I cannot continue without regretting the loss to British and International Philately by the death of Frank Walton. Again more has been written elsewhere but Frank was always so friendly and helpful to me - like so many others. I shall miss him. That is why this issue is dedicated to him and his family.

So what else can I write about. I had cause to look back and realise that I have been the editor of ABPS News for 38 issues (the first couple with the help of my predecessor, Dr John Gledhill). He told me that I would receive a few complaints and fewer expressions of praise. For most of the time he has been right but I am pleased to say that the complaints have fallen off and the thanks have increased. I must be doing something right - so you are stuck with me for a while longer - but I cannot go on forever, so someone else needs to start thinking "I could do that". The complaints are sometimes very interesting - rarely pointing out errors of fact, more often complaining that the same societies appear every issue, and occasionally that their society isn't included at all. The obvious answer apparently hasn't occurred to them - THEY HAVEN'T SENT ANYTHING TO ME! Thinking of this I looked back at my statistics - Yes, I keep a record of when each society and federation has sent something for publication. 2 out of 20 Federations, 18 out of 73 Specialist Societies and 53 out of 183 Local Societies have never sent anything in 38 issues. Does this mean that they are not doing anything or that they do not want us to know their brilliant ideas. Apart from having palpitations, what would I do if they all sent something for the next issue? The answer - My best to include as much as I possibly could. Congratulations to Kent Federation (24/38), Bromley & Beckenham (35/38) and the Royal (37/38 and I think that I robbed them of a full house once when I was short of space!). It would help of course if the correspondents didn't make my job harder by including lots of formatting, long gaps between paragraphs and so on. Gold stars (not medals) to those who send under 250 words, in Arial 10, single line spacing and no paragraph gaps. Not hard to do before sending when you only have one to do, very time-consuming when I have about 50 - as in this issue. However I would rather have your reports, anniversary material and articles in any way that you want to send it than to have nothing at all.

Society anniversaries

According to the date of foundation shown in the societies' information on our records, significant anniversaries include those shown below (though several societies have not let us known their foundation date, so there may be more).

Heartiest congratulations to all involved in these milestones:

Bromley and Beckenham Philatelic Society - 90 years



In January we marked our 90th anniversary with a celebratory dinner. 25 sat down to dine and raised a glass to the past and future of the society – before enjoying a piece of cake. Nine members met on 9th January 1932. We peaked at 264 members in 1971 but are now still around 100. The history of the society is now complete up to 2007 – 75 years recorded and printed (available from David Rennie). We look forward to the next 10 years to make the century.

Maidstone & Mid-Kent Philatelic Society – 100 years

The Society was founded in 1922 following an advertisement inserted in the Kent Messenger by **Mr B S H Grant**. The first meeting took place on 11th September 1922 under the chairmanship of **Mr William Court**. This resulted in the formation of the society with a membership of 34. **Mr F T Travers**, a well-known surgeon, was elected the first President, an office he retained until 1947, with Mr Grant as Hon Secretary and Treasurer. The annual subscription was 5/(25p) although this was later increased to 7/6 (37p). The early meetings were held in the Church Institute (now Primark goods entrance in Union Street). The following year membership had increased to 63, with 25-28 attending meetings.

In 1923 a junior section was formed - mainly boys from Maidstone Grammar School. This section was subsequently incorporated into the main society. We affiliated to the Philatelic Congress of Great Britain and three members were fellows of the Royal Philatelic Society.

The Library, which had been started in 1922, increased in size and by 1926/27 had reached 200 volumes, with 400 borrowings. While we were in The Old Palace a number of books disappeared as a result of a break-in.

In 1931 Invicta, the White Horse of Kent, was adopted as our emblem.

In 1932 our 10th anniversary was celebrated with a dinner at The Old Palace and at our 100th meeting Bernard Grant showed 100 pages from 100 countries. The highlight of the 1936/37 year was a visit by **Sir John Wilson**, Curator of the Royal Collection, when 76 members and guests were present. We were

fortunate that this was repeated in October 2008 when **Michael Sefi** visited us and gave an up-dated display of the Queen's Collection.

The highest honour yet awarded to a member was given in 1940 to Mr B S H Grant when he signed the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists at the Bournemouth Congress. This was an honour he deserved not only for the work he did for us and other philatelic bodies but also for his outstanding study of the stamps of the Falkland Islands.



We celebrated our Golden Jubilee in 1972 with an Exhibition at Maidstone Technical High School for Girls (now Invicta Grammar School) and a dinner at the Orchard Room, Veglios Motel, demolished for the M20 widening.

During our 75th year we acted as host for the Kent Federation Autumn Rally which was preceded by a two-day exhibition in the Chequers Shopping Centre (now The Mall). Our annual dinner, in celebration, was held at the Tudor Park Hotel when 80 members and guests attended.

We still meet fortnightly from September to June in St Paul's Church Hall, Boxley Road, Maidstone. Our membership is still strong with a total of approximately 75 and an average attendance of 25 at meetings, which consist of philatelic displays, competitions, auctions. Also, we hold two successful stamp fairs each year.

We started a monthly morning meeting at the Indoor Bowls Club Maidstone at the start of the 2011/12 season. This has proved extremely popular with members and speakers, attracting an average attendance of 20.

2022 - the society is now 100 years old, quite an achievement. We celebrated with an Anniversary Dinner on the 31st March at the Masonic Centre and will hold an Anniversary Stamp Fair on the 19th November at Aylesford Community Centre.

125th Anniversary - Salisbury and District Philatelic Society

"The study of the fashionable science of philately is very popular in Salisbury and interest in it has largely been fostered by the existence of an excellent Philatelic Society. The Salisbury and District Philatelic Society was started on

22nd November 1895 with Mr W Brown as President and Mr Skipton as Vice President" as quoted in TJ Northy's *The Popular History of Salisbury 1897*. **William Brown**, an artist of considerable skill, was a 'Foreign Stamp Importer and Dealer' in Salisbury. He also founded the 'Philatelic Journal of Great Britain'.

127 years later we celebrated 125 years. How many other Societies can boast such a pedigree? There were 20 Members present at the first meeting in 1895. Over the 125 years, active membership seems to have averaged around 25. Initially there were clubs in most of the nearby villages. As interest in collecting declined they closed and members came to Salisbury which kept the numbers constant. But in 1963 with only five members at the AGM the Club folded until restarting in 1968. Today attendance at meetings averages 18, with members leaving, due to health or to be near children, and members joining from societies which have closed.



25 members and guests, including the Mayor of Salisbury Caroline Corbin, gathered to see a display of 12 frames, organised by David Winnie who with five current members put together an exceptional and wide-ranging display. encompassing all aspects of our fascinating hobby - each one with a Salisbury connection: David Winnie - William Brown postcards. Salisbury Penny Post and Receiving Marks; Tony Howgrave-Graham - Salisbury 1668 -1810, Salisbury C19 Cancellations, and a potted history of his village, Downton, using philatelic material: Julian Frost - The three Salisbury Disasters: the 1906 railway accident, the 1908 snowstorm and the 1915 floods and then a selection of pre-WWI postcards of Salisbury streets; Jeremy Martin - Early Postage Stamps, Salisbury Slogans, and the covers and marks of villages from around Salisbury; Mike Carey - the local Scouts' mail since 1994; Craig Patterson - the covers and history of the Camps used for training on Salisbury Plain over the centuries. ...but did it really? What was the real reason? How could a Dealer pay a higher price than a Collector? It doesn't make sense, does it? Collectors are customers. Customers usually pay the highest price, unless... for a Collector, this was...

About The Author ► Andrew found his Father's stamps at the age of 10. A year later at Senior School he immediately joined the School Stamp Club. He specia sed (1) in British, but soon was interested in Queen Victoria which he could not afford. The 2nd to last boy wearing short trousers in his school year, he re giously bought Post Office New Issues on Tuesdays with his pocket money. He soon found that he enjoyed swapping / trading stamps as much as collecting them. Tast-forward 48 years later to a British Empire collection, lot #1 in an International Stamp Auction — Estimated at £3,000, but we were the highest bidder at £21,000 — YES — some 7×higher. Including Buyer's Premium in the extraordinary sum of £4,788 we actually paid GBP£25,788= upon a £3,000 estimate... however, we broke it down into sets, singles, minicollections etc. We made a profit. Some might say it found its price. Others may say:

Wrong Estimate X Wrong Presentation X
Wrong StructureX Wrong Protection of Price X

– Lucky for the seller that 2 well-heeled bidders saw the potential value that day or it could have been given away... the seller could easily have lost out couldn't he? or she?

So, by un-peeling the layers of obfuscation, hopefully we can all agree:

The Secret is Simple – it's ALL ABOUT : TIMING

Plus the 3 Philatelic 'P's Presentation Place And Price

4 Understanding the problem... always remember the car trade had their own little 'bible' - Glass's Guide. I've no idea, I've not even looked - in this internet-dominated world, it may even have disappeared. Well, there's an insider Stamp Trade publication for Stamp Dealers called "The Philatelic Exporter" There's nothing that special about it - and you won't learn much or find massively reduced prices by subscribing BUT - it is a forum, a paper focal point, a last 'bastion' in this on-line transparent world that we inhabit... whereby dealers (and auctioneers) can try and communicate with each other. I publish my own articles there..

Recently I discussed the outcome of my 10 years' simple research, asking dealers and auctioneers 'what is your biggest problem?'

To a man, (why are we almost all men), they replied — "my biggest problem is stock, if I can get more of the right stock I can sell it easily"

Strange that, nobody ever asked me the same question back – because my answer would have been entirely different (and I don't treat it as a problem) – I seek to satisfy more collector clients than any other stamp auction

This is the reason why my company has such massive advertising. This is the reason why we spend up to 8% of turnover – up to £200,000 per annum in marketing costs. (Most dealers don't even sell £200K per annum).

5 Why is that? Because, as the world revolved the Stamp Market, imperceptibly Changed, and incrementally -Massively

So, although few will tell you this, it's clearly evident that the problem for most Sellers of Stamps today is no longer absent stock – but absent collectors in

the place they choose to sell their stamps in. Simply put, other Dealers, Auctions, Stamp Fairs have not invested in marketing to have a strong Customer-core. To be fair, this is not true of all - but it is true of most - so that our former competitor 'Apex' had 800 bidders in a recent auction. In my most recent 20,000+ lot UPA 77th Auction we had 1,793 different bidders from 49 different countries, 95% of whom were Collectors. Some other well-advertised auctions only have 200 bidders (a high percentage of whom are dealers - so that, essentially they are Dealer-dominated auctions) - so that when you sell through them - you're paying up to 18% (including VAT) seller's commission and the buyer is paying up to 25% and more in Buyer's Premium, credit card fees, on-line bidding fee, delivery and insurance etc... AND all of that so that your stamps may be sold, wait for it - TO DEALERS (and some collectors), but Dealers, that naturally must make a profit to survive...

Now, let's examine the cost implications - Example: Your stamp collection sells in public auction for £800. Upon a 25% buyer's premium, the dealer pays £1,000 and it could be more. He breaks it into £2,000+ selling price (much lower and he'll go out of business). The auction charges you a seller's commission of up to 18% (VAT included) upon the £800 sale price. This is GBP£144. Therefore you receive approaching £656 - which is approximately 33% of the dealer's £2,000+/- retail selling price - BUT... now that we have identified the problem...

> Isn't the Solution Staring us Right in The Face?

Why Pay an Auction to Sell to Dealers: Sell to Collectors instead? In our example with buyer's premium, sellers commission, lotting fees, extra credit card charges, VAT and even insurance - you're already being charged in different ways up to 40% of the selling price to sell, possibly or probably, to the wrong person.

Why not direct that 40% cost you're paying to sell to Collectors instead? Sounds good, so why hasn't this been done before?

obvious so that money may be taken, almost surreptitiously, in numerous different ways, (without us apparently noticing until we see the cheque in our pocket) - the transparent 'seller pays' has been deliberately 'obscured' - so much so that, amazingly, the latest 2017 European Auction Selling Legislation just introduced - now requires auctions that charge 'buyer's premiums' to warn the buyer in advance. Just imagine going into the petrol station, and being warned that the price you're paying to put fuel in you tank is not the real price, you have to pay a premium! Obviously, there would be an uproar ...

How can you cut out the middleman sell and Collectors instead? Well, I can think of two ways. 1). DIY - Do It Yourself selling on eBay. That may be fine for lower grade material - but, would you risk auctioning relatively unprotected rare material on eBay ? We don't and we're professionals, so we should know what we're doing. Or 2). Cut out the extra middle-man. Use my company UPA, which reaches collectors instead. Here's how it works: Continuing from our previous Example:

The auction sold your stamps to a dealer for £1,000 – but You received circa £656

In Hindsight Dealers warned me 20 years ago that my idea wouldn't work. 20 years later I think I've proven that it does. (Reader: Please Request a complimentary UPA catalogue – using the contact details further below)

13 OK, Cut to the Chase what's the offer? All of my Selling Systems are based upon selling to Collectors Globally, so that 95% of stamps sold by UPA are sold directly to Collectors. If you wish to benefit by up to 50% or more, depending upon

your circumstance and type of material, by cutting out the middleman — then this offer may be for you. Generally 'time' is the enemy in our lives, and for most dealers not being able to sell stock. Now is the time to let 'time' do the 'heavy-lifting' and consider making 'time' work for you, so that at UPA you can make time your friend.

14 AND the SMALL PRINT? Some lots are too small in value for us to offer this system. Mint hinged material pre 1952 is regarded as the industry 'norm' and therefore desirable - but genuine never-hinged commands a premium. Europe sells but at reduced levels. Americas is good, as generally is Asia but the 'heat' has come off China which is still good - and Russia which can still be good. East Europe is weaker. Overall, Rarities throughout can command their own price levels and real Postal History has good demand.

The international stamp exhibition, London 2022, opened its doors as planned from 19th to 26th February at London's Business Design Centre in Islington. Having been hit by the Coronavirus pandemic, causing a postponement of the originally planned London 2020 exhibition, fate still had the last word. Hurricanes swept across the United Kingdom on the day before opening, disrupting travel into the first weekend.

All the obstacles were overcome, and collectors and dealers from across the world were able to meet in person once again, many for the first time in two years. As **Frank Walton**, Chair of the Organising Committee, commented: 'It all proved very worthwhile, and the vast majority of the dealers were very satisfied.'

It was not only the dealers who were happy; the visitors and exhibitors were delighted with the outcome. The standard of the material on display was extremely high, with exhibits of interest for everyone.

On the Friday evening, at Guildhall, the top awards were presented. Winner of the Grand Prix National (for an outstanding exhibit of Great Britain) was **Howard Hughes** (UK) with *The Maltese Cross*. The Grand Prix International went to **Vittorio Morani** (Italy) with *Tuscany 1836 to UPU: Letter mail in, from and to Tuscany: Routes, rates and charges*. The winner of the World Stamp Championship was **James Peter Gough** (USA) for his display of *UPU and its Impact on Global Postal Services*.

99 UK Competition entries succeeded in gaining the following medals: 20 Large Gold, 26 Gold, 28 Large Vermeil, 15 Vermeil, 6 Large Silver and 2 Silver.

My First International Stamp Exhibition

I am relatively new to the world of Philately, and before London 2022, I had never been to an international stamp exhibition, not even Stampex. The closest event I had been to before was Midpex or the York stamp fair, but these did not contain exhibitions. As a northerner, travelling to London and having to stay in a hotel was a major inconvenience for me.

In 2021 I was asked if I could help set up a social media presence for London 2022 which led me to joining the Organising Committee. Through the Facebook and Twitter accounts I promoted the exhibition, answered questions from the public and shared press releases and other relevant information.

I was invited to attend the exhibition, and chose to take part from Tuesday to Friday, to report live from the events and to volunteer wherever else I was needed. Since I only travelled down on the Tuesday, I missed the travel havoc caused by storm Eunice and the knock-on effect that it had on the preparation for the opening of the exhibition. I travelled down by train to London and got a tube to Angel station which was a short walk to the Business Design Centre. On first impression the event was much bigger than I was expecting. Since I arrived early, I managed to have a look at some of the exhibitions I was interested in before they were taken down for the changeover. At midday, the exhibition area was closed off and I joined the many volunteers to help take down the first set of exhibits and mount the second set. This was hard work and after seven hours working on my feet. I was exhausted, and we still hadn't finished. I returned early next morning to help finish the mounting before the exhibition re-opened. I think of myself as generally fit and relatively younger than most of the other volunteers, yet I found it hard work, so I have much admiration for all the volunteers that helped.

On Wednesday after the exhibition re-opened, I had some free time to view the displays. There were two displays on Bahawalpur which I was particularly interested in seeing, and they did not disappoint. Some of the material on display was unique so that I would only have been able to view it in person at such exhibitions. I then spent the rest of the day visiting the trade stands and talking to the traders. I picked up a few covers and stamps but there wasn't a lot of material around my collecting interests. I did however discover and join the Revenue Society as they had a lot of Pakistani Revenue stamps, which I hope I can have access to later. Talking to the traders, they did say it was quieter than previous events due to a lot of overseas visitors not attending because of Covid, but they were generally happy with the trade.

The exhibition also provided meeting rooms and tables for specialist societies to get together. I helped organise the meeting of the Pakistan Study Circle on Thursday and it was great to see fellow collectors in person for the first time since Covid. We were even honoured to have FIP President Bernard Beston drop in to show his support.

FRANK WALTON (1955 - 2022)

It is with great sadness that I report the death of Frank Walton on 1st April 2022. He was suffering from stomach cancer. Frank will be sorely missed by many, many people. He was a past President of the Royal Philatelic Society London, a former editor of the London Philatelist (2001-2014), a signatory of the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists (2015), an international juror and a prolific author. In 2014 he was awarded the FEPA Medal for Exceptional Study and Research for his six-volume study "The De La Rue Collection".

Frank was a kind and generous person, willing to share his knowledge with anyone. His enthusiasm inspired many to undertake projects they would never have thought of doing.

Bill Shepherd

I regret to inform you of the death on 2nd February of Bill Shepherd, President and a Founder Member of the Hinckley & District Philatelic Society. He was one of the three people who founded the Germany & Colonies Philatelic Society in 1864. It came about when Bill, then a member of Stockton on Tees PS, visited Hartlepool to give a display. Several people there were very interested in German philately. Bill became the first secretary and was the driving force behind the organization of the first annual convention "Germania Posta" in Stockton on 5th September 1964.

For his work in promoting Anglo-German cooperation through philately, he was awarded the European Cross in 1990. In 1992, he received an *Urkunde** in Herford, Germany for "promoting better understanding through philately". In 1999 Bill was awarded a commendation from the German Ambassador "for enhancing mutual understanding between our countries". In 2007 he was presented with a golden pin marking over 40 years with G&C PS. In the same year he was awarded a silver badge by the *Deutsche Philatelisten-Jugend eV* for his work with young philatelists in Germany. *Peter Thomas*

London 1950

A chance purchase at London 2022 provides a timely link to a much earlier exhibition, that of 1950. Had London 2020 happened as originally planned, it would have marked the 70th anniversary of the London International Stamp Exhibition, held in the Great Room at Grosvenor House, Park Lane from 6th to 13th May 1950. The Chairman of the exhibition was **Sir John Wilson**, Keeper of the Royal Philatelic Collection.

The item in question is a letter, with cover, dated 27th February 1950, from Sir

John to the secretary of the Windsor Philatelic Society. Pre-show stress is 1# Jel 195. taking its toll. He writes:

Dear Sir.

I owe you a very sincere apology for not having replied sooner to your kind invitation to judge the competition of the Windsor Philatelic Society.

In any ordinary year I would have gladly accepted, but I have so much work in connection with the Exhibition in May that I have had to give up all philatelic engagements until it is over.


It is only because I have so many letters to write for the exhibition that I omitted to answer yours, and I apologise very sincerely as I thought I had already written you. Yours truly John Wilson

I'm sure that some of the organisers of the

now much larger and more complex London 2022 could relate to that pressure!

Delving into the Palmares listing for the exhibition, we find some of the eminent collectors of the day, including:

Grand Prix winner: Herbert C Adams, who signed the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists in 1946, was awarded the Tilleard Medal in 1947 and was Vice President of the Royal



Philatelic Society (but never became President, dying as a result of a road accident in 1955).

Gold Awards of Honour: **Harry Osborne**, signed the RDP in 1954, and was a Crawford Medal recipient. **Gerald Wellburn**, signed the RDP in 1951.

Lionel E Dawson, awarded the Crawford Medal in 1950, the Tilleard Medal in 1955 and signed the RDP in 1961.

Eduardo Cohen, signed the RDP 1959.

Dr Frances E Wood, awarded the Crawford Medal in 1949.

Donald C Gray OBE, awarded the Tilleard Medal in 1937, Vice President of RPSL. (Sadly, Donald also never became President. He died whilst bringing covers to the Royal for display during the severe weather of January 1962. The RPSL holds his Netherlands and colonies collection.)

Wouldn't it be interesting to view their exhibits 70 years on and compare presentation styles? What would today's judges make of them?

Forces Mail from Cocos Keeling Islands 1945 - 1946

Some years ago with the help of the late **Stuart Henderson** (greatly missed by his many friends) I was able to purchase **Bill Dawson**'s collection of Cocos Keeling Islands material. Bill's interest stemmed from his military service when



he was with the RAF Airfield Construction Unit building the two airstrips on West Island for the RAF Operations against the Japanese. Three bomber squadrons were moved to the islands to conduct raids against targets in South East Asia and to provide support during the planned re-invasion of Malaya and re-conquest of Singapore. However the first aircraft to arrive were Supermarine Spitfire Mk VIIIs of No 136 Squadron RAF.

Mail from the Islands at this time is relatively scarce and the quality of the RAF PO No 301

postmarks is generally poor/ average. As Bill commented on one of his Display Sheets "Good clear



strikes of this RAF Post are most uncommon —It's not easy working in a tent with makeshift equipment". (1)

One of the scarcest items of mail from the Islands is the RAFPOST South East Asia



Christmas Air Letter, one of which I have in my collection which bears Bill's drawing of the Islands. (2)



The RAF Post Office No 301 operated from the 3rd April 1945 until 31st March 1946 (Garrad dates) when it returned to Ceylon.

Bill finally returned to Blighty in April 1946 via Ceylon and Bombay with a flight in an RAF Liberator Bomber (his first) then home in a Troopship.

There was also a contingent of Royal Engineers, Indian Artillery and Royal Indian Army Service Corps on the Islands for their defence which used IFPO 46



on their outgoing mail from the 13th April 1945 to the 10th January 1946 and the very rare IFPO 150 from 11th January 1946 to the 4th March 1946 (Proud dates). It is interesting that Brigadier DS Virk in the FPHS 1973 Publication gives May 1945 for opening of IFPO 46 and September 1946 for closing of IFPO 150. (3)

At the time of my purchase of Bill Dawson's collection there was another Cocos mail collection on the market, that being mail from LAC 1 Harold R Simmons, Intelligence 175 Wing RAF Ceylon Air Force who was stationed at the Airbase on West Island in 1945-46. His letters to home were



prolific and described the people, nature and history of the Islands and gave a vivid insight into wartime life. (4)

There must be more examples of mail from this theatre of war out there waiting to be discovered. Keith Lillywhite

Other organisations, particularly the major stamp auction houses, also often host special events during the Congress.


Congress provides an ideal way of enjoying oneself in the company of fellow collectors.

Right Place - Right Time

In November 1965, **Bert Clarkson** searched the financial departments of Leeds City Council, where he worked. He searched for an envelope received from Bradford before November 4th. Eventually he found one.



Look carefully at the cancellation; everything seems normal. Why was he looking? Because, on November 4th he found an unusual cancellation.





He then collected envelopes every day for 2 weeks and for some time afterwards. After being "corrected" in November 1965, the "B" re-appeared intermittently over the following three years.

Bert brought the envelopes together, mounted them and told the story of **THE YORKSHIRE** "B" in a 30-page collection. The collection also includes letters from the GPO and a cutting of Bert's article in The Yorkshire Evening Post in 1966. A scan of Bert's introduction to the collection is shown below.

Later, in the 1950s, Guernsey used British regional stamps marked specifically for use in Guernsey but valid for postage throughout the United Kingdom. Guernsey then issued its own stamps with the creation of Guernsey Post on 1st October 1969. The Bailiwick of Guernsey incorporates Alderney, Herm and Sark which all used the Guernsey issues from 1969. From 1983 Guernsey issued Alderney stamps for use on that island but also valid throughout the Bailiwick of Guernsey. On display were some cycle tax discs from Sark. Cycles, including electric cycles, are permitted to be used on Sark roads and are taxed annually, though tractors are the principal motor vehicle on the island. Altogether an interesting and excellent presentation much enjoyed by the membership.

The children ended up in homes in the North of England and Glasgow. Alan then displayed a large number of Red Cross letters written by the children to their parents and vice versa. The letters were sent via Switzerland to the Channel Islands and the contents were very poignant. We then saw the various stamps that were printed for Jersey and Guernsey (Arms Design) and later a pictorial set was issued by Jersey. A number of forgeries were also printed. There was the lovely account of a couple who were honeymooning in Guernsey, when the Germans arrived. Subsequently they were both deported to work camps in Europe and on their release went to England but returned to Guernsey where they spent the rest of their lives. Alan gave a superb display of stamps, postal history and memorabilia and was able to speak throughout the course of the 2-hour displays without looking at any notes. We agreed it was a brilliant display. Mick Carter

Halifax

The Zoom meetings continue with guests from other societies and countries and our members have attended some other society meetings with welcome exchange of access details between societies allowing these exchanges to happen. **David Wilson** showed ½d stamps 1870-1974. David explained that after the Education Act 1870 encouraged reading more printed matter was posted, leading to the use of this value. We saw various GB ½d stamps both on and off cover, Victorian postal stationery items, underprinted named users to prevent company fraud, advertising designs, booklets containing ½d stamps, Official uses, the Wilding issues, Machins, changes imposed by Decimalisation and the eventual demise of the ½p. **Max Smith** introduced guest speaker **Jamie Smith** who showed **British Civil Defence** - **Home and Abroad 1950s 1960s**. We

saw information about the threat of USSR invasion of the UK (post-WWII cold war period), civil defence and emergency services responses to local disasters. The display comprised items of mail, period photographs, historic information from the armed services and similar items from civil services. Military displayed items included mail into and from British BFPO and FPOs, Bahrain and Sharjah, Cyprus, Germany, Greece, Gibraltar, Lebanon, Egypt, Malta, Turkey, Transjordan and Trieste. In many cases the postal rates of the items were explained. There were also items from sites around the UK particularly rocket and radar sites on some of the Scottish Islands. Civil displayed items included Prestwick and Stockport air disaster showing salvaged mail and material relating to the Canvey Island floods of 1953.

us to GB - High value Castles and Machines. His display contained a number of commercial covers which used High Value Castle and Machin Head definitive stamps. He outlined the uses and rates for Registration and Recording and other Special services of mail requiring high value payment. Rod explained that these types of complete commercial covers were difficult to obtain as they were often the source of used stamps obtained by collectors. He outlined how the Castle stamp design was achieved from photographs taken by Prince Andrew. Adrian Lee carried on the theme with GB - Wilding and High Value Machin Definitives. The display of used postage stamps covered from late 1952 to the demise of the Dorothy Wilding QEII head with examples of changes of watermarks, the use of graphite lines on the back of the stamps and the adding of phosphor band to the front of stamps to assist with increasing the efficiency of sorting mail. He showed examples of the first series of sterling Machin Head stamps, the second series pre-security perforation decimal stamps including high values. He explained the various printing techniques for the stamps with the changes made by Royal Mail to reduce their costs. He also had examples of Express post and the banks' use of High Value Packets. Royal Sutton Coldfield

Recently Peter Barnett presented Stamps and Postal History of Yugoslavia between 1918 and 1945. beginning with Austro-Hungarian stamps, overprinted for use in Bosnia Herzegovina and Croatia. Stamps of the unified country. issued in 1921, depicted King Peter I and Regent Alexander, printed in two currencies, the krone and dinar. These, together with postal covers were shown, including an example of one with Yugoslavian stamps but with a Hungarian registration label. Further elements included commemorative stamps, labels, charity issues and postage dues. In 1923, King Peter was succeeded by

Alexander and new issues depicted portrait changes. In 1929, the state became Yugoslavia and stamps inscribed "Jugoslavia" were presented with old issues overprinted with the new name. After Alexander's assassination, stamps were shown, re-issued with black borders, followed by a definitive set depicting young King Peter II. We saw stamps and covers of ship mail, TPO and air mails. Covers were franked with a standard postage stamp plus an air mail stamp; from 1934, official airmail stamps were issued, an example showing a full set on cover. A new definitive series of 1939 showed an older Peter II, this the last series issued by the kingdom prior to World War II. Material covering the invasion of Yugoslavia by Germany and its allies in April 1941 was presented, including various occupation stamps. Other material depicted stamps and covers from prisoner of war and forced labour correspondence, the bombing of Nis and Administrative Council issues.

Southampton & District



Austrian PS

Northern Group Meeting, Otley, March.

Six members based in the north of England gathered round Derek Baron's dining-table on 30th March for a day of displays, lunch and conviviality. **Andrew** Brooks kicked off with a fascinating display of mail from soldiers involved in The Two Sieges and Capture of Przemysl in 1914/15. Moving on a hundred years, Andy Taylor showed us a selection of Austria's personalised stamps (Meine Marke). He demonstrated how these had developed from simple stamps to more sophisticated products such as personalised souvenir booklets. John Pitts continued with his very comprehensive collection of mail carried by The World's First International Airmail Service from Vienna to Krakow to Lemberg, and its extension from Vienna to Budapest. Keith Brandon presented Mail carried by Austrian and Italian steamers on Lake Garda in the nineteenth century. After an excellent lunch, Derek showed us a scarce example of a postcard mailed at one ablage (postal agency) and delivered by another, near Olomouc, now in the Czech Republic. Ian Bergl then treated us to his developing collection of Austrian Occupied Territories, followed by Postal History of Kronstadt (Brasov) where he has family connections. 

Channel Islands Specialists' Society

Our members' displays in London commenced with **Alan Moorcroft** showing items relating to the *Liberation of the Channel Islands on 9th May 1945, POW Camp No 802 on Jersey and POW Camp No 801 on Guernsey.* **Alan Whittaker** detailed his continuing work on the *Lisbon-based British Red Cross Society*, showing examples of cachets used and personnel stories, thanks to information from Red Cross Headquarters in Geneva. **Roger Harris** opened with *German propaganda photographs* – that were original wire photos – which reached America in 1940-1941 before it joined the war. He also showed an example of a rare Radio Message reply card. **David Winnie** showed a range of *Jersey and Guernsey PAID marks* used on mail, when there were stamp shortages, during the German Occupation and for a brief period after the Occupation. **Gerald Marriner** and **Nick Stuart** showed their competition entries entitled *Jersey Surcharge Mail* and *Letter Forwarding Agents to and from the Channel Islands* respectively. Finally, **Richard Flemming** showed an item of civilian mail that

passed through the German Feldpost system. A 1941 registered letter sent from Paris to Jersey which routed via Cologne, the US, London, Lisbon and back to Paris: there it entered the German Feldpost system, receiving the rare Jersey FELDPOST/a/405 registered mail handstamp for 04.10.41, a journey of almost five

months. We have recruited our first Junior member for many years.

Consequently the stamps were produced in strips of three, inscribed respectively 'Third of Exchange', 'Second of Exchange' and 'First of Exchange'. At the end of January **Jon Aitchison** showed *Unusual Aspects of Channel Islands' Philately*. Far-ranging in its appeal, he covered such diverse



PAN AMERICAN'S FINAL FLIGHT, by Jon E Krupnick

Reviewed by Ken Sanford

This book shows Jon

Krupnick's award-winning exhibit of historic Pan Am flight covers – 1933 to 1941. There are introductions by Jimmy Buffet and Warren Buffet. Chapter 1: Pan Am Clippers Conquer the Pacific, shows the aircraft used by Pan Am for development of its airmail routes from August 1933 to December 1941 as well as a route map. Many rare survey flight covers are shown, including a unique cover addressed to President Franklin Rossevelt from the 1st survey flight from San Francisco to Honolulu in April 1935. This is followed by survey flight covers to Midway Island, Wake Island, Guam & Manila, the 1st press flight and then the 1st passenger flight in October 1936.

The next section shows rare covers from the first survey flight to Kingman Reef and Auckland, New Zealand as well as covers flown on the extension flight to Macau and Hong Kong, and the highest franking recorded on covers to China. Covers are shown from the 2nd and 3rd South Pacific survey flights and covers intended for the ill-fated survey flight from Pago Pago, American Samoa in which Edwin Musick was killed. Many different covers are shown from both routes – FAM-14 & FAM-19 through to the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor on 7th December, 1941.

There are covers shown which were carried between Asia and the UK and the USA on the "Horseshoe Route" after the 2nd World War closed the Mediterranean air routes. Many covers are shown from FAM-19, the South Pacific route from July 1940 to December 1941, as well as many covers carried on the FAM-14 route through December 1941.

The final chapter shows Whipple S Hall flight covers from the 1st to the 29th flight. Mr Hall, who had a paper and stationery business in Manila, created a series of unique covers that included crew signatures and flight details found nowhere else. This is the first time many of these covers have been shown in print. The book ends with a bibliography and an index. The book shows this fantastic collection in color and will be essential to collectors of Pan American World Airways covers.

The History of Airmail in Poland and Its Contribution to Airmail Services of Europe (1914-1939), by Dr Jerzy W Kupiec-Weglinski


The monograph, prefaced by Oxford-based Nobel Prize nominated historian Norman Davies, focuses on the development and operations of airmail services on the Polish territories throughout 25 years of turbulent European history during the 20th

century. It begins with events originating in WWI in a remote area of the former Austro-Hungarian Empire's Galicia Province. It concludes with the German invasion of Poland in September 1939 and the outbreak of WWII. It is an indepth encyclopedic history of the development of air post services not only in Poland but also in all of Europe and beyond.

The substantive material is presented in twelve chapters. The first chapter highlights the 1914-1915 airmail effort by Austrian Army from the city of Przemyśl, besieged by Russian forces. The following chapter includes comprehensive descriptions and illustrations of the airmail postal route in 1918 from Vienna to Kyiv via Krakow and Lviv. Further chapters detail the development of domestic airmail operations, as well as joint services by Polish and foreign carriers to other countries and continents, air rallies, crash (interrupted) mail, and the Zeppelin mail from mainland Poland and the Free City of Danzig to the Americas. There are many tables and appendices which provide useful information about cancellations, cachets, miscellaneous postal marking, quantities of airmail carried between various cities, airmail labels used on the covers, a survey of Graf Zeppelin dispatches from Poland to South America, and much more.

The book is well researched and contains a wealth of information about early Polish & European airmail and will be essential for aerophilatelists interested in that area of aerophilately.

The handbook is hardbound in an 8½"x11" format (21.5 x 28 cm) and includes 385 pages containing over 700 color illustrations. This is to cover the cost of getting exhibits to and from exhibitions, FIP capitation fees and other costs relating to processing the exhibits. Overall this runs at a loss. Exhibits that are carried to and returned from an exhibition by the exhibitor are charged at half price. There is no UK handling charge for Youth exhibits. 
