. They embraced many aspects relating Paul Woodness to Great Britain: from studies of the Birth of the Adhesive Postage Stamp and the History of the 1d lilac, to Presentation Cards for several issues and the 1948 Olympic Games set, from the Penny Postage Jubilee of 1890 to the Development of Stamp Production at De La Rue, from Late Mail posted at the London Chief Office to the Scottish Additional Halfpenny Mail Tax, and the mail service operated by the Oxford *Union Society*. The variety extended beyond Great Britain to include Watermark varieties on Australian stamps: Queensland mail to the UK: Queensland Numeral issues: The 5/-

postage due of Victoria; Tax marks on out-going mail of Victoria; Bahamas Queen's Staircase issue: Bechuanaland Protectorate: British Guiana Waterlow Lithographs: Colombia Transoceanico Airmails; Civil Censorship in Cyprus; Children's Evacuation Camps of Germany; Württemberg; Foreign cancels on the inter-War issues of Japan: New Zealand Advertisement stamps; New York Exchange Office markings: Man's Fascination with Gold. Probably the most comprehensive study of Rhodesia 1890-1924: The Postal History and Stamps of the British South Africa Company, was our subject on 20th February. Presenting the display was Colin Hoffman RDPSA FRPSL covering the period from the Occupation of Mashonaland in 1890 to a study of the Admirals issue. Throughout the quality of the material was superb, clearly thoroughly researched and outstandingly

presented. The celebrations of our 150th Anniversary featured an outstanding event on 29th February when 40 members filled the display frames with Gems of Asian Philately. The event took place at our premises at 15 Abchurch Lane in the City of London, with many of the participants having come to London specifically for the occasion. To mark this Deirdra Morris presented Richard Stock with a specially created embroidery. Based on a photograph of Her Majesty The Queen signing the Visitors' Book on opening the new premises last November, the embroidery by Joni Zhou, one of China's leading exponents of the art, took two weeks to complete. On 5th March Robert Galland FRPSL provided the display that told the story of the *Evolution of* the British Franking System. Bob explained that, before 1652, Official letters were carried either by Private Messenger or Carriers, or by the Court

Post. When speed was of the essence. the letter would be endorsed 'Haste Post Haste', such a letter from 1643 being shown. The Franking System, introduced in 1653, allowed Parliamentary, Departmental and other official mail to be carried free. In its first year, some 81/2 million letters were sent using the system. With just a signature needed as authorisation, the system was clearly open to abuse, such as offering signed pieces of otherwise blank paper in exchange for gifts or tips. A range of handstamps was used over the years to indicate mail that had been transmitted 'Free'. The system came to an end on 9th January 1840 with Uniform Penny Post being introduced the following day.

Strathclyde Postcard

We enjoy a wonderfully varied syllabus each year. In 2019-2020 the President,

Alex Magowan presented a most interesting history of Hamilton, Lanarkshire using historic postcards. He showed views of the town and its environs. From guests from the Ayrshire PS we viewed historic postcards of Ayrshire (John Chalmers), cigarette cards, brochures, postcards of St Kilda (Ken Gibb), A Tale of 2 Cities – Coventry and Dresden – both of which suffered badly during WWII (Dan Ross) and from Stuart Gough, a wonderful Arran Extravaganza illustrated with postcards, Stereoscope and Magic Lantern views, timetables of buses and trains which used to run on the island! By member Gordon Shepherd we were taken In and Around Edinburgh. with historic postcards taking members along the Coast from South Queensferry and into the City, showing various landmarks, and on to the Zoo and beyond - a fascinating view. A Members' Night on the theme of *I Also* Collect gave members a view of Beer Labels, Ephemera from the Empire Exhibition of 1938, Cigarette cards on various themes, Pens of interesting shapes and with strange caps and some *Miniature Books* – a thoroughly mesmerising evening. Coronavirus brought the session to an abrupt end! The new syllabus is being prepared and we are sure will be of interest to many. → elsiemiller@btinternet.com Elsie Miller

The British Thematic Association at Autumn Stampex

The British Thematic Association is the lead organisation for displays at Autumn Stampex 2020. The Association is encouraging both BTA members and non-members to participate fully in this event by entering a wide range of theme-based competitive and display exhibits that will highlight the scope of the Association's activities.

Those choosing to enter the competitive classes in Thematics, Open and Postcard should comply with the rules of those classes, but those entering display exhibits (that will not be judged), have the freedom to submit displays that follow a theme or tell a story and generally come under the umbrella of the pictorial classes.

Exhibits can be anything between one frame (16-sheet) and five frames, with no required qualification. Those wishing to enter eight frames in the competitive classes will require the necessary qualifications. Fees are £25 per frame. If you have not exhibited at Stampex before, the BTA will contribute £10 towards the fee of the first frame of your exhibit.

STAMP CLUB DISPLAY COMPETITIONS

It does appear, looking at some club programmes, that some clubs do not have annual displays which are competitions (presumably with awards made) and these are often some of the smaller-sized clubs where it may be felt that the number of members is not enough to sustain a competition. I thought perhaps the experience of the Telford Club in this area might be of interest.

When I first joined the Telford Club in the early 1980s there were 30 to 40 members with many being in the middle-aged group and therefore much more active in all things than now when most members are more elderly. The club had an annual competition (separate from annual displays) and these were 9-sheet displays, marked by a judge, usually invited from outside the club, to what were, if I remember correctly, national rules or based on national rules. The club has six trophies and in those far-off days they were keenly competed for by many members. The judge would comment on the competition entries to help members improve next time. Poor handwriting and little or no writing-up were always slated – hence no doctors ever won! The club competition was considered a precursor for entry into regional and then onto national competitions. We still have one member who made it into national competitions. The club also had an evening when members were invited to display on a set subject: A subject beginning with a stated letter of the alphabet, say, on Anything beginning with the letter B, or a named subject such as Transport would be set and any number of sheets could be displayed. I do not recall that our club marked these displays or had a prize for a winner. They were just an evening when members could display their own material without having to meet any set standards. I recall that one or two displays would be a comical interpretation of the set subject.

As the years passed the number of members decreased and entries decreased proportionally and the competition was in danger of disappearing by default. In one of my previous stints as club chairman some years ago I changed the format of the competition to make it easier and more attractive to members less keen on competitions. Gone was the imported judge and stringent judging rules. I set five marking headings for each competition section, being: Subject Suitability, Presentation, Material, Subject Knowledge and Overall Impression. Poor writing (but not illegible writing) and scarcity of material were explicitly excluded from the marking criteria because some members felt they could not meet high standards in these areas. Marking was by other members (no marking for one's own entry) with marks out of 10 in each marking heading – 6 being the average, above 6 being better and below 6 being not so good as average. One can see that it does not matter what standard was used by each member marking entries as long as he/she used the same standard for each entry. Full details of the marking system devised for the competition can be supplied on request.

The competition ran this way for a number of years but eventually the number of entries dwindled to the point where some categories had no entries or just the

one entry! Eventually the club competition ceased by default and the trophies went into store. The Members' Displays evening continued but a set subject was not stated and members were asked to display *Recent Acquisitions* or *Anything*. This continued for some years as the only form of members' displays and took up one evening in the club programme.

Eventually I became club chairman for the current period and last year club members astounded me when every member present produced something for display! The open subject members' display evening appears to be guite popular. At the end of the meeting last year I broached the subject of introducing a competitive element into the evening. Members stated they did not want to go back to the old system of set categories and voting rules. Then one member suggested that at the end of the evening members could vote which was "The Most Interesting Display" and a murmur of approval went around the room. So that is what we did in our recent Members' Displays evening on 9th March. Eight members brought material to display – three members were unable to be present due to illness. The subjects were: Soldiers, Mauritius, Maidstone PH, PO Numbered Cancellers, GB 2018 Stamps, MacBraynes & Co, Royal Voyages, Miscellaneous Interesting Covers and The London 2010 International Philatelic Exhibition. Quite an interesting range and all different from last year. Each entry was put up for display in turn. A maximum of 12 sheets was stipulated so each display took up one of our six display boards. Each display was numbered and members voted on slips of paper by putting the number of



their preferred "Most Interesting Display" on their slip of paper. There was a clear winner and it was: Miscellaneous Interesting Covers by Bruce McLaren. The winner received a certificate and one of the club trophies to keep for a year. I managed to find a trophy among the club trophies which did not have a named category on it. So it seems we have found a winning format for a small club and I hope other clubs who do not run a club competition may like to give it a try. You can also


