Ladies and Gentlemen

So, where have I got to with my three main aims?

Well, I suppose the honest answer is not far yet!

I have spoken to a lot of people about the best way forward and I have made some progress, at least in my own head, about establishing a "steering group" to guide the work of the executive committee.

I have discussed finances with several experts about raising more money, and I hope to be able to bring a proposal to the executive soon. We have received one generous donation of £1000 from a famous philatelist to help us forward. Of course, the ABPS would welcome any further donations, but we really must work to help ourselves.

I have been concentrating my efforts on developing ideas for a National Stamp Day. Initially, I would like to ask every philatelic society in the country to designate a meeting at the beginning of May to be their Stamp Day meeting. If possible, to make a special event of that meeting. This would not mean huge changes in the first instance, but I would like to build on this by accepting the 6th May as British National Stamp Day. I would like to see a regular issue of stamps to celebrate it, which would, over a number of years, illustrate key events, people and places in our history. I would like to know what you think. What would you like to see depicted on these stamps?.... let me know.

I am sure our editor will publish as many of your views as he can.

I believe that establishing a National Stamp Day would go quite a long way towards helping the image of our hobby but we need to get word of what we do and what we can offer onto social media and other modern methods of communication. Any ideas or offers of help here would be most welcome.

As we go to press, I have just been informed of the resignation of our Vice President Rufus Barnes, for personal reasons. I would like to take this opportunity of thanking Rufus for his work for ABPS, especially his chairmanship of the Cambridge Congress in 2017 which was such a stunning success. I wish him well and hope that he will stay in touch with the executive committee; his views will always be welcome.

I will look forward to giving details of the appointment of a new Vice Chairman and a Federations Liaison Officer in my next Chairman's message.

My main hope is that we will see many different participants as the years go by. The individual entries and displays were equally interesting and showed that there is much that I can learn from seeing the material, the work done and the different forms of presentation. Many thanks to all concerned.

The attendance at Stampex seemed to me to be good despite the bomb incident at Parsons Green though that might have affected the number of children who came to the Saturday Quiz and Auction. It is unfortunate but understandable that the Autumn Stampex is not at schools' half-term break unlike the February Spring Stampex. I am sure that it affects the number attending as so many youngsters who might otherwise want to come are involved in sports, music, cultural and other activities connected with the school term and so cannot find the time or persuade their parents to allow them to visit Islington.

One cry which we hear repeatedly is the difficulty of persuading new members to join our societies. I hope that the efforts and achievements of



the Leeds society (see page 18) will inspire others to try something similar or completely different. Unfortunately I was unable to visit them as their day was during Stampex when I was in London. Sharing ideas is one of the ways in which we can help each other.

Over the last two years I have been including the list of amendments to the ABPS Handbook of Societies and Speakers. We know that there were a number of errors and omissions but hope that the majority of those are now clarified. The amendments now seem to me to be as expected—in other words changes in personnel as some officers retire and others take over. Society anniversaries, 2017

Heartiest congratulations to all involved in these milestones:

Kingston upon Thames and District Philatelic Society 90th Anniversary

Our celebrations for the 90th anniversary began with a Luncheon at Berrylands Hotel on 27th September 2017.

Our first Book of Society Minutes commences "A meeting was held at The Lodge, St James' Road, Kingston-on-Thames, on Monday October 24th 1927 at 8.30 p.m. with the object of forming a Philatelic Society." 25 persons attended including Mrs Dibben, a stamp dealer in Kingston on Thames for 60 years. It was agreed to form the Society with Mr H R Harmer FRGS elected as President and Mrs Dibben as Secretary and Treasurer.

We have 40 members and meet twice per month at the Surbiton Library Hall on the first Thursday and third Friday, from 8pm to 10pm. The varied programme of visiting speakers and members' evenings remains popular with the addition of joint auctions, a competition night and a Christmas Social. A packet circulates and a Newsletter is issued 4 times per year.

Kingston PS is affiliated to ABPS and the Federation of Surrey Philatelic Societies. In 2011, 2014 and 2017 we organised a successful Stamp Fair in Claygate Village Hall at which the Federation's AGM and Competitions were held.

The 70th Anniversary of the South African Collectors' Society - www.southafricacollector.com



The Society was formed circa October 1947 by Eric Sherwood from Sale in Manchester. Eric was a specialist dealer of South Africa and a well-known figure in the stamp trade. He passed away at a ripe old age in January 1987.


At first the members circulated a 'News folder' but that became impractical as



the membership progressed to three figures. In January 1953 the first society journal was published called The Springbok. It is still going strong after 60+ years. For almost 40 years it was a bi-monthly publication and then from 1993 became a quarterly journal. Issue No 339 was published in August 2017. Eric Sherwood promoted and advertised the society in The South African Philatelist starting in October 1949 and this 'PR' exercise continued to the end of

December 1972. In January 2014 a society website came 'online' and has been developed into a valuable source of information, especially a section entitled 'Collect Southern Africa'.

The website includes an index to all its journals The Springbok and there is an extensive list of the society's comprehensive library. Regular meetings are held in the North and the South plus a Philatelic weekend in May/June in the Midlands. Each vear in November it hosts an Annual Southern Africa Philatelic Conference which is already in its 16th year. This important annual event is open to all the various societies with an interest in Southern Africa philately. On the Saturday there are invited displays and on Sunday morning anyone is welcome to present a short display. The Conference ends on Sunday afternoon with a 'live' auction. The 70th Anniversary is being celebrated



by a customised webpage that may be accessed from our Home page, also a sixteen page Special (Souvenir) Edition of The Springbok has been published and may be downloaded free in PDF format from our website.

By 1954 the society boasted 229 members and nowadays it is in the region of 130. There is no pomp and ceremony and the society is run in a casual and friendly manner...thus if anyone has an interest in this area of collecting they ought to consider joining. The current annual subscription is UK £18, Europe £22 and Overseas £25. There is a PDF option for a mere £10 per year. it every success in the future. Mrs Sheila Sinclair gave the Vote of Thanks to all who had organised the wonderful evening.



Poole and Bournemouth's 50th Anniversary Evening

Special Inter-club event - Alice in Wonderland and beyond by Paul Leonard, FRPSL

This was a memorable evening, starting with a most enjoyable meal at the local

hostelry, where members met the evening's speaker and enjoyed some premeeting time together. Meanwhile other members had arranged the club's room ready for the display, but also with "50" flags, and tables for the raffle prizes, refreshments and club archive material - an exciting sight as members from the club and visitors from neighbouring clubs arrived. Paul had tailored his talk with A4 sheets explaining his display, but specially prepared with the club's logo

and presentation title on them, a very pleasing effort appreciated by everyone. There were five sections to his talk, all most interesting and entertaining, and so well presented. In essence because the Post Office would not consider a commemorative issue for Lewis Carroll, Gerald King decided to do his own. But using the basic design and history of the regular GB stamps, he went one better with his Wonderland stamps in Winks values (40 Winks making a Golden

Slumber)! implying that his issues were released before the GB ones, and so the GB ones were copied from his designs. Hence the first 1d black was issued on 5th May 1840, the first Mulready in 1862, and so on. His humour expanded into the production of Alice stamps and covers mimicking those of the Post Office in all aspects of the Post. Examples were shown from his and Gerald King's collection, of a wide range of interesting items including flaws, forgeries, different watermarks, rarities, specimens, overprints, different papers and inks, cardia

envelopes, printers waste and reprints. Not stopping there, we saw examples of burnt covers, crash covers, salt water damaged covers, and more.

A third dimension to all this was the mimicry of the story of Alice reproduced in all these examples, so there were bantam stamps for when Alice grew smaller, emergency inflation stamps for when she got larger, the Scowling Boys of New Zealand instead of the

Smiling Boys, the cracked plates, cat in the tree and cucumber stamps. There was humour and imagination everywhere. A further dimension was that due to the now high value of lots of these items, many are being sent to the expertising committee, of which Paul is a member, and he was able to explain some of the processes used to verify, or otherwise, stamps submitted for appraisal. The chairman thanked Paul on behalf of everyone, presented him with a special Alice Certificate, asked a few questions about how the production was funded and marketed, and then members were able to study the material, ask lots of further questions, and finally enjoy the raffle and refreshments. All the raffle prizes were Alice in Wonderland sheets, stamps or covers, directly relating to the evening's talk.

Ringwood Philatelic Society Celebrates 50 Years

In September 1967 having just finished delivering programmes to publicise the Ringwood Carnival, three members of the Ringwood Musical & Dramatic Society were chatting and refreshing themselves at the Crown Hotel in Ringwood and somehow the discussion got round to stamp collecting and they were amazed that they all had an interest in this wonderful hobby. The three were **Gillian Habbin**, **Rowan Brockhurst** and the late **Walter (Wally) Crumb**. It was then that they decided to start a philatelic society. On the 16th November 1967 an inaugural meeting was held at the Greyfriars Community Centre at Ringwood with Rowan Brockhurst in the chair and 16 excited potential members

in attendance and so Ringwood Philatelic Society was formed and has continued to progress over the past fifty years.

For the past 15 years the Society has held its own annual stamp and postcard fair "Ringpex" drawing collectors into Greyfriars from a wide geographical area. Two of its members have been honoured with a Fellowship from the Royal Philatelic Society of London and several have competed in competitions at County, National and International level.

The Society meets on the second Tuesday of every month except in August and some of the finest collections have been displayed by some of the country's greatest philatelists.

On November 24th the Society will be holding a special dinner at Greyfriars, its home for the past fifty years, to celebrate and look forward to the next fifty years. Both founder members Gillian Habbin and Rowan Brockhurst will be attending.

A Stamp Roadshow Success

After several weeks of detailed planning members of Leeds Philatelic Society organised a highly successful Stamp Roadshow, Over 100 adults and 30 children visited the event at Leeds Central Library, on Saturday 16th September between 10.00 and 5.00. The colourful, varied and "non-specialised" displays drew many comments from the visitors who expressed their surprise at the many different ways the world of stamps could be explored. The activity table for children was an integral and popular part of the Roadshow. Children, most of whom had never written a letter, enjoyed addressing a specially designed commemorative envelope, sticking on the

correct value stamp(s) and posting it to themselves. There were many activities at the Roadshow for adults and children including competitions, addressing a commemorative envelope, naming streets in Leeds from old photographs, weighing the mail, valuing stamps and finding their country.

The success of the venture was a direct result of the superb commitment and contribution of our members. It was important to include as many members as possible in the preparation and delivery of the Roadshow. Some "direct" requests were needed to secure this. Members contributed to a considerable supply of free philatelic gifts that were available for adults and children. Over 20 members prepared 4-sheet displays, ensuring that each was colourful, attractive and accessible. On the day, members engaged with the visitors and created a lively and inviting atmosphere generating a strong sense of team work and support. All were keen to put on a welcoming show and enjoyed their role as ambassadors for our fascinating hobby. Members' willingness to engage with



and discuss with visitors is a key element in the Roadshow's success. We sought and received excellent cooperation and support from the head librarian in Leeds Central Library who was keen to get community groups into the library. The librarian prompted us to consider displays that followed the theme of WWI – a topic used in the library throughout the current 100-year anniversary.

We generated good publicity for the event by distributing city-wide flyers and by coverage in the local and national press. All visitors were given free philatelic gifts. Each child was thrilled to receive a large bag full of stamps, an album,

tweezers, etc. A specially prepared welcome pack was given to each adult. It contained stamps and an application form offering free one-year membership. Five visitors signed up on the day for membership and the positive response leads us to expect more in the coming weeks. Several young people visiting the Roadshow, once they had seen the wider appeal of stamps. considered how they might continue their interest. One young man, an architect, said that he would look for famous buildings

on stamps and use those images in his work!

Several older visitors – who had once been stamp collectors – were pleased to learn about the Society and indicated that they thought stamp collecting was a solitary activity!

Those intending to organise a Roadshow should not underestimate the work involved and the time needed. It is very important to have varied and colourful displays. Our four sheet displays included space travel, Concorde, post boxes, changing stamp design, thematic sheets, WWI silk cards, humorous cards and three displays relating to our city. We had more four sheet displays than we could display at one time - so we could rotate the topics and also respond to any requests about a particular topic from visitors.

Our four sheet displays were supplemented by having some "completed" albums for examination - including a delightful album that one of our members started when she was a young girl and that interest had continued throughout her life.

To ensure the future of our hobby, we have to explore different ways of reaching

out into the local community and generating awareness of and interest in the wide world of stamps a Stamp Roadshow may be one of those ways.

Amersham & District

floods, issued an annual series of charity postage stamps from 1924 to stamps and booklets, issued annually from 1925, and postal stationery cards from 1927. The organisation was hijacked by Joseph Goebbels, the Nazi Propaganda Minister, and became the Winter Relief Fund of the German Nation popularly known as WHW. Its slogan was 'Help us to Fight against Hunger and Cold.' 17 million people received assistance during the first winter, mainly potatoes and coal. At the start of the new session members stood for a minute's silence in memory of **Dennis Collins** who died recently. He had been a member from 1946 and was the longest serving member of any Scottish philatelic society. It was President's Night when **David Millar** gave a fascinating display showing his skills with a computer where, in part one, he displayed a stamp from every country mentioned in Scott's catalogue along with a descriptive paragraph. Unusually his display was of (excellent) photocopies of his collection due to previous difficulty with US customs paperwork in getting his original material out of the country. However

this did not diminish the enjoyment of seeing and hearing about the display.



Scarborough

In May Martin Snowdon of Redcar brought The Work of Karl Bicket for our last meeting of the year. Karl was a renowned Swiss stamp designer and engraver. In his early years he worked printing postcards as an apprentice lithographer. By the age of 23 he was running his own business printing letterheads, fashion magazines and postcards. After recovering from TB and affected by the suffering caused by WWI he began to build the Temple Of Peace. He spent 6 months in every year building the Temple in the mountains, by himself. It took 25 years! He was employed by the Swiss Post office to design and engrave Peace Stamps for victims of war, special airmail and children's charity stamps. Later he redesigned the definitive stamps showing the scenes of mountains etc. His portrait stamps are very intricate and very close to the likeness. In September ABPS and YPA President Graham Winters visited from Wakefield. He gave us a fascinating talk about his lifetime collecting of stamps, starting by showing us the earliest items from his childhood. The Royal Philatelic Society of London is seeking nominations for The Crawford Medal

The prestigious Crawford Medal of The Royal Philatelic Society London will be awarded in 2018 'for the most valuable and original contribution to the study and knowledge of philately published in book form during the relevant period'. It is open to all authors, whether members of the Society or not.

The medal, in silver-gilt, features a portrait of the Earl of Crawford, bibliophile extraordinaire, and was instituted in 1914 but not awarded until 1920 owing to the First World War.

The medal is open to worldwide competition. In the case of joint authorship the Council of the Royal may award a medal to each author, but in the case of books compiled as a result of collaboration on the part of more than two authors, Council may award a medal to the sponsors or editors of the work instead of to the authors.



When things go wrong



Book Review

Newlands Road to Success by Chris Phillips ISBN978-0-9574259-1-0 We all started collecting stamps at different times of our lives and for different reasons. For each of us there is a different story to tell and at club displays many of us, I am sure, give a potted version. Chris has gone one step further in this 200-page book. Rather surprisingly he starts before man came to Great Britain but soon reaches the point where his own family life began in Newlands Road, Tunbridge Wells. Clearly the children of the area were resourceful and gregarious - no computers and Ipads being used in isolation at home in the 1950s. Newlands Road Philatelic Society was formed in 1953 as one of the offshoots of the Newlands Road Club. To his friends Chris was clearly a born organiser so when they brought a copy of "Stamp Finder" containing "How to Organise A Stamp Club" he went into action. This was thought to be the only club run and managed by youngsters. It grew from strength to strength with competitions, a newsletter "The Newland Post", speakers, auctions and lots of children involved. They drew the attention of the local adult society - Tunbridge Wells Philatelic Society, who gave them great support. Newlands even got heavily involved in the campaign for pictorial definitive stamps - writing to MPs and the House of Lords. Members reached the stage of entering the Melville Cup (with regular successes) and designing their own First Day covers. Chris has kept copious records, newspaper clippings, photographs and other memorabilia and many are illustrated in the book - though some are hard to read and you might need your magnifying glass and good light to see the finer details. When we are all thinking of how we can keep the hobby going and interest younger people in collecting, this little book might give some ideas to either us or the youngsters. It is clear that the ideas came from the children and young people out of the initial lead by the "How to Organise..." booklet. We cannot all relate to children but we can try to emulate the support given by the Tunbridge Wells PS members. I commend this little book to you. It is not a great work of philatelic knowledge in the usual sense but it shows the fun that can be got from stamp collecting being a sociable hobby and not one just for the solitary elderly male. 


Stamp Active Network
