




No report of your society? Why not send one to the editor? It could get you new members, and also gives hints on good speakers to other societies.

FARFWELL TO A GENTLEMAN.



LEEDS PHILATELIC SOCIETY.

Under this title, the very successful Jubilee Exhibition of Postage Stamps, which formed so attractive a display in the Museum at Leeds last May, has borns fruit in the Counting establishment of a society for the promotion of the study of subjects connected with plointely, Other objects which are in view are to provide a means of social intercourse and interchange, both of thoughts and -pecimens, among the amateur collectors of Levds and neighbourhood. It is also intended to form a library of useful works of reference. This is the first provincial society to be formed; and as London was the first city in the world to form a society of this kind, Leeds is the first British town to follow the Metropoutan lead, even as the Leeds Jubilee Exhibition was acqually the first in the field, and by no means the least interesting of all the exhibitions that were beld. Already a good number of the most enthusiastic of the town have joined, the original membership being stich members of the Exhibition Committee as intimated wish to join. Membership will be open to all who take an interest as amateurs in the study, the professional dealer-element being of course considered incligible. The ambacription is be., and the session is to extend from October to May in each year, philately being essentially a winter evening pursuit. A convenient and comfortable room at the Mechanics' Institute has been secured, and the meetings are held twice every month, on the first and third Saturday, at 6.30 p.m. The officials of the Philatelic Society of Lemion have taken considerable interest in the movement, and their secretary, Mr. Douglas Garth, has with great courtesy intimated a desire to further the Leeds society's interest to the extent The officers of the society are of his power. the same as those of the original Exhibition Committee, and are a president, two vicepresidents, a treasurer, a librarian, and two secretaries, all of whom form the committee,

The next meeting—which is practically the opening one for philatelic bosness, and the regular programme of the society—is to-day (Saturday), when it is expected that one of the vice-presidents will introduce a definite subject, not yet announced, and afterwards the meeting will be open for exhibits. Members will, it is hoped, bring objects for exhibits, and (by permi-sion of the Chairman) may introduce friends as visitors.—R. S.

Leeds Philatelic Society - 125 and still counting

The edition of Leeds Mercury published on Saturday 7th December 1890 reported that the first meeting of Leeds Philatelic Society would be held that day at 6.30 pm in the Mechanics' Institute. It was expected that 'one of the vicepresidents would introduce a subject, not yet announced, and afterwards the meeting would be open for exhibits'. The Jubilee Exhibition of Postage Stamps held at the museum in Leeds in May that year had been very successful and the level of interest indicated that a society should be established 'for the promotion of the study of subjects connected with philately. Other objects were to provide a means of social intercourse and exchange both of thoughts and specimens among the amateur collectors of Leeds

and neighbourhood'. It is interesting that membership was confined to amateurs, which followed the principle of the Royal Philatelic Society London which, until recently, had a similar rule. The Committee consisted of a president, two vice-presidents, a treasurer, a librarian and two secretaries. Members wishing to introduce friends as visitors had first to seek the permission of the president. The subscription was five shillings for a season of meetings held twice a month on the first and third Saturday during the months of October to May. The



membership fee was quite expensive considering that it was equal to the cost of sending 60 inland letters. If local societies followed the same ratio, subscriptions would now be £32.40. If members were willing to pay subscriptions of that level today the hobby would be in a much better state in Great Britain. Is Leeds Philatelic Society the first to have its own 'Smiler' sheet? The sheet features the logo of Leeds Philatelic Society on the label. It can be

Tunbridge Wells Celebrates Its 70th Anniversary

A meeting was called in November 1945 to see what support there might be for the formation of a 'new' Philatelic Society in the town; fourteen people turned up and it was decided to proceed. I say 'new', as there was a Society existing as early as 1905, known as the Kent & Sussex Philatelic Society but unfortunately we have no more information, and do not know when it closed down. Later there was a Tunbridge Wells Pioneer Society but we have very little details of when it existed, but we understand that it ceased in mid-1945 - perhaps it had a military connection, and when the war ended its members or staff had been demobbed. We know that there was a military establishment somewhere in or near the town. The present club held its first meeting on the 28th November 1945, and at its peak had over 100 members. In 1954 the Society added the title 'Royal' to its name. However the minutes do not give any reason. King Edward VII had granted the town the title in 1909. The Society was a founder member of the Kent Federation in 1947, and with a close connection with Sussex we also affiliated to that Federation in 1954. Also in 1954, a leading member, **BTW** Stevenson, donated a collection of local postal history to the town, together with some other donations of postal history. The club's bi-annual journal has to date had 146 issues, in two volumes, unfortunately with a break between 1978 and 1996. We have hosted the GB Congress (1950) and 2 Kent Federation Rallies, the last in 1995. Among our more prominent members we include Jack Cartwright, who was President for a total of 16 years (in five different periods), BTW Stevenson, JW Brewer, Henry Hupfield (a founder member who died 2

years ago), **Dougie Read**, and three surviving life members - **W J Raven** (Hon. Treasurer for 28 years), Frank Blincow and Gordon Bass (Packet Secretary for many years). To celebrate the anniversary, we arranged a lunch on the 8th December at the local Indoor Bowls Club, where we have held a New Year lunch over the last 4 years. Peter O'Keefe

The Nepal and Tibet Philatelic Study Circle - 40 years old

2016 is our 40th anniversary. It was in 1974 that **Dr Wolfgang Hellrigl** placed a small advert in a stamp magazine asking for anyone interested in collecting Nepal to contact him. He had two replies, from Purnendu Gupta in India and myself. This was the beginning of the formation of the society. By contacting some of the well-known collectors in the USA interest grew by word of mouth until by 1976 there were some 50 members and the society was put on a more formal footing. I became the secretary/treasurer, a post which I still hold today. Of the three original founder members I am the only one surviving and now also hold the position of the society President. One of the aims of the society was to encourage members to publish their studies and this has led to ten major books being published covering almost every aspect of Nepalese and Tibet collecting,

some of which have received gold medals at international exhibitions. We currently have a worldwide membership of approximately 125, and the vehicle that keeps members informed of the latest information is a quarterly magazine 'Postal Himal'. This is available to members either by hard copy or by email with back copies being available on the Internet from the first one in 1976. Subscription rates vary depending upon the method of receiving the magazine. Meetings are often held in conjunction with international exhibitions, and there is an annual meeting every

The Study Circle was formed in 1991 with an initial membership of 34, all living in the UK. Despite the passage of time, 11 of those founders are still members. It was the inspiration of Marilyn Amedro (Edinburgh) and Douglas Scott (Norfolk), though, sadly, Douglas died very soon afterwards leaving Marilyn to do much of the work in nurturing the young society. Norman Hudson (Chester) took over the journal editor's job from Marilyn in 1995. He also became secretary in 1998 and has held both posts continually since then. Nominated by Study Circle colleagues, Norman received an ABPS Award of Merit, "for service to British philately", in 2010. Almost as long-serving, John Smith (Wirral) has been the Study Circle's Treasurer since 1998 and was also Chairman from 1996 to

2000. So, the society has benefited from great stability on its organising committee.

We bring together collectors of Faroe Islands' postage stamps, postmarks, postal history and so on. Many members also have a more general interest in the Faroes - their geography, history, culture, wildlife etc - so the society also endeavours to cater for these wider interests. A reviewer, writing in one of the UK's philatelic magazines in January 2000, said that the Study Circle is "a very lively group which really enjoys its collecting and many associated activities". We now have members in 18 countries, in addition to those in the UK. A geographically widespread membership means that meetings are not often practical but, when held, have usually coincided with national philatelic events. The society's award-winning journal and newsletter, both published twice a year, are the main ways of bringing members together. Since 2012, members have had the option to receive the Study Circle's publications electronically, thus saving on printing and postage costs. The annual membership subscription ranges from £12 to £25, depending on the type of delivery (electronic or postal) and where the member lives (UK. Europe or rest of world). Norman Hudson

...delivering The Postal Museum

Post Office Books of Remembrance donated to British Postal Museum & Archive

London, 13 November 2015 – Two books of remembrance listing all postal workers killed in the two world wars have been donated to The British Postal Museum & Archive (BPMA) for accession into its permanent Museum Collection. The books were handed to the BPMA by The Post Office Fellowship of Remembrance at a special ceremony of remembrance held in the Dumbleton Hall Hotel near Evesham on 11th November.

The books are a significant historical record, and provide the only known complete record of post office employees who served and fell in the two world wars. They will be available to view on request at the BPMA's archive in London. The Post Office Fellowship of Remembrance was established after the Second World War to support postal workers affected by the war. The two books of remembrance were created under the terms of its establishment, and

have been held by the Fellowship ever since. Chris Taft, Head of Collections at the BPMA, said "We are honoured to be asked to permanently safeguard these books of remembrance - important records of our social and military history. The General Post Office was a massive organisation during both world wars, involved in fighting on all fronts as well as keeping lines of communications open. In this, the second year of the First World War Centenary, it is important that we remember those normal people who fell in the line of duty, either on the front line, or undertaking their duties as employees of this vital organisation."

Alan Bealby, Chairman of the Post Office Fellowship of Remembrance, stated "We are

delighted that the Remembrance Books are going to a home where they can be looked after in an environment that will ensure their longevity. We are also pleased that the BPMA recognise their significance and will make them available for the general public to research and appreciate their intrinsic value.

These unique books record the 12 830 men and women of the GPO who gave their lives in two World Wars and we are privileged to have looked after them for 58 years. They now move to the BPMA who we know will look after them and continue to maintain this invaluable legacy." Harry Huskisson

The Friends enter an exciting phase

At the AGM of the Friends of the British Postal Museum & Archive, Brian Sole, the Chairman, presented a cheque to Chris Taft, the Head of Collections, for the final instalment of a donation of £5000. This will be used to buy a secure display cabinet for the new Postal Museum, due to open at Calthorpe House in 2017.

With the pending opening of the museum, the BPMA has been renamed The Postal Museum. With this in mind, Friends at the AGM voted to change the name of the organisation to the Friends of The Postal Museum.

Activities organised by the Friends in 2015 were extremely well supported and those proposed for 2016 are already well booked, especially a return visit to Cartor, the arm of International Security Printers based near Paris. The other planned visits include the College of Arms, Apsley House and a return to the London Transport Museum to see the poster collection.

After the AGM, BPMA staff gave an excellent presentation about the development plans for the new museum and especially the spectacular creative design concept for the Mail Rail experience.

Then Julian Stray presented his research on "The Post Office in 1890". This is the story that contrasts the celebration of 50 years of the Penny Post with the substantial staff unrest over pay and conditions at that time.

These are exciting times both for all involved with The Postal Museum and Mail Rail, and for the Friends in supporting and encouraging this major project. One of our October evenings was divided into 2 displays relating to *Guernsey*. Firstly, **Brian Sole** displayed a small section of his major display which he has collected since

1969. The display was an extremely attractive array, mainly of stamps, from the period when Guernsey was occupied from 1940-45. The display included postcards, booklets and airmails, with stamp designed by Robin Ollington, who was contributing the second part. Robin spent 16 years providing designs promoting the Channel Island's tourism, agriculture and philately with each department discussing design and influencing the choices, protocol, printing and approval. For our second October session Marcus Sherwood-Jenkins gave his display on Russia. He focussed on the Russian postal worker and his work. Postmen were shown in

Ferndown & West Moors

Historians of any description, let alone Railway buffs were in for a feast – a treasure trove! -when Peter Pugh displayed his British Mail via the Tran-Siberian Railway, making insightful references to maps of Hong Kong and China. Considering that he had only begun his collection some five years previously, the display was all the more astounding. Our journey began in Vladivostok in May 1891 with the future Nicholas II digging the first sod for the railway track, which was to be built in 6 sections....the final being completed in 1916. Key to the development was Russia's 1898 agreement with China. Building in Siberia was highly problematic with the track having to be laid across swamps, vast forests, rivers and permafrost areas with sparse populations. The completed system allowed for 26 days travel time -Vladivostok to Charing Cross - while the Suez route took 6 weeks. With links between ports via steamers, the new railway linked the world. The display drew together a wealth of philatelic

material – covers, stamps and correspondence, postmarks and censor marks, photos and images of construction workers, railroad, stations and a fine range of locos. Maps with routes, time-tables, icebreakers and shipping added to the story. The second half of the presentation featured the period 1918-1940. Here was a study of the routes then operating, with the wartime delays and diversions. Despite the chaos brought about by conflict, efficiency frequently

prevailed and mails often managed to reach destinations, sometimes using considerable diversions. Main routes included the Holyhead link to Ireland, Liverpool through to New York and Boston, Persia via Hong Kong, the Berlin to Bagdad and the Russia – Finland to Stockholm routes to name but a few. Harrogate

One of the most important aspects of philately is the way that it can be used to portray events in both a historical and social way. Our previous display had been about the social life of a

highly placed Victorian family and this week we were plunged into the horrors of the Biafran Independence War, just over 40 years ago and still strong in the memory of many. **Tony Plombe** from Bingley showed a full grasp of the War and of his material which illustrated its progress through the stamp issues. covers and correspondence, most of it rare or unique. Biafra responded to Nigeria's invasion by launching its own counter-invasion coming within a few miles of the Nigerian capital Lagos before wavering. The Biafrans captured large quantities of currency and stamps from Benin. These stamps including those collected from Post Offices within Biafra were overprinted to give the first Biafran issue. Biafra's first official issue on the 'First Anniversary of Independence' was designed by a Biafran artist and printed in Lisbon, depicting the macabre realities of the War. Both this and the second issue on the 'Second Anniversary' were poorly printed so we saw examples of several errors of colour and position. Tony illustrated the often complex and

clandestine ways that mail was brought into and out of Biafra. Charity stamps and labels were issued to try and raise money to fight both the War and, increasingly, the famine for which this War is often remembered. Towards the end of Tony's display we saw letters describing the horrors that some had gone through. No war can have a happy ending but Tony did stress the lack of reprisals and spirit of reconciliation within Nigeria which felt a sense of shame about the War. Many vears later the leader of the Biafrans was buried with full honours in Nigeria and treated as a hero. Brian Coop



French period of ownership between
1935 and 1948 before transferring back

This together with the propaganda aimed at other 'minority' groups was used by the Nazi party to rally the German people behind the war effort. The power of the Nazi propaganda machine came over very clearly in Tony's presentation.



In his presentation in October, Malcolm Fenning examined the *Postal* history of Scotland from 1591 to 1711. The starting date was chosen as the earliest cover on display was sent in that year to London possibly from Kincardine. On 1st June 1711 the Post Office Act saw the abolition of the Scottish Post Office upon the creation of the General Post Office in London. James VI of Scotland (I of England) extended the post road between London and Berwick to Edinburgh, the King's Post being available to the public from 1635. During the 1660s the post roads in Scotland branched out to Glasgow, Avr and Port Patrick, and to Aberdeen and Inverness. Teasing his audience when introducing his presentation in November, Yamil Kuori asked 'where are the Spanish Antilles?' He quickly stopped any guessing by explaining that they essentially comprised Cuba, Puerto Rico, the Dominican Republic and the Philippine Islands, strategically situated for trading purposes. Yamil went on to show and describe their first postal issues from 1855 to 1865. The postal

history of the Falkland Islands from 1827 to 1945 was the title of the presentation and display given by Michael Roberts later in November. In fact the time span was from 1800 because a highlight among the superb covers shown was the first recorded letter from the Falkland Islands, only recently acquired by Michael. It was sent on 15th February 1800 and arrived in New York on 15th January 1801 (see front cover). There was a record attendance of 210 at the meeting on 10th December at which The Great Britain Philatelic Society celebrated its Diamond Jubilee. The very first meeting of the GBPS was also held at the Royal in December 1955. → 020 7486 1044 Richard West

Box of delights: outstanding find in job lot of albums

Auction houses haven't got the time to give close inspection to what look like routine stamp collections. So imagine the surprise waiting for one lucky buyer who bought a job lot of old albums in a big London auction: when he took the box full of albums home and gave them a closer look he found on the back of a "Gold Coast" page an old British postal order overprinted for use in Gold Coast. King Edward VII British postal orders overprinted for other countries are extremely rare (only 18 are known), so when he made contact with the GB Overprints Society (GBOS) and through them with the Postal Order Society (POS) he agreed to put it in the POS worldwide auction. What was particularly exciting about this item was that the layout of the overprint had never been seen



before and the society's list of known overprint types had to be recast. It is unique. When the auction closed on 8 November 2015 we were very pleased that this remarkable find was successfully sold for £1200, the second highest auction price ever for an overprinted British postal order. This is indeed a good return on the modest sum paid for the old albums in the job lot! Postal Orders are deemed to be postal stationery by the FIP, so can be an interesting part of a country collection.

The lesson to be learned is clear: never dismiss old "schoolchild" albums, as sometimes they contain outstanding gems.

The Stuart Rossiter Memorial Lecture 2015



At the 2015 memorial lecture on Friday 6th November **Ben Palmer FRPSL**, **FRSPC**, **APR** gave a talk entitled: "Theory v. Practice in Postal History". He started by examining why some people collect and some people don't.

He then pointed out that we, Postal Historians, should be thorough in our research — be it for Publication or for Competition entries. He gave examples of publications: a) where the author had not been thorough and had said 'not known' when at least one example was known at the time of publication and more were subsequently found.

b) where the authors had been cautious, pointing out that not everything is or can be known on the subject and that some of the sources conflict. (If that has aroused your curiosity more details, including the examples, are in Ben's PowerPoint presentation which is on the Stuart Rossiter Trust website.) As a Competitor and Judge, Ben is understandably interested in Philatelic Competition. He listed the characteristics of an ideal Philatelic Judge. (Does such a paragon of virtue exist?) He ended with 'Never Give Up' which if nothing else proves that he doesn't bear a grudge, he persevered despite being rejected. After the presentation there was a lively Question and Answer session. Richard Wheatley chaired the meeting, and presented Ben with a souvenir copy of 'Express Mail, After Packets and Late Fees In India Before 1870' by Max Smith and Robert Johnson.

Southern African PS, Joint Conference 2015

For several years a number of philatelic societies specialising in the individual countries of Southern Africa have held a joint conference to share items of common interest. This year was every bit as good as the previous ones. They also took the opportunity to launch a new magazine which covers articles of common interest to the individual societies for Natal, Transvaal, Bechuanaland etc.

The members' displays this year included *South Africa in World War I* (photos, politics, covers), *Bechuanaland provisional overprints*, *Boer War railways*, *looted mail*, and much more. But probably the star item (for me anyway) was **Lars Jorgensen**'s fantastic display of the numerous and complex issues of *Transvaal*, through the various phases as "South African Republic", and "Transvaal" with a good variety of British occupations, local printings, forgeries, and errors. The most fascinating item was a tête-bêche 1 shilling pair, overprinted "VR Transvaal" with the overprint first upright (ie inverted relative to

the stamp) and then inverted (ie to make the overprint upright relative to the stamp): but alas as a single stamp it takes a real expert to know whether a stamp with normal overprint is indeed a normal overprinted stamp or the inverted electro with an inverted overprint. Such is the fun of philately.

As we are deep in the middle of Winter I suppose that it is understandable that the Shackleton issue has been produced and is




appropriate. I hope that here in Yorkshire we will not have this quantity of snowfall or York will be even more damaged by the rising waters as the Spring thaw sets in.




