



Society anniversaries, 2016

According to the date of foundation shown in the societies' information on our records, significant anniversaries include those shown below (though several societies have not let us known their foundation date, so there may be more).

Heartiest congratulations to all involved in these milestones:

Oxford Philatelic Society - 125 years

As part of our celebrations we marked the 80th anniversary of the death of **Frank Bellamy**, who played a key role in the development of the society as its founding Honorary Secretary and Treasurer from 1890 to 1936. Founded in December



Oxford Chairman Stephen Marks at the graveside 1890, at a meeting at which Bellamy took the minutes, the Oxford Philatelic Society has been celebrating its 125th anniversary. Bellamy also helped to establish the Oxford Photographic Society, was an active member of the Ashmolean Natural History Society of Oxfordshire, and contributed significantly to astronomy in his post as an observational astronomer at the Radcliffe Observatory. At St Sepulchre's cemetery, Frank Bellamy's grave is virtually the first you encounter as you walk through the entrance archway. Members of the following groups attended: Oxford Philatelic Society, Friends of St Sepulchre's, Ashmolean Natural History Society of Oxfordshire, and Museum of the History of Science. After several words of thanks for the life of Frank

Bellamy, a wreath was laid.

Petersfield & District - 50 years

In March 1966 a number of collectors planned an inaugural meeting with the intention of forming a Petersfield stamp club. It was held on March 15th 1966 in a back room of the Sun Inn in Dragon Street. Twelve collectors attended and elected: Chairman – **Reggie Dingwall**, Secretary - **Dave Allen**, Treasurer -**Tony Hutchings**, Committee members – **R. Newman** and **J. Gammon**. Membership increased rapidly and after the third meeting a new venue was needed. By the end of the first full year membership had risen to 37. In 1969 annual competitions were inaugurated and the society participated in an exhibition at the Town Hall featuring Arts and Crafts.

The society's first chairman, and later a life member until his death in 2003, **Reggie Dingwall**, held office for four years and guided the committee members with wisdom, ensuring the society's future prosperity. Since then a new chairman has taken office every three years. **David Allen**, founder secretary,

completed 11 years in office and is now president in succession to Reggie Dingwall. The society became affiliated to the British Philatelic Federation (now the Association of British Philatelic Societies) and to the Hampshire Philatelic Federation. We regularly participate in county exhibitions and annual competitions. We have won the Howard White Inter Society Trophy in the Federation's annual competition more than once and individuals have gained success in county and national competitions. In 1973, 1979 and 1996 we hosted the county meeting, now known as Hampex. Membership once exceeded 100 but has now dropped back to 60, with average attendance at meetings of 28. Our first newsletter was issued in April 1970 and the first 'Petersfield Philatelist' in spring 1978. An anniversary lunch is planned for May 19th 2016. *David Allen*

Isle of Man Postal History of 20th Century Internment Mail.

Isle of Man Postal History of 20th Century Internment Mail



A new book, published by the IOM Postal History Society, author **Bernard Osborne**, President of the Castletown Philatelic Society.

The postal history of internment mail with its associated cachets was first highlighted in a series of short publications by **JB Leece** and **R Ward** followed in 1981 by the catalogue of **Dr JT Whitney** and in 1989 a catalogue by **Charles Field**. It has become clear that with much new material coming to the notice of the society it would be of value for this to be made available in a more up to date book, hence this recently published A4 hard back book of 180 pages.

The publication has hundreds of colour illustrations, many never before recorded or illustrated, of cachets, covers and postcards together with valuations (shown as suitable auction estimates), also maps

of both first and second world war camps, paper money and details of each camp. There is a section showing related Isle of Man Post Office issues and comparative numbers with Field, Whitney & the new IOMPHS numbering system.

An Introduction to your new ABPS General Secretary

From the beginning of 2016 **Neil Ritchie** has taken on the role of the General Secretary of the ABPS. Neil has a long philatelic background as he started as a junior member of Harrogate Philatelic Society in the 1960s during the period that his father **Dr G G Ritchie** was President. His father was a keen philatelist being a founder member of the Roses Caribbean PS (now the British West Indies Study Circle) and extensive

writer on the subject of St Lucia. He was also YPA President and signed the YPA roll of distinguished philatelists in 1978. "It was a good way to bond with my father by taking an interest in his main hobby, however he did instil in me that the hobby should be fun but in a serious way".

Subsequently, in a story similar to many collectors, the next years were occupied with education, training to be an architect, marriage and bringing up two children. Around 1985 Neil took up philately again and joined the Sheffield Philatelic Society where he has had the roles of Librarian, President (twice) and Syllabus Secretary (for a long time). A keen speaker, he has previously given displays on Liechtenstein and German Hyper-Inflation Mail but his current collecting and displaying interests are on the subject of Russia in the First World War focussing on the censorship of the mails, the Allied Intervention and the consequential effects of that conflict on some of the surrounding countries such as Latvia, Finland and Poland. Neil says "to balance this eastern approach to World War One I also collect the Canadian Expeditionary Force from 1914-1919. It's surprising how much connectivity there is between the west and eastern spheres of that conflict".

With regards to the general secretary's ABPS role Neil is hoping to bring his love for the hobby and also apply some of his Project Management experience to the task in hand. "I feel that the great amount of help that the ABPS has to offer to the ordinary collector isn't penetrating to the grass root level as effectively as it could. I hope to be able to develop methods of communication using computer technologies, those that many of us take for granted on a daily basis, to the benefit of the philatelic community".

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


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retroReveal - A new technique for detecting faint cancellations

Here is an example of using this free online technology which can be accessed on *http://retroreveal.org/*. This is a new tool hosted by Utah University. Quoting from their website: "The retroReveal Channel Inspector losslessly or nearly losslessly transforms images from a standard RGB colorspace into a variety of other colorspaces. In certain of these spaces, obscure content and even unsuspected features of the object(s) in the image may become starkly clear. Color scientists have created algorithms for transformations between these colorspaces. Image processing scientists and engineers often transform images into these colorspaces to aid "image segmentation" in which the image is segmented into related regions, allowing features of interest to be isolated etc" [Yockman, et al. (2008)].

It can be used for any images including faded old manuscripts, historical artefacts, satellite data and so on. It works best with coloured cancellations in my experience. A whole series of images in the various colourspaces is provided of which a few would be quite revealing. The example used here is one of the most desirable of North Borneo cancellations, the Silam intaglio postal cancellation in red. Using this software more than 20 different images are

provided from which some are revealing as shown here. The image of the lion can be seen very clearly in both positive and negative images as well as the inscription around it. Because it examines the image in layers, one can see the pen cancel as well. This is definitely a very good technique in elucidating faint or unknown cancellations. I hope readers will find it as useful and interesting as I did. Liau Fah Onn

The Friends visit the College of Arms

The Friends of The Postal Museum began their 2016 programme of events on 22nd March with an evening visit to the College of Arms (The Herald's College) in the City of London. A party of 20 (the maximum allowed) assembled in the Earl Marshal's Courtroom and were greeted by **William Hunt**, Windsor Herald, for a tour that included the records library, to which the public are not normally admitted. A splendid selection of the priceless records was brought out for the group to see and Mr Hunt's presentation was both extremely entertaining and informative. Many of these documents date back to late Plantagenet times when the College was incorporated by Richard III. In particular it was a privilege to be shown the original hand written records of the Heralds' Visitations outside London in 16th and 17th centuries to confirm who was entitled to claim and use Arms. These form an invaluable historical document. Mr Hunt also explained and illustrated the process of granting of Arms from the initial petitioning to the issue of Letters Patent. The evening ended with an informal buffet supper with Mr Hunt tirelessly answering questions from the group.

Further visits arranged by the Friends in the coming year include Apsley House in London, the London Transport Museum depot (to see the Poster Collection) and Cartor, part of International Security Printers, near Paris.

This is a very important year for The Postal Museum, as the building work moves towards completion on the new museum complex and the Mail Rail Experience. 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Another Box of delights.

On a wet mid-winter Sunday I drove to a neighbouring town to a stamp fair. Due to incessant rain dealers outnumbered collectors. I came across a 'glory' box of mixed postal history - each item £2! Tongue in cheek I suggested perhaps dear at half the price, the dealer reacted favourably. He WAS having a bad day.

Shortly I found a German postal stationery card commercially used from Constantinople, later sold to a collector for £40. Next a greyish blue card with the address in immaculate handwriting, and postage met by a Queen Victoria $\frac{1}{2}$ d value with perfect Ealing postmark caught my eye. Diagonally across the top left hand corner was a pen drawing of two love birds on a branch. I know little of GB postal history but was drawn to the message. It was from a young lady to her beau. The message said that she was posting the card on the first

day homemade postcards were permitted in the post. I paid my £1. I sent a copy to a member of my 'foreign' society employed by Cavendish. He telephoned suggesting £140 realistic and it was sent for sale. Weeks later my wife answered the telephone and noted my contact called to say the item sold for £240.I was delighted. Weeks later I attended the society weekend and the Cavendish man without mentioning figures enquired if I was pleased, I confirmed I was. He told me the item was sold over the telephone and he handled the bid. The penny failed to drop

and nothing more said. Before the event closed he circulated the Cavendish news letter which was placed in my briefcase. At home that evening the newsletter was read at midnight and the item illustrated on the back page. Then I learnt that my wife noted an incorrect figure. It realised £2400. There are eight such items recorded, the purchaser like me was attracted by the card itself and although he held another considered mine considerably finer.

I still browse through £2 boxes but lightning has yet to strike twice!

Youth and the Future - Philately and Education

I have collected Hungarian stamps and postal history since I was 17, attracted by fine "wallpaper" stamps in a dealer's shop window. I joined the then Magyar, now Hungarian PS in its founding year, 1964, and was soon asked to be magazine editor. I lost the job because the then President did not like an article I wrote about the future needs of younger collectors! I am currently President. Fairly quickly, under the inspiring influence of **Gary Ryan FRPSL**, I found collecting covers more interesting, developing to postal history. I have formed collections of stationery, dues, inflation and now railways, and exhibited nationally and at FIP events.

Hungary's postal history inextricably links to much of central Europe, including two world wars and their outcomes. In 2020 Hungary will remember losing 70% of their nation to its neighbours, including allegedly new ethnically pure successor states that have failed the test of time. Railway philately (tracks, stations, rolling stock and staff) and postage rates, occupations and management changes can become a treatise of history.

Today's children may have far more time on their hands than we ever had. It is our opportunity - except that stamps now serve little beyond basic post and general revenue purposes. Postal history provides a satisfying and rewarding, tactile and non-digital hobby but also a documentary teaching much of the world in which children live and which they sometimes formally study.

I would urge a concerted effort by ABPS, all societies in the handbook, all philatelic publications, to spell this out, supporting existing efforts to involve schools. The National Curriculum requires local study; postal services seem an excellent candidate. The history and geography alone certainly inspired my interest in starting MIDPEX because specialist societies harbour so much of the evidence. Ten years at Tile Hill was an education itself because, as my friend **Michael Goodman** often said, it really did bring the right people genuinely together. We need something similar for the future of our hobby- and urgently if other modern distractions are not to deter us and future collectors.

It's not just "Oldies" who collect stamps

Bev Davies is the new youth officer of the Federation of South Wales Philatelic Societies and runs the stamp club at the Dell Junior School in Chepstow. While our member Erene Grieve is very busy encouraging youth philately throughout the UK, she still finds time as a member of our club to get involved in local activities and is looking for members of all clubs, not only our own society, to recommend schools to visit to promote the hobby.

We had a most successful morning at the Dell School in Chepstow on 10th March, with a group of 60 juniors enthralled by Erene Grieve's introduction to stamp collecting. This was the prelude to the new group joining the stamp club run by Bey Davies. Newport member and youth officer for the Federation of South Wales Philatelic Societies, and assisted by John Perry, secretary of our club and currently chairman of the South Wales Federation.

The knowledge and interest shown by this group of young people was astounding. Although only a couple currently collected stamps, many in their families were philatelists.

As well as listening to Erene and answering questions enthusiastically, the children were able to choose stamps to take home to start a collection and given "Stamp Active" material to enable them to develop their

interest.

The session ended with a guiz. Without giving anything away, Jack Woodman gave the correct answer to the question that Erene posed at the end of the morning. This was to estimate how many stamps were in her ten shilling bag of stamps that she had acquired many years ago. Jack won a prize of a GB presentation pack.

As well as the schools, the club has run sessions in local libraries. While we do not expect youngsters to join our societies, which usually meet in the evenings, we hope that the interest gained will stay with them. As they get older and have more time they may now think

of taking up the hobby actively and secure the future of this fascinating window on the world. John Perry FRPSL

Take care in what you buy for your collection. I recently saw the picture of a cover in a magazine. It was a steam train at Waverley Station, east end, with a nice view of the back of the old GPO and the clock of the Balmoral Hotel (North British in those days). The writing was small on the picture in the magazine but I bought it for my wife as she has postcards, stamps etc of Edinburgh and her Dad was a steam train driver. She was not impressed as the event written on the cover was for something in England. So why is it a picture of Edinburgh? According to the dealer (postal) if we are not happy return it. That is not helpful as it is a nice picture. I asked what was the connection to the event with Edinburgh? That was the best picture of that specific engine we could find. So, in other words they can put anything they want on their covers without much regard for the collectors. With a little thought they could easily have put a note on the insert card – Engine xxx leaving Waverley on its way to Newcastle prior to its record breaking journey to Kings Cross. My guess was they did not even know it was Waverley.



BENJAMIN FRANKLIN Following their success in the UK, postoge stamps were first introduced in America by Benjamin Franklin, and of the Faunding Fothers of the United States, in 1427. A different cover dealer has issued some covers with historically wrong information on them. I quote "A truly remarkable cover that commemorates the history of the postal service in both Britain and the United States. It features Rowland Hill and Benjamin Franklin who are responsible for the introduction of the first postage stamps into each of their respective countries." Bla bla bla, it is yours for only £550. A few facts from a Google search (less than 5 minutes) to confirm my understanding of America. I was well aware that Franklin was one of the negotiators following the War of Independence, more than half a century before the penny black. And at that time he was in ill health and guite old.

Benjamin Franklin:- 17 Jan 1706 – 17 Apr 1790 Rowland Hill:- 3 Dec 1795 – 27 Aug 1879 United Kingdom's 1d Black 1840 ~~USA's first postage stamp 1847

I am not a regular church goer but I'm not a disbeliever. Because of the above I think I will return: Miracles do happen (according to a cover producer).

Rowland Hill is historically credited with being the inventor of the postage stamp. And here is the

miracle, Hill invented the postage stamp and Franklin is credited with getting the postage stamp into America. How? He died 5 years before Hill was born. Yes, Benjamin Franklin was one of the founding fathers and the first Postmaster General of the USA after the war of Independence in 1776. And I agree that the USA first stamp was a 5c with Franklin on it.

From another cover in the same Magazine – "the cover features Benjamin Franklin, who introduced stamps in America following their success in the UK " - A brilliant achievement after being dead for 57 years. Richard Catto

GB Officials and how they were subjected to abuse. Lebanon and South African Bantustans. David **Turner** showed *Numbers on the* Maltese Cross and explained why number 4 is scarce, probably because in the Post Office Headquarters the franking clerk would have been sitting next to the external door, a position which would have been cold and draughty! Our President Les Gwilliam has always been very modest when asked about his collection, but on President's Evening he surprised us with the high quality and detailed knowledge of his Indian States material under the heading All Things Indian. Lorraine Maguire gave us a very lively display of covers under The Story of New Zealand Soldiers in WWII. She is a New Zealander who has lived in England for many years and parts of her presentation related directly to her late father, who had served in the war. John Hawkes who is chairman of the North Herts Stamp Club, gave us a display of Singapore which started from 1948 when the first stamps were issued, previous issues having fallen

under Straits Settlements. At that point Singapore was a crown colony. He traced the subsequent issues through full independence to the present day. John displayed some interesting covers including one of a Concorde aeroplane half owned by Singapore Airlines and British Airways, where the port side showed the livery of Singapore while the British livery was on starboard.

Basildon

After our January Thematic Night when four members displayed we set off to far-flung parts.

We started with British Post Offices in the Gulf - Overprints on King George VI and Queen Elizabeth II with Barrie Cook, whose encyclopaedic knowledge gave us a good insight into the various Great Britain issues that were used to establish postal services in the rapidly-growing principalities of eastern Arabia. Then we went with Jeremy Gaskell to Borneo & Sarawak. He began with an entertaining introduction to the four territories, peppered with anecdotes. He went into the early issues of Brunei and the issues of the Crown Colony of Labuan, then moved on to North Borneo and finished with the White Raiahs (and Ranee) of Sarawak. He emphasised the benefits of a philatelic library, displaying a wide range of books on the history and culture of the island. We returned home via West Africa in the company of Arthur Ritchen calling in at Gambia, Ghana, Nigeria and Sierra Leone, then the French colonies of French Guinea, Ivory Coast, French West Africa, Mauritania, Senegal and Togo. This was a fascinating evening

with many issues never before seen at the club displayed in full. After all that travelling we were pleased to stay at home for March with a Discussion

In March Hugh Jefferies MBE took us through The Life and Times of Stanley Gibbons. In the first session, Hugh told the story of the life of Edward Stanley Gibbons, born June 21st 1840 in Plymouth. In 1870 he moved to Clapham Common, South London. Here the business employed young women to make up packets of stamps. The business also had many gentleman callers and, not understanding 'stamp collecting', the neighbours began to guestion the nature of the business conducted at the premises. In 1890, the SG business was sold to Charles Phillips of Birmingham for £25 000, and Edward retired. Hugh's talk included extracts from the Stanley Gibbons scrapbook which included photographs, memorabilia and a Victorian Mulready envelope. In his private life Edward

came close to rivalling Henry VIII but only had five wives. His death in 1913 was shrouded in mystery. It was rumoured he had died in the arms of a young lady at the Savoy Hotel and was subsequently transported in a rolled carpet to his nephew's house near Piccadilly where his death was officially recorded. For the second session Hugh concentrated on the history of the SG catalogues and talked about future developments. The talk was illustrated with a fine array of SG catalogues representing many years of progress and development. The meeting concluded with a question and answer session. One member asked why Ireland was included in the Commonwealth and British Empire Catalogue? History had some bearing but Hugh pointed out that the Irish had never objected! Roddv Owen

An extraordinary range of unusual covers formed the basis of Charles Leonard's display of Russian Overseas Mail. It was a real eye opener to have explained with the examples on show, the huge variations in the way overseas mail to and from Russia was processed and paid for, with allocations of postal rates to the various countries en-route. Several rate and procedural changes took place during the period with new Treaties every few years - a philatelist delight or perhaps nightmare. Charles closed with a frame of Registered Mail bearing various marks and handling methods, and finally with a couple of postcards following the final postal rate change introduced with the GPU requirements bearing half the new 2¹/₂d letter rate of 1¹/₄d. We started with an 11¹/₂d rate in 1852, and closed with a 2¹/₂d letter rate in 1875!

Czechoslovak

Rex Dixon presented *Czechoslovakia in 1939* to 11 members. He showed the dismemberment of Czechoslovakia following the Sudetenland crisis of the previous year. Poland and Hungary occupied areas on the borders, Slovakia gained independence, the Carpatho-Ukraine region also declared its independence before Hungary occupied it. The development of the postmarks as the language of the rulers changed was shown, along with further refinements of the border, such

as the Hungarian claim for a slither of Slovakia overlooking a strategic railway, which the German agreed to despite a recently signed treaty between Germany and Slovakia. The second half covered the development of the postal services for Bohemia and Moravia. The gradual alignment with German rates was clearly illustrated. The display ended with the movement of further land from Poland into Slovakia in the Teschen area. We were impressed by Rex's knowledge of the name changes, often over short periods. Finding such items required quite an encyclopaedic memory.

The Forces Postal History

We are pleased to announce that the "Harry Cope Memorial Award for Literature" for 2015 has been awarded jointly to the authors of two publications:

Colin Tabeart for *British West African Mail Packets to 1900, (Rates, Routes and Ships, Out and Home)* and **Nick Colley** and **Ian Muchall**, Editors of *Censorship in the Royal Air Force 1918-1956, 2nd Edition.*

Colin is the current Editor of the Forces Postal History Society Journal and has been since 2005. His book describes the Packet mails, i.e. those carried under contract, between West Africa and Europe over a span of more than fifty years. The first official Packet service to West Africa was in 1848 and used vessels of the Royal Navy whose crews were mainly on anti-slavery patrols at the time. RAF Censorship publication is a first for the FPHS, being the first entirely electronic-only publication. Dr Nick Colley and Ian

Muchall have spent the last 12 months re-writing the classic RAF censor book, Colley & Garrard, of 1993. In response to collector needs of seeing more covers and those covers in colour they have included lots of illustrations and, thanks to its electronic format, they have included all known recordings for each censor number. For the benefit of country collectors each censor type is also broken down by country, with each censor type having its own chapter (pdf file). As in the 1st Edition, there are brief discussions of geographical and recorded usage, updated where required after an extra 22 years of recordings. The entire publication is in the region of 71MB in size (about 370-380 pages) and being in electronic format it is easy to update information by simply providing a replacement chapter. It is believed that this is a new concept for postal history publications, and if kept up-to-date through an easy delete and replace process such a publication will always remain current. → www.forcespostalhistorysociety.org. uk Michael Dobbs

Do local philatelic societies have a future?

At last year's Congress I posed the question "Do local philatelic societies have a future?" Based on the demographics of the hobby I concluded that, in many cases not, but that if we worked hard and were open to change another twenty to thirty years was possible for a significant minority. I'm not looking at collectors under the age of fifty; they are generally not "joiners". Concentrate on retaining current members and attracting those about to be or recently retired who affectionately remember their school stamp clubs and no longer have the capacity to chase a football.

So here are a few ideas;

Are you making it easy for your existing or potential members to attend meetings? Stairs, lack of public transport, dingy and cold meeting rooms, make an evening at home watching Sky Sports a tempting alternative. If necessary, actively look for a new warm, welcoming, venue, preferably with a bar. If it costs more, so what? I don't know of a philatelic society which has run out of money, but of plenty which have run out of members.

Also, has the time come to hold meetings during the day? This may not suit everyone (the biggest obstacle appears to be looking after grandchildren) but personal experience in helping to set up two new daytime clubs has convinced me that this is the way forward. I may have fallen lucky but local Liberal and Conservative clubs respectively with ground floor facilities and in wonderfully convenient locations have been happy to provide meeting rooms for free in exchange for modest lunchtime bar takings. And why not meet throughout the year? I see no logic in shutting up shop from May to October.

Look at your organization. Clearly the more members involved in running the club the better, but two or three enthusiastic hard workers is sufficient. A large committee which cannot even agree a date upon which to meet is a recipe for disaster. I know of one club still obsessed with filling the post of Deputy Librarian; no-one has used the library for at least two years. Although it helps, your officials don't need to be expert philatelists – far better that they work well together and are enthusiastic. Potential members respond positively in a friendly, well organized environment. If the officials appear glum and disorganized do I really want to join?

Offer a programme of events which appeals to all levels of collector. Displays from eminent speakers are fine, but include quizzes, treasure hunts, more members' nights, brains trusts, competitions which anyone can enter, as well. Make it a social event if that's what the members want. Or if this is anathema, continue with "serious" meetings on an evening and launch something new (and please call it a "stamp club") during the day.

Let the outside world know you are there. There are thousands of collectors out there who, we know, would love to join a philatelic society. Bombard your local press with well-crafted press releases about things you have done and are going to be doing in the next few months. Ensure you are in every local listing. Swamp the town with fliers. Make sure you have an up-to-date website (absolutely essential!) and you are linked to as many others as possible. Send everyone you know who may be vaguely interested an email about your forthcoming meetings on a regular basis. Invite other clubs to your meetings (if there's a display of local postal history invite the local history society). Build up a good relationship with the local U3A group. Ask the organizer of your nearest stamp fair to give you a free table. Run a raffle offering as a prize a locally used penny red cover (cost £5). Anyone entering has to give you their contact details. Bingo, an instant database of maybe fifty new members.

And that's just a few random thoughts in the limited space allowed by your editor. There's a future for local societies if we're prepared to be flexible, imaginative and welcoming, but, I'm afraid, not much of one if we're not.

The ABPS Congress Medal for 2016 Awarded to Jean P Osborne

Throughout her life Jean Osborne has done all she can to pass on her own love of the hobby to others and has consistently worked hard for the benefit of philately. In her local society, Falkirk Philatelic Society, she has held a number of offices and is currently the Packet Secretary having taken on that role in 1973. She has also found time to help run the Comely Park Primary School stamp club since 2008. Her responsibilities to the Association of Scottish Philatelic Societies (ASPS) include Assistant to the National Exhibition Secretary from 2008 to date. This means she is heavily involved, particularly in the exhibition side and judging. Of particular note is the fact that she instigated the adoption of the Cinderella Class into the ASPS Annual Exhibition.

Jean plays a full part in the philatelic life of Scotland and is always there when work is to be done including serving on the Committee of the biennial Dundee Philatelic Weekend and plays a full part in every aspect of the event.

However, it is for her special work involving long term commitment and the expenditure of a great deal of time that makes Jean a worthy recipient of the Congress Medal for 2016. This work is on behalf of the Invalid and Lone Collectors Society (ILCS). Due to either distance (living in a remote area) or to illness or disability members of the ILCS are prevented from attending club meetings. Instead, contact is maintained by means of their unique magazine titled 'The Philatelic Circulator'. Members write articles and send these to the Editor. The Editor then interspaces these articles with a number of blank pages and sends everything off in a special binder. Each recipient has several days to read the articles and write their "comments" on the blank sheets then post it on to the next member in the list. When the magazine gets back to the Editor, the individual entries are returned to the authors and the "comments" sheets are recirculated with the next available magazine. Jean joined the ILCS in 1973, edited The Philatelic Courier from 1981 to 1995 and is the current Secretary and Treasurer. This voluntary work of real commitment is in an area which is not widely known. Incidentally ILCS is the only honorary ABPS member society.

Jean Osborne is a truly worthy recipient of the Congress Medal which will be presented to her at the ABPS Congress in Cambridge in July. She was nominated by the Caledonian Philatelic Society and Largs & District Stamp Club.


