MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN:

Everything seems to have been very busy since my last message. The York Fair was, as always, a great success, as was Stampex in February. Many dealers have generously promised adverts for the Congress booklet, which should again make a small profit for the ABPS.

Stampex was particularly noteworthy because of the new class - Ephemera! I did a small survey for Bill Hedley, the Chairman of the Exhibitions Committee. It took the form of asking people: the general public, collectors, exhibitors and judges what they thought. About 80% of the comments were positive, ranging from "this is great!" to "hopefully this will attract more people". The 20% negative ranged from "this has no place in philately" to "I think we have enough classes already". Several questioned the definitions used for ephemera. 70 years

Middlesbrough & District Philatelic Society

On Monday, October 11th 1948 the following appeared in the Public Notice section of the Evening Gazette newspaper. This public notice cost 10/-. "Will all interested in the formation of a Philatelic Society in Middlesbrough kindly attend a meeting in the Park Methodist Church Schoolroom on Wednesday 13th October 1948 at 7.30pm". The following report appeared in the Evening Gazette on Thursday 14th October. "Stamp Collectors Meet – The first meeting of the newly formed Middlesbrough & District Philatelic Society was held in the Park Methodist Church Schoolroom last night, when over 30 collectors were present. It was decided that meetings would be held monthly, the next one being on Wednesday, November 10th. Officials elected were: President, Mr J Kirby; Vice-President, Mr TH Rodgers; Hon. Secretary, Mr W Fleming." During that year 38 members paid a subscription of 5/- and 10 junior members each paid 2/6d. At the end of the first season meetings were moved to the Dorman Museum, which was just a short distance away. The stay there was also short lived as meetings moved to the Temperance Institute. From 1960 to 1970 home was in the YMCA. The Grove Hill Community Centre followed and for the last 34 years the Society has been meeting at Middlesbrough Bowling Club. The longest serving member is Mr Barry Burns who joined in 1969. Over the years we have been hosts to Conventions for both the North-East Philatelic Association and the Yorkshire Philatelic Association. Six of the present members have been

York Philatelic Society

1948 was a memorable year. Key events include: • a severe winter in 1947-48 • the continuation of war-time rationing • Germany under Allied occupation and the Berlin Airlift • the spread of Communism • the foundation of the NHS and the welfare state • the creation of British Railways • independence from the UK for Burma and Ceylon • the assassination of Mahatma Gandhi • the Silver Wedding

of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth • the births of the Prince of Wales and York Philatelic Society. The 1st annual dinner of the society was held on 14th October 1966 at the Ainstey Hotel in Boroughbridge Road, York. The cost of the three-course meal was £1 per head! We have put together an exhibition of stamps from around the world which were issued in 1948, and stamps of later years commemorating events of that year. Watford & District Philatelic Society

October 2018 marked our 80th birthday. To celebrate this landmark, we held a celebratory dinner, which most of the current membership and partners attended.

The club was formed largely through the efforts of **Mr S Forder**, who realised the need for a meeting place for local stamp collectors. Early meetings were held in the sitting room of his home, and he became the club's chairman. By early 1938 larger accommodation had to be found for the expanding membership, and the Cookery Nook Café in Watford High Street became the regular venue for the fortnightly meetings. In the early days the sole purpose of the club was for members to exchange stamps with each other, this being done on the basis of Stanley Gibbons catalogue prices. Members usually specialised in the stamps of one or two countries, and through the exchange system several were able to build up interesting collections. In 1939 three private exhibitions were held, then came the war. The call-up, Civil Defence and other duties took away half the members. At the end of 1940 it was decided to close the club until happier times returned.

In the years that followed, Mr Forder died, several former members did not return to the area and it began to look as if the Watford Stamp Club would be a thing of the past. In 1947 however, the club was re-started and its scope was widened. An increase in the number of members necessitated looking for larger accommodation, and the main lecture hall of the Watford Central Library was chosen. The use of the library hall, and an influx of members who wanted something more than exchange facilities, led to the mounting of displays by members and to invitations to members of other societies to display their treasures. One of these was **Mr H C V Adams**, who lived locally, but whose

collection of Penny Blacks was internationally known. After one of his displays he presented the society with some GB stamps, which were sold in order to purchase a silver trophy, which was named the H C V Adams Cup. This was an incentive for members to do more than the simple mounting of their collections. This led to success in the 1954 competition for The Bishop Cup, contested between

members of the Middlesex Philatelic Federation, which had been formed in 1950.

In 1968 the society started a junior section and the MPF Junior Stamp Day was organised by Watford & District PS with a special postmark and card produced to mark the occasion. The junior section was extremely active at the time, with the society running competitions between local schools, the winner receiving the Longridge Shield.

At its peak, the membership of the society numbered well over a hundred, but in more recent times, like so many other clubs (not just philatelic ones), the number of members has decreased to less than twenty. However, the members we have are enthusiastic, with a good attendance at meetings, now held at the Community Life Centre inside the local ASDA supermarket. The society also 'punches above its weight' when it comes to competitive philately. Indeed, Watford won the team award again in the 2017 Middlesex Federation 9-page inter-society competition.

Teaching old dogs new tricks - Chinese New Year and encouraging stamp collecting.

As all collectors know, there is never any shortage of new issues from all over the world that celebrate Chinese New Year. At the Caledonian Philatelic Society in Glasgow, we thought we might use the occasion to target younger collectors to encourage them into the hobby. For some time we have had good contacts with Glasgow Museums and learned that they planned a celebration of Chinese customs and New Year celebrations in Glasgow's celebrated Kelvin Hall and at the Riverside Museum, home of Glasgow's world renowned transport collection. The event was widely publicised on city websites and visitor and tourism sites. We were given the opportunity to come along with some colourful displays on dogs (Year of the Dog!) as well as to bring along material that children could use. The youngsters saw examples of early stamp collage postcards which were commonly produced in China and Hong Kong in the 1890s for sale to visitors. They were encouraged to produce their own collages.

We had also collected British stamps showing dogs and these were used by the children to send postcards to themselves, friends or family. Many children have received very little personal mail so this helps them realise how our mail systems operate. Our Society also produced a flier which was distributed to pupils at our school stamp club as well as other places. Most of the events were organised by a Chinese–Scottish charity called Ricefield Arts and the team of over 20 volunteers started setting up in one of the Kelvin Hall's large sports halls on the morning of the event. They had even organised a Lion Dance with the "Lion" travelling between venues. This generated a lot of interest and excitement.

Children attending were issued with a sheet on which to collect stickers with each table or display providing a different sticker. This encouraged them to visit each display. At our table we had a constant flow of children and parents and our 100 "Year of the Dog" postcards ran out in the first hour or so. We estimate that in total several hundreds, perhaps up to 500, parents and children visited our display and activity tables. Many parents expressed interest and some were very enthusiastic about encouraging their children to start collecting stamps. Where we could, we provided starter packs for these children. We are planning further events in collaboration with the Museum service and will target different groups including the retired. We would like to spread interest in the various aspects of our hobby and perhaps encourage new members to join a local society. Working with the local museum service seems a very good way of doing this and targeting suitable groups.

I wondered why two collectors sitting side by side muttered to each other "he's a dealer" as if that justified him paying the highest price...

but did it really? What was the real reason? How could a beader pay real reason? How could a Deader pay the ligher price than a Collector? It doesn't make sense, does it? Collectors are customers. Customers usually pay the highest price, unless, for a Collector, this was...

Wrong Presentation Wrong Place X therefore Wrong Price X

Fast-forward 48 years later to a fleitish Empire collection, lot 31 in an International Stamp Auction - Estimated at \$3,900, but we were the highest hidder at \$21,000 - YES - some 7-higher Including Buyer's Premium in the extraordinary sum of \$4,788 we actually paid GBP\$25,788- upon a \$3,000 - estimate. however, we broke it down into sets, singles, mini-collection.

tions etc. We made a profit. Some might say it found its price. Others may say:

Understanding the problem... I always remember the car trade had their own little 'bible' - Glass's Guide. I've no idea. I've not even looked - in this internet-dominated world, it may even have disappeared. Well, there's an insider Stamp Trade publication for Stamp Dealers called "The Philatelic Exporter'. There's nothing that special about it - and you won't learn much or find massively reduced prices by subscribing - BUT - it is a forum, a paper focal point, a last 'bastion in this on-line transparent world that we inhabit, whereby dealers (and auctioneers) can try and conmunicate with each other. I publish my own articles there.

Recently I discussed the outcome of my 10 years' simple research, asking dealers and auctioneers 'what is your biggest problem?'

To a man, (why are we almost all men), they replied - "my biggest problem is stock, if I can get more of the right stock I can sell it easily"

Strange that, nebody ever asked me the same question back – because my answer would have been entirely different (and 1 don't treat it as a problem) – I seek to satisfy collectors

This is the reason why my company has such massive advertising. This is the reason why we spend up to 886 of timover—up to \$200,000 per anum in marketing costs. (Most dealers don't even sell \$200K per ammuni.

So, although few will tell you this, it's clearly evident that the problem for most Sellers of Stamps today is no longer absent stock - but absent collectors in the place they choose to sell their stamps in. Simply put, other Dealers, Auctions, Stamp Fairs have not invested in marketing to have a strong Customer-core. To be fair, this is not true of all - but it is true of most - so that our nearest competitor 'Apex' had 800 bidders in a recent auction. In my most recent 20,000+ lot UPA 68th Auction we had 2,184 different bidders from 58 different countries, 95% of whom were Collectors. Some other welladvertised auctions only have 200 bidders (a high percentage of whom are dealers - so that, essentially they are Dealer-dominated auctions) - so that when you sell through them you're paying up to 18% (including VAT) seller's commission and the buyer is paying up to 25% and more in Buyer's Premium, credit card fees, on-line bidding fee, delivery and insurance etc... AND all of that so that your stamps may be sold, wait for it - TO DEALERS (and some collectors), but Dealers, that naturally must make a profit to survive.

Now, let's examine the cost implications Example: Your stamp collection sells in public auction for \$800. Upon a 25% buyer's premium, the dealer pays \$1,000 and it could be more. Generally 'time' is the enemy in our lives, and for most dealers not being able to sell stock. Now is the time to let 'time' do the 'heavy-lifting' and consider making 'time' work for you, so that at UPA you can make time your friend.

AND the PRINT? Some lots are too small in value for us to offer this system. Other lots may not be suited to selling in this manner (e.g. surplus must British decimal stamps best used for postage) - especially if the market is heavily compromised by stock overhang in specific areas. Some Collectors will not wish to use time and systems to leverage price, others will want to agree a specific price and know that they are paid precisely this amount. No client is treated like a number and no client is forced like a square peg into a round hole.

15 OK, What Do I Do Next?

a). You contact UPA to discuss with Andrew or a highly-qualified Auction ValuerDescriber what you have to dispose of and your options bearing in mind your specific interests / requirements




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THE ABPS CONGRESS MEDAL FOR 2018

The ABPS Awards Committee has awarded the 2018 Medal to Erene Grieve

who was nominated by Haverfordwest Philatelic Society.



Erene's name will be known to many for the tremendous amount of work she has done for young collectors. In 1997 she had the idea to get more children interested in stamps by setting up stamps clubs in schools. Erene started in the schools in Pembrokeshire where she lives and still runs four school clubs and a church group herself. For many years Erene has travelled all over the United Kingdom running workshops in over 500 schools. This has involved a remarkable 1000 workshops reaching 30,000 children.

The children in Pembrokeshire, under Erene's guidance, have for many years been involved in competition at federation, national and international level. Haverfordwest Philatelic Society hold youth presentation evenings and the members are always amazed at how many cups and medals the children have won. This is all due to Erene's work and encouragement.

Erene Grieve has been recognised for her youth work over the years. She won the Rowland Hill Initiative Award for personal contributions to youth in 1998 and 2003. The British Museum nominated her for the Marsh Trust Volunteers for Museum Learning Award in 2012 which she won.

Other youth work in which Erene takes an active part is as a member, for the last 18 years, of the National Youth Stamp Club (now Stamp Active). Since 2007 she has been the South Wales Federation Youth Officer and the Youth Coordinator for the Raflet Postal Stamp Club for the past 17 years.

Haverfordwest Philatelic Society has benefitted from Erene's enthusiasm for the hobby. She has been Chairman from 2002 to 2017 and is now the Secretary. Erene Grieve is a very worthy winner of the ABPS Congress Medal for 2018.

Each year the Federation of European Philatelic Associations awards medals and certificates to philatelists and philatelic societies in various categories who make an exceptional contribution to European philately.


The awards for 2017 have been announced and Great Britain has won awards in two sections.

'Don' Donnovan

In February we learnt about *German Inflation* from **John Rawlins**. He began before WWI, demonstrating that inflation was already a problem before the war began. He took us through the war years and through the out-ofcontrol post-war inflation to its sudden. successful revaluation with clear and informative explanations of the various stages. Later that month, **Don Davies FRPSL** gave us A very varied display. He opened with the first issue of Chile including the forgeries and reprints from the original plates. He then explained the forgeries of UK Machins that have appeared since 1993, followed by censorship of GB seaside comic postcards, highlighting the disparities of opinion between towns. The bisecting of banknotes for sending through the post revealed that numbers were not always rematched! Irish St Patrick's Day postcards with incorrect flags were followed by mail franked with trading stamps, etc. His display ended with his London 1990 Gold Medal-winning collection of Victoria. Bexley

Geoff Birch and Adrian Smith offered a joint display on Official Paid Mail to open our 2017 season. Marked 'OHMS', items shown included an 1807 Christmas Day card marked 'OHMS', from Dover to Marylebone Park. Geoff showed over 100 Swiss 'pro patria' postcards, a series started in the 1930s. In October, Don Davies displayed Early GB Postal History, pointing out that despite the issuing of Penny Blacks in 1840, users of the post need not actually buy one to send correspondence until the 1850s. They could either prepay the letter without a stamp, signified by a red mark, or ask the recipient to pay on delivery. He went on to show examples of the general public confusion of the purpose of the postage stamp, misunderstood to be some kind of seal for placing on the back. He also pointed out the 'NB' (North Britain) designation on letters, finally discontinued in the 1890s because of confusion with New Brunswick, Canada, It dates back to 1603. He also showed a much rarer 'SB', (South Britain). John Shaw offered examples and insights from his role on the expert committee of the Royal's expertising operation, which uses forensic equipment, research and knowledge to judge whether stamps

are genuine or forgeries. Since established in 1894, the group now processes some 350-400 every six weeks. He showed examples – sadly not all

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

2018 began with **Stuart Henderson** showing Stuart Entertains with Odds and Ends. These ranged from Belgium to Burma, from National Savings Stamps to dog licences and various fakes and forgeries. February's first meeting was on *Postage Due* with several members presenting from Hong Kong, Switzerland, Southern Rhodesia, Norway, Italy and GB examples of ½d charges. Later Ray **How** travelled from snowy Rochford to show us The Flights of Ireland. The earliest shown were of early material from 1831 showing balloon flight from Marseille to Belfast. We saw examples of mail first shipped and then flown until the direct and linking flights developed in the 1930s. There were a number of accidents resulting in 'Crash Mail' salvaged from the wreckage. Given the pre-war enmity of Nazi Germany towards the Polish nation and her territory, it was clear that the war would have its origins in that sphere. The build-up of invasion forces, the speed of the campaign, the destruction of vast areas and major loss of life were clearly depicted. Of particular note were fine coloured postcards having such captions as 'The Great March into Poland'. 'On the Road to Victory', 'Heinkel He 111 Warplanes over Warsaw' and 'Workers' Regiment defending Warsaw'. Forced labour, resettlement programmes and internment camps added to the mix. Yet out of this carnage and unspeakable misery a

range of postal services emerged -German, Polish and Jewish, rising phoenix-like from the ashes. Albert's fabulous material included absolute gems in three hugely rare postcards from Russian camps associated with the Katvn massacre. These were among the very few items posted out before the inmates were executed and the camps closed down. The account of Poland in wartime was not limited here to the early occupation. There was also a fascinating consideration of the turning tide. Russia's eventual massive and sustained assault on Hitler's Eastern front had huge implications on Poland and her marshalled Polish military forces. Albert provided very considerable insights also into the Polish worldwide diaspora and resettlement programmes.

Julian explained that in the early days the fee went to the postmaster for the extra work entailed in handling mail after the post office had closed. Eventually it was decided that the fee should go to the Post Office and should therefore be shown to have been paid by adding the appropriate additional stamps. Different rates were applied with the late fee increasing as the time for the mail bags to be sealed moved closer. Many businesses were prepared to pay high fees to ensure that their mail got to their destinations without delay, particularly for mail going abroad which had to arrive at the ports on time to catch the appropriate boat. Ben's display likewise contained an amazing array of covers with multiple and mixed frankings, in some cases consisting of four or more different values to make up particular rates. He concentrated on the foreign rates prior to joining the UPU. Amongst the 'prized' items were registered items, both single (UK only) and double (i.e. registration in this country and in the foreign country also) and multiple frankings for heavy items (one was 24 x franked!). Ben showed covers to every country/state in Europe and a range of covers going to destinations across the world.

In March we were treated to a display of *Expo '58 Brussels World Fair* given by **Mark Bailey FRPSL**. Mark began

with the items that were produced from

1955 to publicise the Fair. There were slogan postmarks from various parts of Belgium, meter marks from participating organisations, and Belgian Publicity (Publibel) postal stationery cards. The earliest stamp issue for the Expo was from Belgium, later reissued when the postal tariff was increased. Mark's display also embraced stamps issued by all the other participating countries (and the United Nations), plus Bulgaria which was not at the World's Fair but issued a commemorative stamp anyway. The material included publicity labels from a number of countries (in particular Czechoslovakia) and examples of some of the sets of matchbox labels that were sold to some of the 41 million people who visited. Unusual items included invitations to fashion shows held in the Italian Pavilion in September 1958, parcel labels with special Customs Exemption from the Expo '58 organising society, and a large Postal Souvenir containing a silk handkerchief that could be mailed. The

first half of the display covered the period leading up to the opening of the World's Fair on 17 April 1958, and the second half dealt with all the stamps issued whilst the Expo was being held, and afterwards. Mark completed his display with items relating to the celebration in 2008 of the 50th Anniversary of Expo 58.

Because competition entries vary in length, match the scope to the number of pages. The three key elements that the speakers constantly emphasised were "Tell a Story", "Constrain the Title" and "Comply with the Rules of the Class". This was demonstrated very well in the analyses of the attendees' first page submissions, where many times the title was either too broad, or the content did not reflect the title and plan. A beneficial motto to close on was "Do not forget, personal study and research will distinguish you from the crowd".

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
