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

Chairman's Report April 2019

As I write this, it is Spring time. I always love the Spring.... New flowers... The garden coming to life. Talking about new things. I have just returned from the Northern National Exhibition in Perth. I think, like many others, I had wondered whether it would work... would we get enough exhibits? It was a really excellent show. 134 frames of UK National Exhibits, not far short of the target 150. The standard was good. with one Large Gold and ten Gold medals. My fears about running the

I am guite sure that the ABPS Exhibition Committee will view with favour an application to hold the Northern National Exhibition in Perth again. Regarding future events, I have some interesting contrasts on my calendar, ranging from the Wakefield PS auction on April 17th, to Stamp Day events at Halifax and Huddersfield in May, to 'Stockholmia' at the end of May, the ultimate Stamp Day event! I'm sure that I will be saying more about some of these in my next Chairman's message.

Finally, until then, I would like to congratulate everyone involved in putting together the Scottish Northern National Show in Perth, especially the two Alans, Wishart and Watson, for all their hard work.

Editorial

I am grateful for the positive comments received about the issues of the News after my request for suggestions of possible additions or changes. There weren't many suggestions of new features but one was for me to do an interview (by email) with collectors to show how they started, developed and where they see things going in their collecting world. I suspect that my posing a few questions and then using the answers (carefully edited) would be the way that this would work. Anyone like to volunteer to be the guinea pig?

One thing that does concern me is that I want ABPS to give you what help it can in assisting you all. ABPS does not have any staff - just a few volunteers and all of you. So when people say "ABPS should do something about ..." they are really saying that you all should do something about... That means that we need to know who we can ask to help with certain things - for example helping at a Federation Convention to provide information on what ABPS does, to give out leaflets, offer (old) copies of ABPS news for free and so on. The same help could be offered for Stampex, London 2020 and other exhibitions - additionally there you could help with frames, exhibits, admin or meeting and greeting. I know that one answer is that many people are doing things at their local or specialist society but so am I and other ABPS officers etc. If you are going to some event why not offer to do a stint for your society, federation or ABPS for an hour or so? You do meet lots of different and very nice people that way.

The News has offered a free advert a year (space permitting) to any federation or affiliated society. Takeup has been far less than I



expected. That is fine - less work for me - but it is an offered benefit for your fees, as is the free website offer.

Some societies contact me to have their show or other event in the diary (pages 56 and 57 this time). I am unable to help sometimes because the information arrives too late for me to put it in a suitable issue before the event. Some send too much information (easy - I edit), some too little (I am not allowed to make it up). What is best practice? I have a running diary - so when you have decided on the date of an event at least 2 months after the next copy date (see page 3) send that information and the title to me. You can always add to it later if there is time. The ideal entry has date, title (with any federation links etc.). times, full address with postcode, contact details (name, telephone, email - as you wish) and/or website address. If it comes in that way - I bless you (less work for me), if it comes in some other form I am pleased to see it. I want your event to succeed and this is one way that ABPS can help to try to spread the word of what is going on in vour area. I have initial details for some local events in 2020 - they will appear at least one issue before the event.

Society anniversaries, 2019

According to the date of foundation shown in the societies' information in our records, significant anniversaries include those shown below (though several societies have not let us known their foundation date, so there may be more). Heartiest congratulations to all involved in these milestones.

Double Celebration for Surrey – a total of 130 years



The Surrey Federation and Twickenham Philatelic Society held a joint anniversary meeting, hosted by Twickenham, to mark the occasions of the 70th anniversary of Twickenham PS and the 60th anniversary of the re-forming of the Surrey Federation in 1959. Members of Twickenham

and representatives of most of the (now only) 12 societies affiliated to the Federation gathered on 21st March at the St John's Ambulance Hall in Teddington, the usual venue for Twickenham. It was an informal event with displays of memorabilia, including photographs, programmes and press cuttings. Members and visitors gave short displays of material, ranging from *Austria* and *Germany* through *GB* to *New Zealand* and *BSAA Airmails*. If there was a common theme to these diverse displays, it was the years 1949 and 1959 reflecting the respective dates of founding. There was a break for light refreshments between the displays and a further break to change the material on show for a third round.

Taunton – 75 years

February 2019 was the 75th anniversary of the founding of Taunton Stamp Club. Chairman **Peter Hardie** opened the meeting by extending a warm welcome to the members attending. The evening's entertainment was the club competitions for the Chairman's Cup, Clench Cup and the Challenge Trophy. The seventeen entries across the three competitions showed a quite exceptional display of philatelic material. The evening was concluded with a light buffet and a display of photographs from the club archives. The club continues to thrive with two meetings monthly, and a fair each November.



At the following meeting **John Knight** gave a display of *Rhodesian Postal Material* from the early 1800 to the 1990s including some very interesting postcards from 1901. The extensive display ranged from the opening of the Victoria Falls Bridge to the decline of the British South African Rule of 1924 and the introduction of the very unpopular definitive stamps of 1951. The second presentation was given by **Barry Reid** on his extensive collection of mint *Leeward Islands stamps* from the mid 1800s to the late 1990s. *Chris Catley*

As part of the celebrations we held a two day event Friday 8th and Saturday 9th March in our venue for club nights, the Literary and Philosophical Society near Newcastle central station. We would like to thank everyone who gave up their time to help - a

great effort by all concerned. We had thirty-two sixteen page displays on show from all areas of philately. We estimate that there were between 100 and 200

visitors. Some had seen our flyers and adverts and some had just walked in off the street when passing. Stamp Active had sent us some leaflets and starter packs which our members handed out to some families and youngsters who turned up. Corbitts Stamps loaned a display and gave some give-away starter packs. It all helped to make a very good event.

ABPS MULTI-CLASS AWARD

The ABPS is delighted to announce the creation of a new award for philatelists who have achieved awards at Vermeil level or above in five different classes at National or International philatelic exhibitions. All British and international classes including equivalent overseas national classes are eligible. At least two of these awards should have been made in the UK.

The award will be a certificate at the level equivalent to the lowest of the five medals. If that medal is improved at a later exhibition, the certificate can be awarded again at the higher level.

Any exhibitors who think they are eligible for the Multi-class award can apply by completing a form and sending it to *multiclass@abps.org.uk* with copies of their medal certificates. The application form is available at *www.abps.org.uk* under the 'Exhibiting' tab.

This award will enable us to recognise exceptional achievements by philatelists. We hope it will also encourage more exhibitors to try their hand at exhibiting in more than one class and to improve the medals they have been awarded at previous exhibitions.

The ABPS Congress Medal for 2019



This year the ABPS Congress Medal will be presented to **Gerald Marriner** during Stockholmia.

Gerald has been at the centre of many philatelic societies for a long time. Involving himself on various committees, he has made a major contribution to British philately in many ways.

He was nominated by the Channel Islands Specialists' Society. He is now President of that Society having held the position of secretary, auctioneer and weekend conference organiser, often carrying out more than one function at a time.

Four other specialist societies are pleased to count Gerald as a member because he is always willing to

take an active part. He has served as treasurer of the Andorra Philatelic Study Circle for the past nine years and still serves in that capacity today. He was joint editor of a monograph, "Conflict - the British Forces Postal Service in the South Atlantic 1982" which was published in 2017 by the Falkland Islands Philatelic Study Group. He has been librarian of the Welsh Postal History Society since 2005. In addition, he is a member of the Belgian Congo Study Circle. He has a great interest in and deep knowledge of the Belgian Congo and is on the editorial board of the French language journal 'Les Congolatres.' Gerald became Chairman of the ABPS Congress Committee in 2008 and remains in that office today. Over the years he has organised many successful Congresses including the Centenary Congress in Manchester in 2009. In recent years he has involved all the new signatories to the Roll of Distinguished

years he has involved all the new signatories to the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists by asking them to present a paper during the annual Congress. His first office was in 1990 when he became programme secretary of Solihull Philatelic Society. Twenty-nine years later he is still arranging the speakers for the society's weekly meetings.

For the past ten years Gerald has been a Regional Representative for the Royal Philatelic Society London, representing the West Midlands Region.

Gerald quietly and diligently gets on with all these jobs and is exactly the sort of candidate that the ABPS Congress Medal was designed for. He is a very worthy winner.

Roll of Distinguished Philatelists

At a meeting of the Board of Election to the Roll held on 21st March, the following four philatelists were elected to sign the Roll:

Prakob Chirakiti of ThailandGuy Dutau of FranceHany Salam of EgyptAlan Warren of USA

The invitation to sign the Roll is the highest and most prestigious of honours in philately, which recognises achievement, research, publication and service. The Roll was instituted in Harrogate in May 1921, when the initial 39 names were added to the Roll. The signature of His Majesty King George V appears at the head of the Roll as the first signatory.

This year's signing ceremony will take place in the Hall of Mirrors – Spegelsalen – of the Grand Hôtel, Stockholm, Sweden on Friday 31st May at the Stockholmia 2019 exhibition. Attendance at the ceremony is open to all. There are currently 84 living RDPs from 25 countries spread over six continents.

... but did it really? What was the real reason? How could a Dealer pay a higher price than a Collector? It doesn't make sense, does it? Collectors are customers. Customers usually pay the highest price, unless for a Collector, this was...

Wrong Presentation X Wrong Place X therefore Wrong Price X

Jater to a British Empire reflection, lot #1 in an International Stamp Auction - Estimated at \$5,000, but we were the highest bidder at \$21,000 - YES - some 72chigher. Including Buyer's Premium in the extraordinary sum of \$4,788 we actually paid GBP\$25,788 - upon a \$3,000 estimate... however, we broke it down into sets, singles, mini-collec-

tions etc. We made a profit. Some might say it found its price. Others may say:

> Wrong Estimate X Wrong Presentation X Wrong Structure X Wrong

> Wrong Structure Wrong Protection of Price

- Lucky for the seller that 2 well-healed bidders saw the potential value that day or it could have been given away... the seller could easily have lost out couldn't be? or she?

So, by un-peeling the layers of obfuscation, hopefully we can all agree:

Presentation Place and

Understanding the problem... I always re-member the car trade had their own little 'bible' - Glass's Guide. I've no idea, Eve not even looked - in this internet-dominated world, it may even have disappeared. Well, there's an insider Stamp Trade publication for Stamp Dealers called "The Philatelic Exporter". There's nothing that special about it - and you won't learn much or find massively reduced prices by subscribing - BUT - it is a forum, a paper focal point, a last bastion' in this on-line transparent world. that we inhabit... whereby dealers (and auctioneers) can try and communicate with each other. I publish my own articles there.

Recently I discussed the outcome of my 10 years' simple research, asking dealers and anctioneers 'what is your biggest problem?'

To a man, (why are we almost all men), they replied — "my biggest problem is stock, if I can get more of the right stock I can sell it easily"

Strange that, nobody ever asked me the same question back – because my unswer would have been entirely different (and I don't treat it as a problem) – I seek to satisfy collectors

This is the reason why my company has such massive advertising. This is the reason why we spend up to 8% of unrover – up to \$200,000 per aroum in marketing costs. (Most dealers don't even sell \$200K per annum.)

Some other welladvertised auctions only have 200 bidders (a high percentage of whom are dealers - so that, essentially they are Dealer dominated auctions) - so that when you sell through them you're paying up to 18% (including VAT) seller's commission and the buyer is paying up to 25% and more in Buyer's Premium, credit card fees. on-line bidding fee, delivery and insurance etc... AND all of that so that your stamps may be sold. wait for it - TO DEALERS (and some collectors), but Dealers,

Now, let's examine the cost implications Example: Your stamp collection sells in public auction for \$800. Upon a 25% buyer's premium, the dealer pays \$1,000 and it could be more. He breaks it into \$2,000+ selling price (much lower and he'll go out of business). The auction charges you a seller's commission of up to 18% (VAT included) upon the \$800 sale price. Dundee mourns the death of a member and friend

Francesco (Frank) Tonelli

Frank grew up in Pontremoli, a small town in the hills to the north of La Spezia, Italy. He trained as a tailor before doing his national service in the Alpini. After that he opened his own tailoring business in Pontremoli. However, he wanted to come to Britain and was sponsored by the Cabrelli family in Dundee. He married Carol and worked in gents tailoring in A Caird & Sons in Reform Street rising to become head of department. His family grew with the arrival of daughters Vivienne and Francesca. Frank had an interest in stamps and joined the Dundee & District Philatelic Society.



Frank's career took a different direction when Caird's closed. It saw him move to Debenhams before breaking out on his own. From premises in King Street, he opened a stamp shop and tailoring business. The stamp shop along with other collectibles, Cornucopia Collectors, was in the front room, whilst Frank's tailoring was in the back room. By then he employed home workers to carry out much of the tailoring work.

Taking over the running of Dundee Philatelic Auctions, he held public auctions in the Tay Centre Hotel (Malmaison) before moving the auction to Glasgow for a wider audience.

With changing trends there was much less demand for bespoke tailoring so he concentrated on the philatelic business becoming a "weel kent" figure at stamp fairs and a much respected figure in the trade. His interest in stamps waned to some extent when he became a member of Tayside Postcard Club. With his stock, mainly of postcards, he grew to become one of the UK's most familiar and respected philatelic dealers, with customers from around the country and beyond.

He had left Italy, but he was still Italian with a love of good fresh food and partial to red wine. Frank could never understand why the Brits didn't make use of the food which was in abundance whilst they ignored it. The family would go out foraging for wild mushrooms, collecting and drying them. Frank's Italian family were always pleased to see him back in Pontremoli in the summer school holidays. His stash of mushrooms was also much in demand!

Frank was above all a family man and in Cornucopia Collectors' case, family business did mean family as Carol, Vivienne and Francesca ran the business with him. That family business has grown since grand-daughter Rachel also works part-time when she is not at university in St. Andrews.

Many others will share their sorrow on the passing of this colourful, friendly, congenial man.

An update on Stampex from the PTS

In February, it came to our attention that a philatelic magazine had printed information to suggest that the Philatelic Traders' Society, who organise Stampex International, would soon announce a decision that Stampex would be moving from two shows a year to a one show a year event. We have since clarified the facts with this magazine, but it got us thinking that perhaps we ought to set out more formally what the plan is for Stampex over the next couple of years. Nothing laid out here is set in stone, but we hope it helps paint a picture of what might be presented in our five-year strategy at the AGM this September.

The one show/two show debate

The first thing to say is that a decision was made by the PTS Council last year to run one Stampex only in 2020. This decision was made as there is an international show (London 2020) taking place at the Business Design Centre in May, Many of the same dealers who have a stand at Stampex, and collectors who visit the show, will be going to London 2020. It was felt that having three major shows over a seven-month period was too much. The reason for cancelling the Spring show over the Autumn show was purely related to the timing. There would have been a three-month gap between Spring and London 2020, and there is a four-month gap between London 2020 and Autumn. At present, whilst there has been no formal decision, it is the intention of the PTS to operate two shows again in 2021. In fact, at Spring Stampex, a small survey was carried out amongst stand holders and over 70% said they would like to see two shows a year. In addition to this, we have now run three visitor surveys and at all shows we see a healthy percentage of people who are visiting Stampex for the first time. This Spring, footfall is thought to be at the highest it has been for several shows with 25% of visitors surveyed saying it was their first time at Stampex.

Free entry and ticketing

We know that there have been some rumours that we will be implementing a small fee to visit Stampex, like a £2 entry ticket. To set the record straight, whilst it is something that has been discussed at Council, there is no intention of implementing an entry fee. We are proud that we can offer free entry to this world class show. There should be no barriers to people exploring the wonderful hobby of stamp collecting.

The icing on the cake

At each show, as well as the core exhibition, we are always looking for new ways to engage our visitors with interactive experiences and special events. For example, did you know that this Spring, we had a 'donate your stamps' pillar box with all proceeds going to Macmillan Cancer Care? Our Court of Honour this Spring showcasing Birthe King's and Judith Holder's collections received worldwide PR coverage. We will also be launching a competition series this year across Stampex social media. We know that these little extras add up and are what makes Stampex a truly world class event.

From Fly on the Wall

Basingstoke & District

Our April speaker, **Paul Davidson**, was given a very warm welcome on his return to the society. His talk was on *The US War of Independence 1775 – 1783*. The introduction of taxes by the British on tea, glass, paper, paint and lead was one of the main contributory factors. He mentioned the Boston Tea Party 1773 when a group of American colonists boarded three British ships and discharged their cargoes of tea

into the harbour. Then followed the first military engagements of the War with the Battles of Lexington and Concord 1775 when Paul Revere, riding on horseback, alerted the Minutemen Militia of the impending arrival of the British Army. The British Army under General Gage received a bloody nose from armed farmers. Paul described the Declaration of Independence on 4th July 1776 declaring that the Colonies "Are and have right to be free and independent states". On 8th July 1776 the Declaration was proclaimed and the Liberty Bell rang out. Further battles were New York, Trenton and Princeton where George Washington played a pivotal role for the Americans. The interventions of France (1778) and Spain (1779) were important for American success. Lord Cornwallis capitulated at Yorktown in 1781 with 7000 soldiers after the isolating blockade of Chesapeake Bay, Under the Treaty of Paris 1783, Britain recognised the independence of the United States of America and in return

was allowed to retain Canada and recovered its West Indies territories.

given a district handstamp. The physical geography of the country, in terms of the distances between major cities, prompted a second feature of its philately: bisects, as supplies of stamps ran low. Both initial high values, the 4 and 8 Reals, were allowed to be bisected by official sanction, and so was the 2 Reals - and although these are scarce, Ray showed a certificated example. January was one of our ever-popular members' day events. **Simon McArthur** led with two presentations, the first one on the *German Day of the Stamp*, the second on *Censored Mail from the Netherlands 1945-47*. There were various fascinating censored civilian and company mail and airmail covers and postcards. **Robert Prentice**

followed with Naval Postal History. showing us a cross-section of various ships from Admiral Nelson's HMS Victory to ships in WWI. We enjoyed seeing letters from various notable Admirals and Captains, Robert explained the difference between a battleship and battle cruiser, mainly that the armour was less on a cruiser enabling it to go faster, and that a ships' rating referred to the number of guns on board. In the second half we enjoyed a wonderful display from Michael Lockton showing a history of Compulsory Registration, for letters, starting on 1st January 1841 with a price of 1/- (one shilling). Michael showed us many covers with various marks/manuscript wording/ cancellations/blue crayon throughout

the years, culminating in registration labels, introduced in 1908, and postage due labels, introduced in 1914. Our last speaker, Michael Cope, displayed the Social History of the Outer Hebrides. His wife's grandfather, Archibald Chisholm, was the Sheriff-Clerk for the County of Inverness, 1878-1881 and 1913-1933. He was immersed in the wellbeing of the islands and was also a keen photographer. Michael showed us his many photos that were made into postcards, together with some of the tortuous routes taken by the post. > www.bookhamstampclub.com David Bravery

Bromley and Beckenham

In February William Morris showed from his collection of Falkland Islands. the Dependencies and South Georgia. mainly mint. He commented on some of the higher values in the sets, miniature sheets etc. and the attractive thematic nature of the modern issues, especially ships, seals, and others with local interest including the £1+£1 Rebuilding Fund items. David Milsted brought Great Britain Army Official Overprinted Stamps used on 51 covers, mainly internally within the UK or to the Army in South Africa during the Boer War, but also some in the opposite direction. Overprint varieties included an example of the "long stroke on 2nd F", the "OFFICIAI" and "narrow L", and scarce usages such as a pair of 2½ds on a Book Post item, and no less than 8 paying 1/8d rate on a Paymaster cover from Cardiff to Nova Scotia. The largest item on display was to South Africa with 68 x ½d green and 24 x 1d making 4/10d rate. In March, after our Competition night, we were visited by Bob Higgins of Medway Towns. His display of Gibraltar included stamps

and early postal history items. He began with an 1820 item to Madrid with GB stamps with G or A26 cancellations. Then we saw stamps and Specimen overprints through the reigns to 1970. He also showed used Morocco Agencies items for most of the British Agencies from various issues, including Postal Stationery, including the very rare 1898 5c Post Card with "Morocco Agency" (sic) overprint.


Brian Asquith on Dragons' Wings

WWII was covered including some route changes necessitated by the war and Japanese invasion, directional markings and postal markings such as the Hami–Alma Ata route through Russia and En Dépêche Closé. Examples of mail between 1946 and 1949 covered the Communist Revolution and the high inflation rates during this period. Brian thanked Gregory WK Loh MBE for his

translations without whose help he could not have built the collection. In February **Graham Harker** produced his President's Display on All Things Brunel. This was a PowerPoint presentation on the life and works of Isambard Kingdom Brunel. It included the history of the SS Great Britain and its rescue from the Falkland Islands in 1970. **Reg Harrison** brought his display of Belgium from 1420 when it was part of the Spanish Netherlands through Austrian and French Occupation to its independence in 1830. Two wars involving Germany followed so we also saw censored mail. **David Mauri's** Hyperinflation in Germany spanned just 518 days. Derek has mail dated from 430 of these. The study of stamps and overprints for this period has been much complicated by changing boundaries and currencies, and this superb philatelic display underlined the variety of material and its scarcity. Besides the provision of substantial historical information, maps, correspondence and photographs, the display was rich in stamps both mint and used, covers, postcards and overprints. This memorable presentation revealed a vast and complex area of study for the philatelic specialist, superbly writtenup, and gave us a glimpse of most interesting, unusual and rare material.

Additional destinations included John O' Groats, Gretna Green, Snowdon and Paris. In February Michael Rego took us Around the World in 80 Mails. 
Haverfordwest

It was signed by E Maxwell the chief United Nations Postal Administrator. Along with the stamps we were shown First Day covers, Postal Stationery and associated ephemera. Many firms printed their stamps including Heraclio Fournier, Government Printing Bureau Tokyo. Helio Courvosier South Africa and Questa Colour Security Printers. This

was a well put together collection and we were pleased that Cambridge PS allowed us to show it to our members.

One of his books concerns the history of the Indian space programme, covering the activity of Stephen Smith, who documented the Indian experimental Rocket Mail flights. Stephen published a definitive catalogue of rocket mail worldwide. Two UK rocket mail experiments in the

Hebrides and Lymington to the Isle of Wight were attempted, which resulted in most of the mail being burnt to cinders. Next Philip Longbottom gave us a talk on The Netherlands Postal History from the 16th century. The Dutch postal infrastructure experienced rapid change due to political and economic upheaval between the Netherlands and Belgium. Covers displayed depicted how stamp production and usage evolved concerning printing, watermarks, currency and denomination changes. The not very much in his case concerned the halfpenny stamps roughly from Queen Victoria to George VI. David showed us underprints to prevent pilfering, stamps sold with advertising purposes, overprints for official uses and overseas territories. He told us that the Channel Islands. material from the West Indies island of Dominica. Simon Richards FRPSL showed material covering the philately of the island from the earliest days of British possession until independence. He included superb covers, the earliest being from 1779. They reflected the history of the island, usage of the stamps, and included Registered mail, censorship, and examples of postmarks from Roseau and various villages. The stamp material included essays, proofs, unadopted designs and varieties. The display of Classic Finland 1845-1859: The hand-printed oval design by Gustaf Douglas RDP FRPSL was of the first issues of Finland, those of 1845, 1850 and 1856, in use until 1859, introducing uniform domestic postal rates. The title of William Tatham's presentation in March. Eastern Rumelia & South Bulgaria, had a few members quessing as to whether they were two separate nations. In fact, they are the same. Eastern Rumelia was created by the Treaty of Berlin in 1878 but, following a bloodless revolution on 6th September 1885, it was renamed South Bulgaria. The display extensively examined the

stamps, covers and postal stationery of the period, from the 'R.O.' (Roumelie Orientale) overprints on the stamps of Turkey, distinctive designs for Eastern Rumelia, later overprinted with images of the Bulgarian lion following the renaming of the country.

Sarawak

We held another very successful Spring Meeting in Tiverton in March. The meeting started with members' new acquisitions, followed by displays of the various fakes, forgeries, overprints and concoctions of our territories. There was an introduction to PowerPoint presentations by Roger **Johnson** in order to prepare for the forthcoming trip in May to Borneo, in conjunction with the Kuching PS. Claire Scott displayed Brunei postal history relating to an American anthropologist from Alabama, Carol Turner gave a splendid display on North Borneo Items including the 1889 \$25 revenue stamp. Ivan Wilkinson showed items relating to Early Sarawak Overprints including the controversial 2 cents on 3 cents, first reported in 1876, with other members contributing relevant material including a photograph of a defaced De La Rue plate of the first stamp of Dominica, by Malcolm Gascoyne. Before dinner we congregated in the bar and saluted Bill Batty-Smith with bubbly. He is about to attain his 90th birthday! Saturday morning started with our twice-yearly auction, run by Ivor Moore. This was again highly successful with many bids in the room but lots also went to commission bids, both overseas and in the UK. The final afternoon saw a magnificent display of breadth of material from **Jon Higgins** on *North*

Borneo. We look forward to our AGM in

British Stamp news



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
