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

In those 25 years the nature of philately has changed somewhat certainly the number of local societies has fallen. Stamp shops have closed and school clubs are fewer than previously but we must not be pessimistic. Many items are still available for sale and those willing and able to use the Internet can purchase from almost anywhere in the world. There are still lots of active auctions and fairs which give a more hands-on approach. It is also clear that there are many collectors who enjoy their collecting in isolation. We can be aware of the situation and we can try to persuade them to come to society meetings occasionally especially if we know that there is something planned which might be of interest. But first of all we must be prepared to talk about what we enjoy in our collecting. something in my display. I am not good at entering competitions - I don't think that my material is good enough but then I didn't think that it was

If you can stand my sense of humour you could even try to persuade me to show at your society some time. I went to Congress in Gateshead this year so I was lucky enough to see one of the iconic stamps - the Swedish "Treskilling" Yellow, or three schilling banco error of colour. I never thought that I would see such a famous (and expensive) stamp and yet just by turning up I was able to see it on a frame just a foot away. What an experience! I went to Stampex too and saw more brilliant displays, spent too much as usual but came away with a sense of elation - this is what I like about our hobby - the kindness of people, the joy of filling the gaps in my collection, sharing what we have. Hampshire Philatelic Federation – Golden Anniversary Year – 2019 A meeting of representatives from societies interested in forming a Federation of Hampshire Philatelic Societies was held in Basingstoke on 9th July 1969. The inaugural meeting on 20th August 1969 elected the initial officers with Mr G Robinson as Chairman, Mr F Kiddle as Secretary and Mr A Parkhurst as Treasurer. At the next committee meeting on 20th October 1969 apologies were received from the by then president, Mr F B Howard-White, FRPSL. That minute goes on to recommend holding a convention in March 1970 in conjunction with BPA at Winchester. It was suggested to hold an inter-society competition at the convention consisting of two nine-sheet entries from each affiliated society. The society with the highest score would be awarded a trophy. It was also suggested that a talk on judging competitions be given with special reference to the convention's competition. Committee member Mr JAC Farmer had approached a local craftsman to carve a wooden shield with a Wyon or Machin head to form a trophy. Mr F Kiddle undertook to obtain the necessary permission from Mr Machin, and reported that Mr Howard-White would present the trophy to the Federation. The June 1975 AGM minute records that Mr J Kaluski was elected Chairman for 1975-76 and Mr C Philips was elected as Bulletin Editor.

Fifty years on and the Hampshire Federation runs an annual convention – HAMPEX – with an inter-society competition, now of two 16 sheet entries per society, for the Howard-White Trophy. There is also an individual 32 sheet competition for which the best entry is awarded the Jan Kaluski Cup. The entries are judged by nationally accredited judges on a separate day prior to being displayed at HAMPEX. The Bulletin continues with the same three issues per year under the stewardship of **Steve Gerrard** and the Federation Committee meets three times a year under the chairmanship of **Julian Jones** with **John Campbell** as Secretary and **Brian Hague** as Treasurer.

HAMPEX is host to some 20 dealers each year and the competition typically attracts 20 - 25 frames of competitive entries. The Federation was pleased to win the 2017 ABPS Inter-Federation competition against some tough and worthy competition. In an attempt to raise our game the Federation has run a seminar on "How to Tell a Story" in 2018 to improve the treatment of competitors' entries and displays generally and two societies have included competition workshops in their programmes.


Looking through some of our records we see many notable people in the

In 2008 the Wakefield Philatelic Society celebrated its 70th Anniversary. It also produced a Philatelic

2 Three years later, attending my first public stamp ders seemed to buy everything, paying the highest price? It didn't occur to me that they were probably Auction Bidding Agents, paid by absent (dealer) bidders to represent them. I wondered why two collectors sitting side by side muttered to each other "he's a dealer" as if that justified him paying the highest price...

...hut did it really? What was the real reason? How could a Dealer pay a higher price than a Collector? It doesn't muke sense, does it? Collectors are customers. Customers usually pay the highest price, unless... for a Collector, this was...

Wrong Presentation Wrong Place X

3 Fast-forward 48 years later to a British Empire collection, lot 41 in an Internation al Stamp Auction – Estimated at \$3,000, but we were the highest hidder at \$21,000 YES – some 7 shigher. Including Buyer's Premium in the extraordinary sum of \$4,788 we actually paid GBP\$25,788– upon a \$3,000 estimate – however, we broke it down into sets, singles, mini-collections etc. We made a profit. Some

might say it found its price. Others may say:

Presentation Place and Price

Understanding the problem... I always remember the car trade had their own little 'hibje' - Glass's Guide. Eve no idea, I've not even looked - in this internet-dominated world, it may even have disappeared. Well, there's an insider Stamp Trade publication for Stamp Dealers called "The Philatelic Exporter". There's nothing that special about it - and you won't learn much or find massively reduced prices by subscribing - BUT - it is a forum, a paper focal point, a last 'bastion' in this on-line transparent world. that we inhabit... whereby dealers (and auctioneers) can try and communicate with each other. I publish my own articles there ...

Recently 1 discussed the outcome of my 10 years' simple research, asking dealers and anctioneers 'what is your biggest problem?'

To a man, (why are we almost all neen), they replied – "my biggest problem is stock, if I can get more of the right stock I can sell it easily"

Strange that, nobody ever asked me the same question back - because my answer would have been entirely different (and 1 don't treat it as a problem) - I seek to satisfy collectors

This is the reason why my company has such massive advertising. This is the reason why we spend up to 8% of turnover - up to \$290,000 per annum in marketing costs. (Most dealers don) (even self \$200K per annum).

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5 Why is that? Because, as the world revolved the Stamp Market, imperceptibly *Changed*, and incrementally – Massively

So, although few will tell you this, it's clearly evident that the problem for most Sellers of Stamps today is no longer absent stock - but absent collectors in the place they choose to sell their stamps in. Simply put, other Dealers, Auctions, Stamp Fairs have not invested in marketing to have a strong Customer-core. To be fair, this is not true of all - but it is true of most - so that our nearest competitor 'Apex' had 800 bidders in a recent auction. In my most recent 20,000+ lot UPA 68th Auction we had 2.184 different bidders from 58 different countries, 95% of whom were Collectors. Some other welladvertised auctions only have 200 bidders (a high percentage of whom are dealers - so that, essentially they are Dealer-dominated auctions) - so that when you sell through them you're paying up to 18% (including VAT) seller's commission and the buyer is paying up to 25% and more in Buyer's Premium, credit card fees, on-line bidding fee, delivery and insurance etc... AND all of that so that your stamps may be sold, wait for it - TO DEALERS (and some collectors), but Dealers, that naturally must make a profit to survive...

Now, let's examine 0 the cost implications Example: Your stamp collection sells in public auction for \$\$00. Upon a 25% buyer's premium, the dealer pays \$1,000 and it could be more. He breaks it into \$2,000+ selling price (much lower and he'll go out of business). The auction charges you a seller's commission of up to 18% (VAT included) upon the \$800 sale price. This is GBP\$144. Therefore you receive approaching \$656 - which is approximately 33% of the dealer's \$2,000+/- retail selling price - BUT ... now that we have identified the problem ...

7 Why Pay an Auction to Sell to Dealers: Sell to Collectors instead ?In our example with buyer's prenium, sellers commission, lotting fees, extra credit card charges, VAT and even insurance - you're already being charged in different ways up to 40% of the selling price to sell, possibly or probably, to the wrong person. Why not direct that 40% cost you're paying to sell to Collectors instead? Sounds good, so why hasn't this been done before ?

How can you cut C out the middleman and sell to Collectors instead? Well, I can think of two ways. 1). DIY - Do It Yourself selling on eBay. That may be fine for lower grade material - but, would you risk auctioning relatively unprotected rare material on eBay ? We don't and we're professionals, so we should know what we're doing. Or 2). 

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ABPS Awards: Good News for Federations

The Guidelines for the Award of Merit state that a person who does exceptional service for British Philately should be nominated for the Award by the body for which the service has been rendered.

There was a difficulty in the case of Federations because they have a special status within ABPS. They are members without paying a per capita fee but they have no voting rights. Consequently, they were unable to propose a person who is eligible for an award.

The Awards Committee proposed at the AGM held on 27th July 2018 that Federations should be included in the category of nominators for ABPS Awards. This was seconded and was approved by all those present. The Awards Committee has said 'goodbye' to **Frank Soutar** and **Pat Rothnie** who wished to retire after many years of service on the Committee. We have welcomed **John Davies** and **Steven Harrison** who have joined the existing members **John Baron**, **Nigel Gooch**, **John Jackson** and **Brian Sole**. Societies and Federations are urged to consider who, within their membership, has done outstanding voluntary work for British Philately over a number of years and then submit a nomination for an award which is on the ABPS website together with guidelines. PHILATELIC CONGRESS OF GREAT BRITAIN 2018

In 1909 the first Congress was held in Manchester, so this year's, held at the end of July in The Jurys Inn Gateshead, overlooking the River Tyne, was the 100th. Congress was chaired by officers of two local philatelic societies: **Roy Richardson** and **Val Beeken**. It proved to be very popular with 108 people attending.

The first event was a fine presentation by **David McMonagle** *Philatelic Art Gallery*. This was a display of illustrated envelopes beginning with the 1840 Mulreadys. He included penny blacks on cover, military and attractive commercial advertising covers. Prior to the next display, there was a surprise treat: Roy Richardson arranged for a magnificent special cake to celebrate the 100th Congress. The title of **Mike Gibson**'s display was *The River Tyne*, which was a fascinating local history of the area helped by local postcards and ephemera. **Tony Walker** gave the last presentation

of the day entitled World War I and the Battles of Coronel and The Falkland Islands 1914. Dinner was preceded by a reception kindly provided by Stamp



Insurance Services. In addition to listening to presentations, we like those attending to participate in this event. Their chance came after dinner in the light hearted 4 sheets to tell a story competition. This attracted a lot of entries. All the delegates voted resulting in **John Hotchner** being declared the winner.

The official opening of

Congress was by the Mayor of Gateshead, Councillor Jill Green. This year to mark the milestone the Philatelic Congress of Great Britain Study Group provided a superb standing display of Congress material for the years up to 1940. **Gerald Marriner**, Chairman of ABPS Congress Committee, and **Colin Searle** enthusiastically escorted the Mayor around this display explaining some of the items. Then Colin Searle, founder of the PCGB Study Group, gave an entertaining Powerpoint relating to this display.

The Kay Goodman lecture followed. This was a paper given by **Michael Lockton**. The title was *The Future of*

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Philately. This was a shortened version of a comprehensive report by members of the W4 group (made up from Fellows and Members of the Royal Philatelic Society London). The full paper can be seen on the ABPS website. Delegates joined in a long discussion after lunch. The final event of the morning was the AGM of ABPS. The annual Ceremony of the signing of the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists was held at the Assembly Rooms in Newcastle. The Congress Medal is also presented at this event. This year, the Congress medal was presented to **Erene Grieve** for her work with young collectors over many years. There were four new signatories.

Erene's thought-provoking subject was Why aren't Youngsters Interested in Stamps Anymore. Erene explained to the delegates how we can all get involved in attracting the younger generation to the hobby. The four new RDPs then gave short presentations, beginning with Robert Abensur. His title was French Offices in the Levant containing postal history between 1837 and 1849. Geoffrey Lewis followed with his presentation entitled What is Obvious to Some is not Obvious to Others. He showed postal history material that was not quite as it first appeared. Gustaf Douglas then presented his display entitled Sweden Number One and Subsequent Important Gems. This turned out to be one of the most memorable highlights of the weekend. One of the rare stamps he displayed was the famous Treskilling Yellow error of colour. Being able to see this very famous error written up on an album sheet at close quarters was a surprise for us all. The final RDP display was given by Dr Cheryl Ganz who brought Zeppelin Matchmaker. She showed various Zeppelin items which had been reunited. Her display included a crash mail cover from the Hindenburg's last disastrous flight in 1937. Two local dealers were in attendance during the Saturday afternoon: Corbitt Stamps and Mark Bloxham, who also kindly sponsored the drinks reception prior to the Saturday evening banquet, held at the Crown Plaza Hotel in Newcastle. Neil Ritchie provided the first display on the Sunday morning: Canadian Expeditionary Force 1914 - 1919. He was

followed by **Martino Laurenzi** who had flown over from America just to present his display of Communications Between Italy and Great Britain During The Great War. The postal history began before the outbreak of war and went on to show how communications were affected.

Martino was awarded the Stanley Gibbons Cup for the best presentation of Congress – an award he richly deserved. Congress concluded as usual with a wide variety of standing displays

After the 13 weeks summer break eight members displayed at our first meeting of the 2018/19 season *Fill-a-Frame using the letters O, P or Q.* As usual



the members showed considerable imagination with titles World Overprints, Overprint Machins, Princes & Queens, GB Officials, Paquebots of Japan, Orange Free State Occupation (by the British), Oman and a rag tag of two very Old Albums and unusual Postage Dues, including one from Aberdeen where a 2p stamp had been applied instead of a second class stamp! In the first display Roger Elliston had invested much time and skill in producing a display of two frames of overprints from numerous countries. Our second meeting was an auction which was fairly successful, attended by 40 members and visitors. On 4th October Peter Pugh and his wife **Rosemary** drove all the way from Rugby to give us an exceptional presentation Another Bloody Railway. Despite the disparaging title the subject was most absorbing, being the Trans Siberian Railway from 1898 until 1914, which provided a much quicker postal route from Europe to China than via Suez. Ayrshire

Our new president, **John Chalmers**, opened the new season with his inaugural display for *President's Night* in September. He began with stamps from the German colonies pre-1919, followed by issues from Allenstein, Memel and Danzig post-Versailles. We then jumped to WWII with German issues for Bohemia/Moravia and the occupation of Poland, followed by an interesting range of the allied occupation stamps, including French and Russian issues. The second half of the evening continued with German stationery from 1873 to 1938, including the inflation period when postage jumped from 20M in June to 4000M by September. He finished more locally with The History of the Auchencruive Estate, Oswald Hall, Mount Hamilton, which became the factor's residence, and correspondence to Patrick Cambell, who was factor 1804-1836. The second meeting was a bourse and then in October we were treated to a veritable feast of Early German philatelic material from the collection of Dr Stewart Gardiner. We saw unfamiliar stamps from German local town posts of the 1860s to 1900s including bogus issues and forgeries of

bogus issues, and a commemorative envelope of 1889 featuring Roland Hill and James Chalmers as inventors of the postage stamp. Then came Kamerun and Togo up to their occupation and loss after WWI. His second round featured stamps from the various German states prior to the creation of the German Empire in 1871. Those states too small to make their own arrangements often used the

services of the family-run Thurn & Taxis postal service.

Barnet & District

At the first Members' Evening of the year, no less than 10 members gave displays of their Latest Acquisitions. **Trevor Milton** set the evening off to an excellent start by showing us covers and complete sheets of souvenir stamp issues from Philatelic Congresses, some going back to as early as 1913. Other displays included postcards showing local scenes, postcards showing early railway development around Potters Bar. RAF commemoration, missent Royal Mail, humorous postcards, complete sheets of Australian Olympic winners (2000), a Penny Black damaged during printing, some Barbados Victorian proofs and some as vet uncatalogued Commonwealth flaws. The evening wound up with a most illuminating display from new member Gerry **Treptow** showing some of the thematic material on Firefighting that he had been collecting since the early 1960s the highlight being a card franked by the 1970 German Voluntary Relief Services 30pf honouring the firefighting service, that being particularly pertinent as he had spent some time persuading the German postal service to include honouring firefighters amongst their commemorative issues. Basildon

In July Stuart Henderson stepped in at short notice to show a wide range of banknotes including a £1 million note printed for the film of the same name, bogus Confederate notes and British Armed Forces emergency standby

currency. Then came revenue licences, registered mail from holiday camps and a whole host of other paper ephemera. David Rossall Later Paul Green showed Jamaica. also at short notice, due to illness. After a brief history of Jamaica and its posts, his stamp issues started from 1870 with plate proofs in blocks of four. He collected issues up to, but not including, Jamaica's independence. Postal stationery included telegraph forms of Queen Victoria, newspaper wrappers and airletters. He also produced unstamped postcards printed by prisoners in 1877. His display ended with postal history from 1756 to the patriotic labels from both world wars. Next we welcomed Richard Husband and Rufus Barnes from Cambridge. Richard brought The Story of Perfins. Copestake & Sloper persuaded the GPO to allow perfins. The Sloper machine was explained and he showed the use of perfins on postal stationery. Rufus followed with Abu Dhabi, starting with British overprints used at the agency office from 1963-1966, and continued to when it joined the United Arab Emirates. He then displayed Burma fantasy issues and TPOs. As our third replacement Christopher Cooksey showed us Rhodesia from

the early issues of the British South Africa Company to the Admirals issue, the 1959 definitives and its Post-UDI successors to 1978. *Len Stanway*

Bexley

In May, presentations from Redhill included The GB Swiftair overseas priority mail service, 1980-2003, US naval mail, a thematic display The history of first class mail, The Croydon aerodrome (closed in 1956) and New Zealand health series of charity stamps. At the next meeting, Cliff Avres provided a philatelic account of the History of the World Cup Football Tournament - looking forward to the competition that started a month later. Following the AGM, Pat Adams provided an interesting presentation about Norway and Spitzbergen, the arctic islands far north of the European mainland used as a whaling base, then abandoned until the 20th century, when a colony was established for coal mining. At the next meeting, members came out in a show of force for the Members' Displays. They included KGVI Silver Wedding Issue, early postcards, German inland postcards, Haiti 1934-1950, a thematic display of stagecoaches, and a display of railways. There was even a postmortem tribute: former club president Frank Parsons gave a presentation



taken from his late wife **Pat**'s extensive collection. Pat, who died in June, was remembered in a service at Eltham Crematorium a month later. Club member **Mike** Thompson read the eulogy, recalling fond memories of postcard collecting. Pat was a member of Bexley, serving on the committee for many years, Sidcup stamp club, and the Kent Postal History Group. In September **Malcolm Cole** gave an excellent presentation on *The Red Cross*. He explained that it all began with Henri Dunant and his horrific experiences with the wounded on the battlefield after the Battle of Solferino in 1859, when Napoleon defeated the Austrians. The presentation then followed the development of National Societies and the League of Red Cross Societies, through to International Conferences. Using stamps, covers and postcards he demonstrated how the Red Cross symbol had developed

over the years, along with the organization itself and the introduction and evolution of ambulance trains. hospital ships, and horse and motor ambulances. It included an interesting range of fund-raising material in the form of cinderellas, labels, ephemera, etc together with post sent to and from POW camps during WWI. In August Grace Davies gave a display entitled "Peace – Pages from a Collection." Peace is a broad theme and Grace brought 200 pages and a PowerPoint presentation to illustrate its many aspects. The material was deliberately varied to provide something for everybody - stamps, postal history, first day covers, letters, postcards, cinderella items, posters, and original artwork of all sorts. Members' Dav resulted in four members displaying: David Carr - Snakes, Simon McArthur - The Liberation of the Netherlands in WWII. Arnold Carsten - Cross Border Parcels in Europe and Vice Chairman. The season began with a Gold medal winning collection of German East Africa 1941-1917 by Michael Farrant, who opened by explaining the postal arrangements existing for GEA (now Tanzania) when war was declared in 3rd August 1914. The Allied campaign effectively cut off the colony other than via Portuguese East Africa, (Mozambigue). We heard of SMS Königsberg, a light cruiser on station and hidden there. Early in 1916 a blockade runner reached the colony bringing not only war supplies but fresh stamps and new "16" year date slugs for the cancellations. These were distributed to the remaining German

post offices and are guite scarce being restricted to a few weeks or even days in some places. Michael was able to present a vivid picture of the events as they unfolded backed up by suitable rare or even unique items. We also enioved Graham Booth's display of The Five Antarctic Voyages of Admiral *Byrd*. Graham displayed many covers, photos and other memorabilia, much of it philatelic, to promote Byrd and the expeditions, but some crew and personal letters were included. Philip **Cant** brought *Titanic*, *From Cradle to* Grave. The story of Titanic is well known, so it was good to see the wide range of photos, cuttings, and other ephemera connected to the ship and its ill-fated voyage, as well as many of the stamps issued for the centenary in 2012. → David on 02087787001. Chelmsford & District

Andy Soutar and Robert Mason from Ipswich opened the new season. Andy's display was a miscellany of materials including a selection of stamps from Colonial French Africa through to federalisation. He also showed stamps featuring Cameroon and explained the history of the region. Robert followed with Russia following the 1992 breakup of the Soviet Union, including a number of stamps for the Russian Federation, with some large relatively unknown countries. For the next meeting Rufus Barnes divided his presentation into two parts, the first being Christmas Island located in the Indian Ocean. The first post office opened in 1900 as part of Straits Settlement postal services with Straits Settlement stamps bearing an identifiable postmark from the island. the earliest in his possession being one

for incoming post from Glasgow in 1898. He followed with material covering Tokelau, previously known as the Union Islands. Originally part of the Gilbert and Ellice Islands whose stamps they used, they were transferred to New Zealand control and administered from Western Samoa in 1926. Samoan stamps were used until 1948 when the islands issued their own, From Colchester, Maureen Evans brought Easter Island. It was originally run by Peru, but has been administered by Chile since 1888. There was no postal system on the island until 1952. She finished with material from her display on stamps of Maps, mapping techniques and the *history of mapping.* → Dave Everard davideverard@live.com or 01245465506 David Everard

Croydon

In July **Nigel Chandler** showed *Tobago* which changed hands 31 times before finally becoming British in 1814. Nigel started with a GB stamp cancelled by the

Tobago Bar Oval 14 handstamp. The 1879 stamps began as fiscal but soon were for postage. There were bisects, overprints, varieties and flaws and then examples of Tobago stamps, including forgeries, used in other islands. Then came postal history including an 1837 Tobago Fleuron addressed to Glasgow. Unusual destinations included Montenegro (1895) and San Marino (1896). In 1899 Trinidad and Tobago came into being but stamps for this did not come into being until 1913. 10 members produced material for the August meeting. David Rennie was followed by Chris Hitchen, Robert Raju, Richard West, John Ray, Chris Board, Paul Percival, Brian Asquith, Frank Simpson and Pauline **MacBroom**. As should be expected the displays were very varied and interesting. The next month Alan Tyler took us to Palestine. Until WWI it was part of the Ottoman Empire. British and Anzac troops opened an offensive in October 1917 and took Jerusalem in December. The first stamps, inscribed E.E.F. (Egyptian Expeditionary Force). were issued by the British Military Authorities in February 1918. Numerous errors and varieties, missing dots, inverted overprints and military cancellations were shown. The story continued through Mandate to the start of the State of Israel in 1948 and on to Israeli stamps used in Gaza after the Six Days War in 1967.

Dundee and District

Sadly the first meeting of the new session started with a one minute silence in memory of a long standing member, Sandy Sloss. The president, **David Millar**, then displayed Victorian Mail with examples of the development of cancellation methods and cross writing that proved a challenge to read. He also sought help - with some success - in deciphering a number of words that Victorian handwriting style had proved difficult to read. The interesting history of the covers had required hours of internet searching. Richard Cuthbertson, of Scottish PS. displayed part of his Macau collection including most of the issues from 1910 to 1920 with varieties of overprints,

paper type and colour. This was followed by stamps and covers up to the 1950s. *Colin Campbell*

On 20th September displays were given by two Club members. The first was of GB Victorian Cancellations by Jim McHardy who started with a brief story of the postage costs until 1840. He then gave examples of different Maltese crosses before moving on to a variety of cancellations with numbers and combinations of numbers and letters, explaining their usage. Later sections included circular cancellations and sub-post office identification numbers. The second display was of Advertising Cards from the 1908 Franco-British Exhibition by Mrs Jean Osborne. Many of the cards were issued by companies now extinct, but several are still known brands today such as Schweppes, Price and Bovril. In each case Jean presented a history of the companies involved. These were excellent displays which had obviously involved a lot of time and research. Mike Turnbull

Frequently collecting interests have their origins in childhood and for **lan**

Shapiro this was certainly true. Having grown up in Cape Town and had experience of Roval Visits, he developed a growing interest in Royal themed stamp issues and indeed, all matters royal. We were absolutely riveted by this presentation of *Royalty*. lan had amassed over many years a superb collection and within this evening's display the finest elements were to be seen. The story featured began in 1837, through to near the end of the 20th Century. Early signed correspondence from Queen Victoria and Prince Albert was displayed, as were mourning envelopes, rare royal cancellations, including postal items from Windsor, Balmoral and Osbourne House. An interesting study was made of royal handwriting. Into King Edward VII's reign, the in-depth appraisal

continued, with rare (unique?) items such as a royal cover blessed with a 'postage due' stamp! and later roval telegrams sent around the time of the Abdication. Such was the volume of material and its sheer scarcity, together with the considerable knowledge displayed, both through write-up and exposition, that we could hardly draw breath. For me as for many no doubt, the most *amazing* philatelic items related to the very last days of the Russian Royal Family. These included envelopes with their letters and a Christmas postcard sent by Anastasia, one of the princesses, just weeks prior to execution, together with photographs and documents! Indeed... a 'Night to Remember' Paul Barry

Highlight of the last few months was a display of Brigg Postal History by Chris Dodsworth which included most of the early postmarks, postmasters and various town scenes on postcards. His display was preceded by a comprehensive and well documented display of *Butterflies* from all parts of the world by his grand-daughter Faith (13). collection is confined to definitive and commemorative stamps together with postal items issued by these

islands during the period 1949 to 1969. They issued their own local stamps referred to as "Semi-officials", which were used to pay for either parcel delivery or for transferring mail to St Peter Port to join the GPO service. Alderney and Sark in the Bailiwick of Guernsey have used Guernsey's stamps since October 1969. In 1965 Sark issued a set of local stamps to mark the 400th anniversary of the Island's settlement. In 1962 the Commodore Shipping Company held the contract for deliveries between Sark & Guernsey and Alderney & Guernsey and issued several interesting commemorative sets. These arrangements ended in 1969. Herm had an official British Post Office between 1925 and November 1938 opening most days for just 30 minutes. The Tenant of Herm began a private postal service from Herm in 1949 to cover the cost of taking mail to St Peter Port in Guernsey in addition to a pigeon post service. Jethou Island issued its own local stamps between 1960 and 1969. Local stamps also exist for the smaller Islands of Brecghou and Lihou. Howard Hamblin

Colin's contacts and knowledge brought us mail from both sides, including a letter with the message "awaiting occupation" sent after the invasion had started, one from Argentine school children to troops on the island and a "snatch mail" cover - a service provided for British troops. Through the material shown and the commentary, the conflict and the personalities involved were fully brought to life, and Colin concluded by explaining the tension surrounding the Thanksgiving Service in London after the islands had been re-taken. We expected a breathtaking show and that is exactly what we got.

Scarborough

We enjoyed a superb display of GB stamps and Postal History by Ken Brown from Leeds. There were clear impressions of early postmarks. One was a letter from Scarborough to Bawtry with a Horseshoe Scarborough mark from 1794. Originally all mail went via London so that it could be inspected. Until 1840 the receiver paid, usually according to the distance travelled. Prices had become very high so the introduction of the 1d post, paid by the sender, caused a massive increase in the mail. If the sender declined to pay the receiver had to pay double the price. The second half followed the changes in designs, including the first ones for George V, which he did not like. The series was changed to appease him. We also saw

a collection of business advertising envelopes. From Scarborough Post

Solihull

This season got off to a good start. In September Colin Searle showed Gibraltar with a good mix of stamps, postal stationery, postal history and personal stories which brought the show alive aided by a power point presentation. The following week, Richard Wheatley entertained us with Netherland Indies. WWI & Stamps. Once again, Richard displayed some remarkable material coming from this area in difficult times. John Gledhill started off our October meetings with a comprehensive display of Provisional GB Postal Stationery. Any item of GB postal stationery with some (official) additional printing, be it text, obliterating bar or image is the subject of some of John's latest research. In particular his display focussed on mail posted abroad using the 'additional' services such as registration, express delivery, Swiftair and the many other, sometimes short-lived, services. Destinations covered the whole of the globe - including one item to North Korea! John Barker

Terry Harrison gave a guest special display on his collection of *St Vincent issues*. The early issues were a lovely

exposition of the complications of early stamp printing, perforation, provisionals during shortages, and all the various things that could go wrong and how they were dealt with. The first essays showed how much work went into the design and the choice of the particular portrait of Queen Victoria. Clearly stock-taking and supply/demand figures were a bit shaky, as shortages were dealt with by surcharging denominations with more stock than current needs required, sometimes more than once: indeed in 1883 "surplus" 1d stamps were overprinted for $2\frac{1}{2}$ pence, but in 1885 they ran short of 1d stamps and re-overprinted remaining stocks of "21/2 PENCE on 1d" with another "1d", which they were

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originally (SG46). When the contract for printing was changed, De La Rue found that Perkins Bacon held copyright on their plates, so DLR had to make their own, until the copyright expired. All in all, a splendid and informative journey through the early years, moving on to later issues in the second half. →

Southampton & District

We were visited by Chris Harman with his *Revenue Stamps* display. Chris began collecting these because the early versions were much cheaper than the postage stamps of the same period. As his knowledge grew he realised that Revenues went back to 1694 when duties were raised to help pay off the War Debts. The original ¹/₂d rate increased so that 100 years later it was 31/2d. Paper was one of the items subject to duty. The blank paper had to be taken to a Stamp Office to be embossed to show that the duty had been paid before the paper was printed. We learnt of the development of Impressing, Embossing, Escutcheons and the methods of fixing them to vellum documents. Chris moved on to the growth in Almanacs which in book form were subject to a higher duty than when in sheet form. With continuing wars more items were subject to the duty: wallpaper, playing cards, hat linings and road tax (in 1784). Non-paper items were added, such as hair powder; royalty, clergy and soldiers were exempt! There was much more to see and learn until we reached the stamp period. Now a stamp could be affixed to show that the

tax had been paid – hence the stamps were inscribed *Postage and Inland Revenue*.

In July we had two meetings. At the first on Americana Juliet Keel showed USA Postcards, followed by Graeme Stewart with Early post from the USA. Then **Neil Hatton** took us for A Ramble Around the States based on his time there when seconded to the US Forces. Dave Tanner's displays were related to The Civil War and Insects. Graeme took us to American Antarctica and Ian Keel had Cancelled to Order. For the second Francis Connolly brought Propaganda Stamps – WWII German forgeries of genuine British stamps - and was followed by Mike Gurr showing Windsor Castle. NEW BOOK

The Sub-Office Postmarks of Sheffield by Frank Walton RDP, FRPSL This book documents the postmarks applied at all post offices that fell under Sheffield head office, other than Sheffield itself.

A total of 330 differently named offices are included, and each one of these has its own page recording the life of the office and illustrating the postmarks used. There are over 1,800 postmarks illustrated and 406 pages.

Available as a FREE download from the Stuart Rossiter Trust website *www.rossitertrust.com* This is our first venture into digital publishing.

How Much?

This is the typical "Yorkshire" response when I say how much money I have made from stamps – and tax free as well.

How did this happen? It all started when on my way to catch a bus home I noticed a part set of stamps of Malay Straits portraying a tiger, which I was keen to purchase. Unfortunately I did not have sufficient money to buy them. In those days there was no such thing as "The Hole in the Wall" banking system, so I caught a bus home, grabbed some money and caught a bus back into town. On approaching the shop I noticed that the stamps were not there. On enquiring as to their whereabouts the shopkeeper announced that he had just sold the set. Continued \rightarrow

I left the shop feeling rather frustrated and stopped to light a cigarette, realising the reason I did not have enough funds at the time that I saw the stamps was because just previously I had bought a pack of twenty cigarettes. Immediately I

grabbed the remaining cigarettes in the packet, screwed them up and threw them into a waste container. This with my stamps and a little willpower was the last time that I had a "smoke".

If you reckon 20 cigarettes a day (with more at the weekends) at present-day prices of £9 a packet it equates to about £3500 a year or £140 000 over 40 years. Healthwise I must be better too. Not that I have that much money in my pocket but I do now have that set of tiger stamps and a few more besides.

New RDPs Sign The Roll of Distinguished Philatelists in Newcastle upon Tyne

The Roll of Distinguished Philatelists was established in 1921 by the Philatelic Congress of Great Britain with the approval of His Majesty King George V, who was the first Signatory. An invitation to sign the Roll is regarded as the world's pre-eminent philatelic honour.

Not including the newly elected RDPs, 380 philatelists from 40 countries have achieved this distinction. There are at present 78 Signatories from 26 countries including sixteen from the United Kingdom, fourteen from the USA, seven from Germany, four each from France and Belgium, and three each from Australia and Italy. Denmark, New Zealand, Norway, Singapore, and Thailand each have two, with other countries including Austria, Canada, Colombia, Finland, Greece, Israel, Japan, Korea, Luxembourg, The Netherlands, Portugal, The Russian Federation, and Switzerland, having one.

At a recent meeting of the Board of Election, comprising Jane Moubray (Chairman), Tomas Bjäringer, Christopher Harman, Alan Huggins, Rolf-Dieter Jaretzky, Robert Odenweller, Christopher King and Raymond Todd, the members unanimously decided to ask Robert Abensur (France), Gustaf Douglas FRPSL (Sweden), Cheryl R. Ganz FRPSL (United States of America), and Geoffrey Lewis FRPSL (Australia) to sign the Roll. The Signing Ceremony took place on Friday 27th July at The Assembly Rooms in Newcastle upon Tyne, during the Philatelic Congress of Great Britain. They later showed some indicative parts of their superb collections to the Congress members to much applause. This custom has become an impressive part of the proceedings.


