

Do your members pay their subscription by card or by Paypal?

Additional charges for paying with a credit or debit card or Paypal were banned across the EU as from Saturday 13th January 2018.

The ban means that it is unlawful to charge additional fees when someone uses a particular credit or debit card or other payment system like PayPal to make a payment.

So-called 'surcharging' had become commonplace and there have been many instances where the additional charges are far higher than it costs to process the payment.

The new rules will be enforced by Trading Standards who will have the power to take civil enforcement action against organisations who breach the regulations. It will also entitle customers to receive a refund of any unlawful surcharge they have paid.

A Farewell Letter from Winchester & District Stamp Society

The Winchester & District Stamp Society was established in November 1948 by just a handful of Members, three of whom were Commander Gunn, Colonel Dickson and Commander Collins. It very soon afterwards started to attract more members. Mr L Cox and James Parsons come to mind and two of the oldest surviving members John Warren and Mike Vokes.

I951 was the year of The Festival of Britain. E H Archard was Secretary then and J W Parsons was Treasurer. Winchester & District Stamp Society together with Winchester City organised and arranged the Exhibition held from Tuesday 13th to Saturday 21st July in the Banqueting Hall of the Guildhall. On the first day opening was at 12 noon, other days were from 11am to 7pm. Two hundred and fifty sheets were on display for the five days. It must have been after this Exhibition that the Society's Postal History Collection was formed.

Very little information of our society is available as the whereabouts of the early (1948 to 1965) minutes book and the signing-in register are not known. I joined the Society in 1978. We met in the conference room at the Royal Hotel, and then at the Library Room at Peter Symonds College. From there we came to the Winchester Conservative Club as it was then known.

Over the years, membership rose to over one hundred and fifty and most of these took the stamp exchange packet. In the 1980s and 1990s we had three circuits for the packet but since then members have either moved away from the district or aging has taken its course.

In 1981, an exhibition was held in the conference room at the Royal Hotel here in Winchester. Many other philatelic societies were invited to take part and it was then that many so-called unknown postmarks came to light. This exhibition could have been the first "spark" to the establishment of the Hampshire Postal History Society. Our society has done so much good work in the past.

Another time during the 1980's Gillian and I went to Fleet to collect a vanload of frames for an exhibition and stamp fair that the society organised to be held in the Guildhall, afterwards we returned the frames to Fleet.

Gradually over the next 30 years membership has dwindled quite slowly and we have been concerned about this as very few newcomers have come forward to join our society and yet there are hundreds of stamp collectors in and around Winchester. By enrolling in our society, they could learn so much more to enhance their own collections and enjoy meeting and exchanging views with fellow members.

We have had some super presentations and displays and many fluent speakers over the years. I am sure we have all learnt a considerable amount especially on how to set up a presentable philatelic sheet - I know that I have - but it has been difficult not to copy others.

Since I was elected to be Secretary in 2009, I have always tried to talk people into being members. These people are the ones who either email or phone me to ask if I know where they can sell their inherited stamp collection, always first day covers and modern stamps. I tell them to use the stamps for postage and donate the first day covers to a charity or join us. They never join us; they just want the money. Like I said earlier there are a lot of collectors out there but they don't believe in joining a stamp club.

Now we are to wind-up our society but before we do may I remind you of one thing. The Postal History Collection is to be given away to the City Records Office and may never surface again as a collection.

Amersham & District 60th Anniversary

We will celebrate our 60th birthday by holding a stamp fair on Saturday 27th October this year at the usual venue Amersham Community Centre. which is only about 300 metres to the right from the exit of Amersham Railway Station. Our membership is slightly more than 100. The regular meetings with a speaker are usually supported by 20/25 members, but our four auctions per year draw in double these numbers. Quite a few members also bid by post. We hold meetings on alternate Thursday evenings with breaks over the festive season and the summer months July and August. Most meetings are held in the Barn Hall, but the larger Drake Hall is required for our popular auctions, which are very well organised by Les and Liz Gwilliam and represent our main source of revenue. We also run a system of circulating packets which generates a second helpful source of income. As a result our financial position is healthy, which allows us to charge only a nominal subscription. We are affiliated to ABPS and Middlesex Philatelic Federation both of whom offer good support. In common with all philatelic clubs in Britain our main problem is our ageing membership as well as the difficulty of attracting younger collectors. Visitors and new members are always made very welcome. In 2008 The Queen kindly gave permission to Michael Sefi, Keeper of the Royal Philatelic Collection to display several frames as the highlight of our 50th anniversary fair. Jim Drummond

Austrian Philatelic Society Celebrate 70 Years

We started life as the "Austrian Stamp Club of Great Britain" [ASCGB] and have become - through a series of advances and setbacks - the leading international organisation for English speaking collectors of Austro-Hungarian and Austrian Republic stamps, and their associated postal history. This year we celebrate 70 years of existence. It was founded on 1st January 1948 by Major Cowie and a small group of enthusiasts with the objective of "serving the interests of collectors of the postage stamps of Austria and fostering good fellowship between collectors in Great Britain and Austria". The early success of the club and an Austrian Philatelic Exhibition in Manchester in 1961 led to the enrolment of many new members and the subsequent issue of the Bulletin and a regular circulating Packet. The Bulletin continued until 1965 and was then re-launched as the present journal "Austria" under the editorship of John Giblin. We now have our third editor **Andy Taylor** and issue No. 204 will be published in October this year. Over the years the excellence of the journal has won it several awards. In 2000 the ASCGB amalgamated with the London based "Association of Austrian Philatelists" [AAP] to become the "Austrian Philatelic Society", thus uniting the two northern and southern-based stamp clubs. The club currently has almost 200 members in the UK and overseas. Despite the passing of several club stalwarts in recent years membership numbers remain fairly constant – an encouraging situation in these times of despondency about the future of philately. We have developed strong links with societies in Austria of which we are very proud, and have not only an extensive library of Austro-Hungarian literature, lovingly cared for by Joyce Boyer, but also an excellent informative website www.austrianpilately.com. Four postal auctions are held each year and the packet continues to thrive in the capable hands of **Barry** Clark. In September we will be holding our annual weekend convention, in Derby this year, when our 70-year anniversary will be marked with, amongst other things, a Grand Auction and celebratory dinner presided over by our President **Keith Brandon**. York Philatelic Society's 70th Anniversary buffet

More than 40 members and guests of York Philatelic Society – founded in September 1948 – attended a 70th Anniversary buffet on Tuesday 26th June. The chief guests were the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress of York, **Councillor Keith Orrell** and **Mrs Judith Orrell**. Councillor Orrell was sworn in as the 801st Lord Mayor of York in May this year. Also present were **Graham Winters**, Chairman of ABPS, representatives of the Yorkshire Philatelic Association; and the guest speaker, **Professor Tony Ward** of the University of York, who served for nearly 20 years as the Society's secretary. Guests viewed an exhibition of stamps from around the world which were issued in 1948, and stamps of later years commemorating events of that year – more than 50 A4 sheets covering 40 countries, and making a total of 453 stamps. The Society also unveiled its Anniversary mascot – a little cartoon character called 'Phil Atterly'. Phil was created by artist **Jo Claire** who lives in Old Malton, between York and

Scarborough. He is modelled on a red definitive 1st class stamp and, being a good Yorkshireman, wears a flat cap. The Lord Mayor commented that the exhibition vividly recalled the events of 1948, a gloomy year of rationing and rebuilding in post-war Britain, illuminated by the birth of HRH The Prince of Wales and of that great institution, the National Health Service. 1948 was also an important year for the Royal Air Force, which in that year celebrated its 30th Anniversary; and for women, who celebrated 20 years of universal suffrage. He also said that stamp collecting offered not only aesthetic

appeal, but was also useful in amassing information about geography, history and the different cultures of the world population. Philately knew no international boundaries, he said, and brought people together. It had been enthusiastically embraced by many diverse figures such as King George V and Field Marshal Erwin Rommel. He offered York Philatelic Society his warm congratulations on its 70th Anniversary.

A Jubilee Reminiscence

I am now compiling a new book on the philatelic history of the 1890 Penny Postage Jubilee which I hope will be published later this year. Stamp Tips articles, appearing on Local Radio and National TV promoting Philately with Alan Titchmarsh, Andrew's area of expertise is unusual - in so far as his grounding in collecting and wide philatelic knowledge han given him a deep understanding of Philately. He has studied Philadely for the past 45 years, an combination with Commerce and Marketing Expertise, enabling him to create synergies in Tiletime interlinked Stamp Selling Systems, selling unit-priced stamps through to handling collections & Rartiles up to £700,000 each. Inday Andrew is furtimate to be co-owner with his Wife, of Universal Philatelic Auctions (aka TIPA) - the Largest NoBuyer's Premium Reducing-Estimate System Stamp Auction in the World, creating records selling stamps to 2,261 different bidders from \$4 different countries in his latest auction. Andrew stopped collecting stamps aged 18 reasoning that his engoment of stamps would be in handing them and

it into 50 smaller units, advertised it in Stamp Magazine "Classifieds", and waited for the orders to roll in... I'm still waiting, 48 years later !...

Wrong Offer Wrong Price X

(naive seller - eme but I was only 15 at the time!)

Three years later, attending my first public stamp auctions I wondered how some hidders seemed to buy everything, paying the highest price? It didn't occur to me that they were probably Auction Bidding Agents, paid by absent (dealer) bidders to represent them. I wondered why two collectors sitting side by side muttered to each other "he's a dealer" as if that justified him paying the highest price...

but did it really? What was the real reason? How could a Dealer pay a higher price than a Collector? It doesn't make sense, does it? Collectors are customers. Customers usually pay the highest price, unless, for a Collector, this was.

Wrong Presentation Wrong Place X

3 Fast-forward 48 years later to a British Empire collection, lot #1 in an International Stamp Auction - Estimated at \$3,000, but we were the highest bidder at \$21,000 - YES - some 7shigher. Including Boyer's Fremium in the extraordinary sum of \$4,788 we actually paid GBFN25, 788 - upon a \$1,000 estimate... however, we broke it down into sets, singles, mini-collections etc. We made a profit. Some

might say it found its price. Others may say: Wrong Estimate X Wrong Presentation

Wrong Structure / Wrong Protection of Price / - Lucky for the seller that 2 well-healed bidders saw the potential value that

Understanding the problem... I always remember the car trade had their own little 'hible' - Glass's Guide. Eve no idea, I've not even looked - in this internet-dominated world, it may even have disappeared. Well, there's an insider Stamp Trade publication for Stamp Dealers called "The Philatelic Exporter". There's nothing that special about it and you won't learn much or find massively reduced prices by subscribing - BUT - it is a forum, a paper focal point, a last bastion' in this on-line transparent world. that we inhabit... whereby dealers (and auctioneers) can try and communicate with each other. I publish my own articles there ...

Recently I discussed the outcome of my 10 years' simple research, asking dealers and auctioneers 'what is your biggest problem?'

To a man, (why are we almost all men), they replied - "my biggest problem is stock, if I can get more of the right stock I can sell it easily"

Strange that, nobody ever asked me the same question back – because my arswer would have been entirely different (and I don't treat it as a problem) – I seek to satisfy collectors

This is the reason why my company has such massive advertising. This is the reason why we spend up to 8% of turnover—up to \$200,000 per amum in marketing costs. (Most dealers don't even sell-\$200K per ammm).



ATTENTION OWNERS OF LARGE/VALUABLE COLLECTIONS -

Why is that? Because, as the world revolved the Stamp Market, imperceptibly Changed, and incrementally —

Massively

So, although few will tell you this, it's clearly evident that the problem for most Sellers of Stamps today is no longer absent stock - but absent collectors in the place they choose to sell their stamps in. Simply put, other Dealers, Auctions, Stamp Fairs have not invested in marketing to have a strong Customer-core. To be fair, this is not true of all - but it is true of most - so that our nearest competitor 'Apex' had 800 bidders in a recent auction. In my most recent 20,000+ lot UPA 68th Auction we had 2.184 different bidders from 58 different countries, 95% of whom were Collectors. Some other welladvertised auctions only have 200 bidders (a high percentage of whom are dealers - so that, essentially they are Dealer-dominated auctions) - so that when you sell through them you're paying up to 18% (including VAT) seller's commission and the buyer is paying up to 25% and more in Buyer's Premium, credit card fees, on-line bidding fee, delivery and insurance etc... AND all of that so that your stamps may be sold, wait for it - TO DEALERS (and some collectors), but Dealers, that naturally must make a profit to survive...

Now, let's examine the cost implications - Example: Your stamp collection sells in public auction for \$800. Upon a 25% buyer's premium, the dealer pays \$1,000 and it could be more. He breaks it into \$2,000+ selling price (much lower and he'll go out of business). The auction charges you a seller's commission of up to 18% (VAT included) upon the \$800 sale price. This is GBP\$144. Therefore you receive approaching \$656 - which is approximately 33% of the dealer's \$2,000+/- retail selling price - BUT ... now that we have identified the problem ...

Fight to the Society of the Force 7

Why Pay an Auction to Sell to Dealers: Sell to Collectors instead? In our example with buyer's premium, sellers commission, lotting fees, extra credit card charges, VAT and even insurance - you're already being charged in different ways up to 40% of the selling price to sell, possibly or probably, to the wrong person.

Why not direct that 40% cost you're paying to sell to Collectors instead? Sounds good, so why hasn't this been done before?

Truth is, it Has been 8 done before...Sometimes the 'old' ways are the best ways aren't they? But in today's enthusiasm to obscure the obvious so that money may be taken, almost surreptitiously, in numerous different ways, (without us apparently noticing until we see the cheque in our pocket) the transparent 'seller pays' has been deliberately 'obscured' - so much so that, amazingly, the latest 2017 European Auction Selling Legislation just introduced - now requires auctions that charge 'buyer's premiums' to warn the buyer in advance. Just imagine going into the petrol station, and being warned that the price you're paying to put fuel in you tank is not the real price, you have to pay a premium! Obviously, there would be an uproar...




Below are scans of my completed album page with its notes and of the contents.

A recent student protest at Liverpool University demanded removal of the family

name from Gladstone Hall. W.E. failed to support fully its abolition in Britain in 1833. My





Lindy Bosworth brought A Czechoslovak Miscellany in May. The first dedicated airmail issue of eight stamps was introduced in December 1930 and a supplementary stamp issued in April 1939. We saw covers using the third Airmail issue, including Zeppelin-flown mail to far-flung destinations including Argentina and New Zealand. The display ended with a frame of "Why I collect Czechoslovakia" – postcards of Karlovy Vary/Karlsbad/Carlsbad where Lindy's father was born and lived before coming here in the 1930s. In June Marcus Sherwood-Jenkins presented Serbia. The first half of the evening included postal history and unusual combinations shown on cover. In WWI the Austrians and Germans invaded the north of Serbia whilst the Bulgarians invaded the south. Serbian troops fought with the allies and many ended up as Prisoners of War as evidenced by Red Cross mail. Nigel **Steer** entertained us with *Norway*. The first imperforate 4 skilling blue in 1855 with no country indication was replaced in 1856 by 4 different value stamps

bearing the head of King Oscar I and inscribed Norge. In 1871 the posthorn was introduced, still in use 148 years later, making it the most successful stamp in history. In 1905 Norway separated from Sweden and King Haakon VII of Norway stamps were issued. A postcard of the 1897 Balloon Expedition to the North Pole and souvenirs of other Norwegian Polar Exploration to the North and South Poles including Roald Amundsen, the ships Fram and Maud and Transpolar Flights were also displayed.

Huntingdonshire

At our meeting on the 22nd May Graham Wilde displayed Line engraved surface printed. This display covered the Line Engraved and Surface Printed Victorian Stamps of Great Britain. He began by showing the Penny Black and the eleven different plate numbers. There were varieties and repaired plates needed when the plate from which the stamps were printed was worn out. They still used Plate 2 when they changed to the penny red in 1858. Next came the Two Penny Blue with examples of plates one, two and three. Henry Archer developed a machine capable of perforating stamps. In 1850 after four years of trials the first perforated stamps came into use. There were four different Watermarks consisting of varieties of the Large Crown. In 1858 check letters were added to each corner as a safeguard against forgery. The second half started with CDS cancellations on the surface printed issues. We saw various shades and examples of the small, medium and large watermarks. The 1865 issue had large uncoloured letters in each corner. All the surface printed issues of Queen Victoria are perforation 14 with the exception of two five shillings, a ten shilling and a one pound value issued between 1867 and 1883 which were Perf 15½ × 15. De La Rue printed the stamps up until 1911. This was a

comprehensive display given by a knowledgeable speaker. David Birkert



The material shown in the frames opened with a letter sent in 1675 from Fort

Albany to Rotterdam, the earliest letter from the newly re-conquered Fort Orange. Nowadays Albany is where the first permanent Dutch settlement in New Netherland was. Included in the presentation was a cover, marked 'Post Payd', from the Lovelace Post of 1672/73, an effort by Francis Lovelace, who became Governor of New York Colony in 1668, to create a reliable line of discourse with the New England Confederacy.

South African Collectors



Thematic Cup and the Jimmy Page Cup for the best entry as voted by the membership.

The Hargreaves Trophy is 12 inches high and made of silver. Its hallmarks show us that it was made in 1938 in Birmingham by Deakin and Francis. This company is still trading (2017). In the 1930s George Hargreaves, a director of William Heatons Ltd of Lostock Junction provided the workforce with a trophy for annual competition. What it should be played for was up to the staff. Bowls was the chosen sport.

The trophy was engraved "The Hargreaves Cup for Yearly Competition". It was first played for in 1939 when the winner was S Faukener. Because of the War, the trophy was only played for once more, in 1940. Peace was declared in 1945 but it was another two years before the trophy was played for again. J Tinsley won it then and for the next two years. After three wins the trophy was given to Mr Tinsley to keep. On his death the trophy was passed to his daughter, Laura.

Around 1979 or 80 Laura donated the trophy to the nephew of its donor, Mr Raymond Hargreaves. She believed it should be played for once again in the village but it was for him to decide where it was to be placed. As a Philatelic Society had just been founded, and as Raymond Hargreaves was a founder member this was agreed to be the new home of the Hargreaves Cup for Yearly Competition. Since 1980 that is where the trophy has been played for. The four other cups have a lesser history. Three were donated by Jimmy Page, founder member and the Society's first Treasurer. Both the Postal

History and Thematic trophies were made by Jimmy himself and the cup bearing his name he

presented to the Society for whatever purpose they decided. The original Philatelic Trophy was lost. Its origin is unknown but it is most likely that this was also donated by Mr Page. A new trophy was given by Mr R Heap as replacement. We are grateful to Ray Hargreaves' son David Hargreaves for gathering this information for the society members.




