Society anniversaries, 2017

According to the date of foundation shown in the societies' information on our records, significant anniversaries include those shown below (though several societies have not let us known their foundation date, so there may be more).

Heartiest congratulations to all involved in these milestones:

'The 70 year History of 'The Great Yarmouth Stamp Club'

The Club started life in 1947 when a few like-minded stamp collectors got together, and under the Secretaryship of Mr Alf Hedges, formed a club. The first meetings were held in the old Great Yarmouth Library opposite the east foot of the Haven Bridge over the River Yare – very appropriate as Alf was the chief librarian. In 1962 a new library was built behind the Toll House, (dating from 1362), and the club quickly moved to these new premises. However in about 1981 the building was redesigned as 'open plan', and so became unsuitable for our meetings. Still keeping with the theme of using libraries, we moved to the Gorleston Library situated in Gorleston town centre over the River Yare and just south of Great Yarmouth. During this period we were the most easterly stamp club in England beating Lowestoft by about 100yds. Today we are happily ensconced in the spacious, clean, quiet and very pleasant surroundings of the Cobholm Community Centre, ironically only about 500 yards away from our original home of 1947.

Our membership has never been huge but it has always been extremely loyal and knowledgeable, and we are extremely proud of our club. Among our membership we boast members of various specialist societies, study groups, authors of philatelic literature, national competition winners and one Fellow of the Royal Philatelic Society London. We are and have always been a very friendly club, welcoming new members and guests, and very willing to share our knowledge with those who ask.

We remain a 'Stamp Club' as opposed to a 'Philatelic Society' after a number of unsuccessful proposals to change our name. We are a Club and proud of it. The attendance at meetings, which averages around 75% of the total club membership, reflects the interest and loyalty. About 10% of our members also give displays and talks to clubs and societies throughout East Anglia and beyond.

Unlike many clubs we don't have a break during the summer, and we meet on many of the minor Bank Holiday Mondays, thus ensuring a continual programme for our members of about twenty-three to twenty-five meetings a year.

I think our future looks bright, but this is only due to the enthusiasm and willingness of the members to take part and talk about the many and varied subjects which form part of the wonderful and fascinating hobby of Stamp Collecting. Bernard Mabbett, Secretary

Newport & Gwent Philatelic Society – Celebrates 70 Years

On 16th October 1947 a meeting was held at 221 Caerleon Road Newport "by kind permission of Mr [Graham] Meaker" to discuss the formation of a society for stamp collectors. The name of the society adopted by the 14 people present that evening was the Newport (Mon) Philatelic Society. In 1974 the society changed its name to the Newport and Gwent Philatelic Society to reflect local government changes. Despite further re-organisation, the name has remained unchanged ever since. Having met at several locations, the club finally settled into rooms at

the Civic Centre in Newport in 1987. The club prides itself on being friendly and outgoing. It has organised several stamp shows, the first being in 1951. As a founder member in 1971 of the Federation of South Wales Philatelic Societies, the club has hosted both the Annual Convention and Autumn fairs. It has an extensive visiting programme with other societies in South Wales and South West England. It also runs a club at The Dell primary school in Chepstow. As a prelude to the 70th anniversary, the club will be involved in the ABPS Congress in Cardiff in July 2017 and will host the South Wales Federation Autumn Stamp and Postcard Fair on 23rd September 2017 at the Graig Community Centre, Bassaleg, Newport, NP10 8HZ.

Postcrossing

I first learned about Postcrossing when I received a copy of the pair of Guernsey 2016 stamps which simply said "Happy Postcrossing" on them. So, I Googled what it was about, and found that several stamp issuing authorities had released stamps to promote their interest in this new 'social craze'. I

then found that Guernsey had already issued a single stamp on this theme in 2014.

Postcrossing is a social craze that allows anyone so inclined to send and

then receive postcards through the mail from random people and places round the

world. It was started in July 2005, when Paolo Magalhâes set up a website for the purpose. In April 2008, the millionth postcrossing postcard was sent, the total is now over 40 million, with some 438,000 in transit at the present time. The total mileage covered by all these postcards at the end of February was 126,039,192,028 miles! As shown in the examples above, stamp issuing authorities have released commemorative stamps to help (cash-in on) this hobby. Similarly, some postcard companies now print specific postcards, and some produce pre-stamped and pre-cancelled maxicards.


An extensive database maintains records of all its members and their activities,

and sends regular information to its members. It works very simply:

- 1. Register your details on the website
- 2. Request a name and address and receive a postcard ID
- 3. Send a postcard to that address
- 4 Receive a postcard from another postcrosser
- 5. Register the postcard ID you have received.
- 6. Start again at No 2. (You can have up to five postcards in circulation at any one time). Chris Wheeler


The ABPS Awards of Merit

The ABPS Awards Committee was disappointed that only one nomination for the Award of Merit was received despite the Committee reviewing the Guidelines and making it easier to make a nomination as the nominee has to demonstrate outstanding voluntary service to British philately at one level only, either local, regional or specialist society instead of giving service at all three levels. In addition Friends of ABPS as well as societies affiliated to ABPS can make a nomination.

The requirement that the nominee is still active in giving voluntary service was waived this year and Dennis Firth was awarded the ABPS Award of Merit posthumously – nominated by the Leeds Philatelic Society.

The Leeds Society very much regrets that it was dilatory in making the nomination. Other societies and federations are urged not to leave it too late.

The ABPS Congress Medal for 2017



This year it goes to John Baron, nominated by the North Western Federation. This was extremely well deserved as John has been involved with organised philately for many years. In 2008 he was appointed to the ABPS Executive Committee taking over the chair in 2009. He was an integral part of the Festival of Stamps 2010 visiting every Federation in the year, and so became the first Chairman to do the task. He was a key member of the Festival of Stamps organising committee working with the representatives of the Post Office and Postal Museum. He is also a member of the Postal Advisory Council and represents the ABPS in this role. He ran the ABPS website for 5 years.

After 2010 John looked at the ABPS Directory and Speakers lists which were out of date and required full revision. John set about updating the information, both in the directory and on the website. One of his main concerns was that the overall constitution was out of date and as a qualified company secretary he took on the arduous task of rewriting the constitution which was adopted in 2014.

In regard to Federations, one of his biggest contributions has been with the East Midlands and East Anglia Federation in their reorganisation to the Mid-Anglia Federation. He has signed the roll of distinguished North Western Philatelists for his contribution to that Federation and is now its President.

In 1991 John was elected to the committee of Thatcham Philatelic Society, a position he holds to date, and was Chairman from 2001 until 2009. He was one of the members of that society who suggested that the society ran a major



stamp fair in 2000 and this has become the successful 'WestBex', organised by a dedicated committee with John playing an integral part.

John Baron has shown all the qualities required for the award and the ABPS is delighted to make the award of the ABPS Congress Medal to him for 2017.

News from the Executive

Rufus Barnes says: Since my appointment as Vice Chairman with responsibility for Federations I have been concentrating on liaising with the Federations on the availability of competition judges in their areas. The provision of judges able to judge at local and federation level is one of the most important things we do, for local societies in particular. ABPS has sensed the list in the ABPS handbook is out of date and my enquiries have confirmed this showing that some parts of the country have a serious shortage of qualified judges. We will be urgently considering how to respond to this with some training and refresher sessions being organised around the country. I have not been involved in the reborn Inter-Federation Competitions as Chris King and his colleagues have done a good job on this so it would be unhelpful for me to interfere.

Graham Winters is looking forward to Congress and taking up the reins.

Rhodesia and Nyasaland Postal Rates—*Collated and Edited by J B Horne* Published by the author from 16 St Peter's Mount, Exeter EX4 2JD at £10 (plus $\pounds 4 p \& p$) ISBN: 0-949000-05-1

One of the challenges when faced with a cover is to determine the rates paid by the stamps or other markings, or indeed whether the correct postage has been affixed. It can be a laborious task checking sources for information on rates.

In this work Barry Horne has brought together information relating to the territories generally known as 'Rhodesia and Nyasaland'. To detail the coverage, it is: BSAC, Rhodesia and Southern Rhodesia from 1892 to 1953 (with Bechuanaland from 1885 to 1891); Northern Rhodesia from 1891 to 1953; British Central Africa and Nyasaland from 1891 to 1953; Federation of Rhodesia and Nyasaland from 1953 to 1963; Rhodesia from 1963 to 1978; Zimbabwe from 1978 to 2015.

The author has gathered the information, which includes both surface and airmail rates, from several sources, arranging the listings in tabular form using a 'landscape' format, thus making it easier to follow. In some instances, information is still sought, especially for Malawi and Zambia since independence, and some of the more recent rates from Zimbabwe. The author welcomes input from others.

For those specialising in this part of Africa, this will prove an invaluable work and, at only £10, will repay its cost time and time again by saving time in endless research. *Richard West*

Cliff Garside 1942-2016

With great sadness the death of Cliff Garside was announced.

Cliff had worked tirelessly for ABPS and was made an Honorary Vice-President when he was no longer as actively involved. Robert talked about the Falkland Islands, being a member of the Falkland Islands Study Group. The evening was a wonderful reminder of Cliff and the pleasure that he gained from philately.

Alan Drysdall RDP, RDPSA, FRPSL – 1933 to 2017

Alan was born in Southampton in 1933 and obtained his Doctorate in Geology at Southampton University in 1957.

He worked in southern Africa and became a philatelic expert and prolific writer for the Rhodesia, Transvaal and Natal Study Circles. He returned to Southampton after he retired and became an active member of the Southampton & District Philatelic Society, serving both as President for a number of years and Convenor of the afternoon meetings.

A Fellow of the Royal Philatelic Society London, he signed the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists both here and in South Africa. Alan displayed at many international exhibitions, and amongst his awards

was a Gold Medal for his Transvaal collection.

David Sumpter took us to Gibraltar in January. He started with pre-stamp cancels, including the Arc cancel. demonstrated on an 1838 entire to London, Gibraltar initially used British stamps, cancels were an upright G. The first stamps marked Gibraltar were ordered in 1885, but were late arriving, so the colony had to overprint some Bermuda stamps instead. A visit from Ashford Philatelic Society in early February brought a wide variety of material. Ray Barton showed some Hand-illustrated covers. mostly views of Kent, posted from Kennington to Ontario. He was followed by Graham **Saxby** giving us a view of his *Modern* GB collection. Bob Carr showed Rhodesia, particularly focusing on British postal treatment of the Southern Rhodesia issues of the 1960s unrecognised by Britain, so marked postage due. Subsequently the British Post Office even printed a special postage due label for the occasion, also shown. At another meeting Geoff Hanney offered an in-depth presentation on Haiti, of which the first known item - sadly not in his collection - came from a fellow traveller of Christopher Columbus. Haiti has the distinction of being the first black republic, declaring its independence from France in 1804. 

King George VI Collectors

At our Spring meeting Rod Vousden opened with a display of WWII Military Honour Envelopes, printed for the different Army Commands - at home, in North Africa and in India - to reduce the load of censorship. Peter Cockburn presented BMA Malaya postal history and usage, especially of stationery. Shortage of paper had a major impact, thus Peter's large collection includes lots of recycled items of both resurrected stationery. hidden during the occupation, and defaced Japanese items. In particular, the pre-war 2c stamped printed postcards were obsolete but paper was too precious for them to be thrown away. Roger Harrison brought the Occupied Italian Colonies in Africa with a set of covers sent home from an Officer serving in Eritrea to his wife in Hove, Brighton. An interesting feature was that they showed marks from the Transorma sorting machine in use in Brighton. Mike Axe showed some acquisitions from the auction of Graham Cooper's collection including the varieties and flaws on Kuwait Festival High Values and Falklands Islands Dependencies ("South Poke"). Finally Don Brookfield had put together A pot pourri of material. This included card mounted with 1951 Festival of Britain George VI Stamps from the printers, Harrison, but inscribed "By Appointment to HM Queen Elizabeth II". Finally he showed a nice cover with the cachet of French Committee for Liberation addressed to

Spring STAMPEX 15th-18th February 2017

With more than 450 frames in competition and on display, this was one of the largest competitive springtime exhibitions for a long time.

The special attraction on this occasion was a once in a lifetime collection of exhibits showing material from the former Ottoman Empire. The idea for the theme was developed by Freddy Khalastchy and the late Francis Kiddle, with support later from the ABPS Exhibitions and International Committee.

The theme of the Ottoman Empire created interest in the non-philatelic press with articles in *The Jewish News* (an online and London Jewish Daily), the *AI Sabah Newspaper* in Baghdad, and *the AI-Arab* (London's biggest Arabic language newspaper).

The Turkish Postal Museum participated with five frames showing a selection of material from their museum from both the classic and modern period.

Amazing collections of rare material seldom seen in London drew philatelists to the frames, even those written up in Arabic. Several exhibitors had been particularly busy. Freddy Khalastchy displayed 49 frames of *Iraq 1918-1958*, showing all the stamps that were issued during that time, while Joseph Hackmey showed fifteen exhibits covering aspects of the Ottoman Empire in the Holy Land, Istanbul, Anatolia, Bulgaria, European Turkey, former Yugoslavia, Greece, Iraq, Lebanon, Libya, Syria, and the Black Sea.

Prominent visitors to the exhibition included the Ambassador of the Republic of Iraq, Dr Salih Husain Ali, and the Ambassador of The Republic of Turkey, Mr Abdurrahman Bilgiç.

More than 90 exhibits competed as well as eight in the Philatelic Literature Class. Several philatelists showed their material in the non-competitive section.

The Awards Ceremony took place on the Saturday, immediately after an excellent presentation by **Chris Harman** on *Collecting and Exhibiting Revenues*, using illustrations from his exhibit with probably the greatest variety of material in one exhibit, including silver spoons with tax imprint.

The very high standard was evident as the Organising Committee ran out of Large Gold rosettes—not a common occurrence. The awards were 27 Large

Gold medals, 22 Gold medals, and 15 Large Vermeil medals. The award of 'Best in Show' went to **Tarik Alireza** for his Postal History exhibit, *Saudi Arabia: Development of The Ottoman Postal Service (1801-1919).*

Two new books, published by the Royal Philatelic Society London, were both awarded Large Gold medals, **Brian Trotter**: Southern African Mails, Routes, Rates and Regulations 1806-1916, and **Freddy Khalastchy**: Baghdad in British Occupation - The Story of the 1917 Provisional Stamps.

Michael Thompson gets Bill Hart Award



New Stamp Album from Kidstamps


