


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

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN:

Over the past couple of months, I have attended two events which, to my mind, together encapsulate the very essence of ABPS. Stockholmia 2019. the 150th Anniversary of the Royal Philatelic Society, the greatest philatelic society in the world, was a quite magnificent event, but any philatelic gathering with Jonas Hallstrom, Jan Berg, Lars Engelbrecht and Chris King in the organising team is likely to be pretty special. The Royal is, of course, one of our ABPS affiliates, and the ABPS Congress was given two days at the show in the Auditorium. There were some verv special presentations, well attended on the first day with between thirty and fifty people. Less so on the second, but equally memorable presentations of particularly Norway and Iceland concluding with our own great Scandinavian Birthe King. I would like to thank all involved in the ABPS Congress days.

In July I went to Learnington Spa for Midpex, the biennial event originally conceived as the Federation and Specialist Society show. Steve Harrison, the ABPS Vice Chairman, Clive Jones, the Yorkshire Postal History Society President, and their committee did a great job organising the show. The Society and Federation booths were well-manned and full of information. Little sign of decline in the hobby here! ABPS as a national philatelic body is, and will always be, involved in all levels of the hobby from International to Regional to Local: Stockholm to Leamington Spa; London to Barnsley. I enjoy them all!

At our most recent General Committee meeting, it was decided to reorganise the Small Grants Committee. After several years. Yvonne and her team thought it was time for a change. The new committee will be the ABPS Treasurer: the ABPS Chairman and one other member. The personnel of the new committee therefore will be Nigel Gouch as chairman; myself, and Mike Roberts (Huddersfield). All applications for small grants should be made in the usual way but to Nigel (see page 58). I would like to take this opportunity to thank Yvonne Wheatley, Richard West, Alan Moorcroft and Christine Earl for their fine work with Small Grants over the years. Their efforts have been very much appreciated.

Finally I would like to look forward. By the time you read this, it might all have happened! Part 2 of Congress was on the Saturday of the York Stamp Fair with Alan Holyoake, Richard Stock and the ABPS AGM. Then Stampex comes in September with some new features, including PTS/ABPS tours through the exhibits led by experienced exhibitors/ national judges.

Editorial

It was difficult to decide what to write about this time. At the time of writing we are in what is for most societies the slack season. Normally that means that the stamps and covers are put to one side as meetings end in May or June and restart in September. Certainly the number of reports and photographs received this time is well down on last issue's superb total. I am always concerned that I never hear from some societies - not surprising for specialist societies that rarely if ever meet but at the current count 65 local societies, 28 specialist societies and 4 Federations have not sent in a report or other contribution since I became editor. Yet a common positive comment is that the reports of other societies' meetings and the photographs of material or people are the things that most people enjoy reading and want to see. It would be good to hear from some of the 97 silent ones occasionally - not every time please or I would be in serious space difficulties.

I have just been to the York Stamp (and Coin) Fair and had an interesting time as usual. I found a few items to add to my growing collection of Registered Mail sent from the United Kingdom to foreign parts. As I am not concerned about the date of the mail I have the additional problem or delight of finding old and new names for countries. So far I have 34 of the 51 states (including Washington DC) in the United States, 8 states in Canada,4 states in Australia and lots of European countries but the South American. Asian, African and Island countries have many gaps. It does make going to fairs much more interesting for me.

Perhaps soon I will have enough to add another display to my list. Another advantage to visiting fairs is to meet other collectors -



some of whom are not members of any society. I try to persuade them of the pleasure and knowledge that can be gained by going to meetings. A common answer is that they do not have time as they are still working, but other answers are "I don't know if there is a society in my town/area", "I'm not that good a collector" or something similar and "What do you get out of it if you don't collect what they are showing". We all have a responsibility to be able to answer these questions or at least point out where one can be answered. A great pleasure at York was to see children and their parents there - and the positive reaction from dealers and us oldie collectors. I was delighted to have a response to an article in a previous copy of the News and a volunteer to say how he started collecting. If nothing else it showed that the material was read and thought about - so thanks for that. Do you have any points to raise - either as starting points or in response to something in an issue? If all of those missing reports are sent in I might not have enough room for your response but what a wonderful problem that would be.

I hope that you come back to your societies well rested and ready to help. Take on a job, write a report but mainly enjoy yourself with your collections. *Keith Burton*

Society anniversaries, 2019

According to the date of foundation shown in the societies' information on our records, significant anniversaries include those shown below (though several societies have not let us known their foundation date, so there may be more).

Bradford and District - 125 Years

The first meeting took place on 27th September 1894 when a Committee was formed. At the next meeting on 11th October the Committee was elected with Mr Oliver Firth (President) "who had an excellent collection of stamps", Mr WH Scott (Hon Secretary) "he has 8000 stamps", Mr J Sichel (Vice President) "5000 stamps" and Mr WM Gray (Hon Treasurer) "4000 stamps". On 6th November the first display was presented by Mr HW Atkinson (Hon Librarian) *Stamps of Great Britain*. Thus the society was one of the earliest to be formed.

From 1895 to 1914 the society gradually expanded. WM Gray was elected a Fellow of the Royal Philatelic Society London, and at the Jubilee International Exhibition held in London in 1912 he was awarded Gold and Silver Gilt medals.

With the outbreak of WWI, the activities of the society were curtailed. It was reformed on 24th November 1936. However, in September 1940, due to another war, black-out restrictions caused the society to meet on a Saturday afternoon.

By 1964 the society had well over 100 members and in that year, Miss RN Solly became the first Lady President. Over the years the society has met at various venues. In 1955/56 it moved to the Latvian Club where it still meets.

The membership has been entertained by some of the top names in Philately. In 1938 Robson Lowe came with a lantern slide display *1661 and all that* and he returned after the war in 1949 with *The Birth of the Black and Blues*. His last appearance at Bradford was in 1967 with a talk on *Forgeries that have fooled me*. Other well-known names from the 1950s onwards include: John K Sidebottom RDP, Cyril Harmer, Alan Bosworth, Bob Emery, David Boyd, Ken

Chapman and in 1966 Miroslav Anton Bojanowicz RDP who talked on *Poland*, after which he presented to the society an ashtray with a hand-painted Poland Number 1 stamp in the centre! (see photo).

At one time the society had a thriving junior section, one of whom won the Junior Competition Cup on 10th February 1970; his name: Edward Klempka, who still goes from strength to strength with his collections and writings.



In 1997 it is recorded that the membership was 15/16 and it is about the same today. We shall celebrate our 125th anniversary with a special meeting on 17th September, when the displays will be: *What could have been shown in 1894*.

Woking & District - 70

We are gearing up to celebrate our 70th Anniversary at Christ Church Centre, Woking on 28th October 2019. The first Society meeting was held at the Corner Café Woking on 26th October 1949 and those who were at the meeting would be proud to know that we are still in business 70 years later. Over the years the society has included some very distinguished philatelists, including two past Presidents of the Royal (+RDP), three past Presidents of the Surrey Federation and the authors of a number of successful philatelic books. **Michael Lockton** presented a paper to the Congress last year on behalf of a small group (W4) which is studying the future of philately.

However, the Woking membership includes collectors at all levels, from expert to beginner. Members' evenings show how widespread these interests are and how great our enthusiasm is to display them. We meet twice a month for most months of the year. **John Lea** who has just retired as President joined Woking in 1951 and is by far the longest serving member. He also has the distinction of being a member of the Royal for longer than anyone else and has an ABPS Award of Merit (2007).

The society has played a full part in its membership of the Surrey Federation apart from providing Presidents. It has hosted the Annual Stamp Fairs on many occasions until old age took its toll. It has also successfully competed for the associated Mason Cup regularly over the years.

The Anniversary Celebration is planned as an informal evening with invitations to around 40 people including the Mayor of Woking. There will be archive displays including early Woking postcards and a selection from the Woking

Postal History Collection. The history of the town is very much based on the development of the postal system and the railways. Ron Trevelyan

Protection of Price - Lucky for the seller that 2 well-healed bidders saw the potential value that day or it could have been given away... the seller could easily have lost out couldn't be? or she?

So, by un-peeling the layers of obfuscation, hopefully we can all agree:

The Secret is Simple -

Plus the 3 Philatelie 'P's -Presentation Place and Price

Understanding the problem... 1 always re-member the car trade had their own little 'bible' - Glass's Guide. I've no idea, I've not even looked - in this internet-dominated world, it may even have disappeared. Well, there's un insider Stamp Trade publication for Stamp Dealers called "The Philatelic Exporter". There's nothing that special about it - and you won't learnmuch or find massively reduced prices by subscribing - BUT - it is a forum, a paper focal point, a last 'bastion' in this on-line transparent world. that we inhabit... whereby dealers (and auctioneers) can try and communicate with each other. I publish my own articles there.

Recently I discussed the outcome of my 10 years' simple research, asking dealers and anctioneers "what is your biggest problem?"

To a man, (why are we almost all men), they replied - "my biggest problem is stock, if I can get more of the right stock I can sell it easily"

Strange that, nobody ever asked me the same question back – because my answer would have been entirely different (and 1 don't treat it as a problem) – I seek to satisfy collectors

This is the reason why my company has such massive advertising. This is the reason why we spend up to 8% of numover – up to \$200,000 per annum in marketing costs. (Most dealers don't even sell \$200K per annum).

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5 Why is that? Because, as the world revolved the Stamp Market, imperceptibly Changed, and incrementally – Massively

So, although few will tell you this, it's clearly evident that the problem for most Sellers of Stamps today is no longer absent stock - but absent collectors in the place they choose to sell their stamps in. Simply put, other Dealers, Auctions, Stamp Fairs have not invested in marketing to have a strong Castomer-core. To be fair, this is not true of all - but it is true of most - so that our nearest competitor 'Apex' had 800 bidders in a recent auction. In my most recent 20,000+ lot UPA 68th Auction we had 2.184 different bidders from 58 different countries, 95% of whom were Collectors. Some other welladvertised auctions only have 200 bidders (a high percentage of whom are dealers - so that, essentially they are Dealer-dominated auctions) - so that when you sell through them you're paying up to 18% (including VAT) seller's commission and the buyer is paying up to 25% and more in Buyer's Premium, credit card fees. on-line bidding fee, delivery and m summe etc... AND all of that so that your stamps may be sold, wait for it - TO DEALERS (and some collectors), but Dealers. that naturally must make a profit to survive

Now, let's examine the cost implications Example: Your stamp collection sells in public auction for \$800. Upon a 25% buyer's premium, the dealer pays \$1,000 and it could be more. He breaks it into \$2,000+ selling price (much lower and he'll go out of business). The auction charges you a seller's commission of up to 18% (VAT included) upon the \$800 sale price. This is GBP\$144. Therefore you receive approaching \$656 - which is approximately 33% of the dealer's \$2,000-/ retail selling price BUT ... now that we have identified the problem

Obituary

BASINGSTOKE & DISTRICT P S 1935-2019

With great regret we announce that, after 84 years, the Basingstoke and District Philatelic Society will close after its final meeting on July 15th 2019.

The society was formed in 1935 when a group of collectors met in rooms above Careys, a local hairdresser's. As it grew, the society met at various venues in Basingstoke: the Carnival Hall, Chute House, the Moose Centre, and finally the United Reformed Church.

Membership at the Society has dwindled over the years and attendances at meetings have fallen sharply. It's a far cry from the days of over 70 members, when there used to be a flourishing Junior section. In later years in spite of the efforts of both the committee and club members, it has proved virtually impossible to attract a significant number of new members to replace its aging membership. Fierce competition from other activities such as computers has played its part, especially in the recruitment of younger members.

We have had many memorable speakers visiting us over the years with special mention of **Michael Sefi** (then Keeper of the Royal Philatelic Collection), **Dr Jean Alexander** who enlightened us on *Supermarket Philately*, and **Hugh Jefferies** who outlined the fascinating *History of Stanley Gibbons*. It has become increasingly difficult to engage speakers especially in the winter months. This has necessitated more member evenings which in turn has led to a downturn in attendance at meetings.

We have been well represented over many years at HAMPEX and are closing on a 'high'. In 2018 we gained our first success in the Howard White Trophy. In addition, there were individual winners with the Howard White Individual Trophy (**Roddy Owen**) and the Hiscock Thematic Trophy (**Heather Lawn**). We also had success at Autumn Stampex in 2013 when **Dr John Horsey** won a Large Gold Medal for his £5 Orange exhibit and a second Large Gold for his widely acclaimed book, *The £5 Orange*.

We note that since 2015 nine societies in the Hampshire Philatelic Federation have closed. We wish the remaining HPF Societies the best of luck for the future.

will give a talk entitled

The worldwide postal reforms of 1838–50, their origins and consequences, including the spread of other countries' first postage stamps

Thanks to the stimulus of a three-year Stuart Rossiter Trust research grant in 2017 it finally became possible (and urgent!) to tackle the total rewrite of the slim volume on this subject that was first published pre-Internet almost 30 years ago. The book is due for publication in May 2020 but the research involved has mushroomed somewhat. Major archives have been visited in Washington DC, Zurich and Sydney, as well as in London and many cities around the UK. The aim of the book is to record

- the many campaigners for postal reform who were working long before Rowland Hill wrote his pamphlets;
- how Rowland Hill's 'Post Office Reform' plan was conceived and put into practice;
- how the London merchants became involved in the 'Cheap Postage' campaign;
- why and how New South Wales, Brazil, the Swiss cantons, the USA and other countries adopted postal reforms prior to 1850.

This lecture will cover the unpredictable process of converting a lifetime's collection into a thoroughly researched historical study – which is also intended to be a detailed collector's guide to the subject – and give a glimpse of what will be in the book.

JG-T has been an avid collector of postal history for over 40 years and was lucky enough to spend the last 40 years as a professional postal historian, first as a dealer and then from 1988 to 2017 as owner of and the principal describer at Cavendish Philatelic Auctions. He now specialises in the early postal history of the world with an emphasis on the British 1839–40 postal reforms, New South Wales from 1800, and first-year usages of classic stamps to 1864. He has been a national and federation judge since 1987, having exhibited nationally and internationally since 1981, finally obtaining a Large Gold Medal for his 'Postal Reforms' at New York 2016. His series of articles on the 'Birth of the 1d Black' was issued in book form as 'The British Postal Reforms of 1839 to 1840' in 1990.

The lecture will be followed by wine and nibbles.

Congress at Stockholmia

Instead of holding the usual 4-day Philatelic Congress in England, ABPS decided to hold a shortened Philatelic Congress at Stockholmia 2019 Exhibition at the end of May. On the first day there was a series of six excellent PowerPoint presentations beginning with The Evolution of an Exhibit by Graham Winters FRPSL, ABPS Chairman. This was the story of how Graham developed his exhibit on Golf at National and International levels. Hany Salam, a new RDP, then gave a fascinating presentation entitled *Egyptian Maritime Postal History* 1845 – 1889. The first Egyptian packet-boat company was formed in 1845. Only two letters from this company survive today. One, an 1848 entire from Alexandria, carried by steamer to Constantinople, was shown in Hany's presentation. Gerald Marriner FRPSL then presented his Congress Chairman's display entitled The German Occupation of the Channel Islands and how Postal *Communications were affected during this period.* This included a study of essays and proofs for the locally produced Jersey stamps, the highlight being the Cutland essays printed by Bigwoods. These were not approved and most were destroyed. Few examples remain in private hands. This presentation concluded with the Harris story – a couple who went on honeymoon to Guernsey just prior to the Occupation. They were unable to return home due to the German Occupation, so they had a '5 year' honeymoon on Guernsey which unfortunately saw them being sent to an internment camp in Germany. Alan Warren FRPSL, another new RDP, presented The Grooming of a Philatelist. Philatelists are made, not born! Alan explained how people had influenced his collecting. He described his mentors who have enlightened and guided him. Alan supported the importance of joining Specialist Societies to improve your knowledge. Then came The Wreck of the S.S. Ibex by Jon Aitchison FRPSL. This ship was wrecked on rocks near Guernsey. Mail addressed to Jersey received a special cachet of two different types. Jon explained the reason for the different cachets and showed scarce examples of mail recovered from the wreck. Alan Wishart FRPSL completed the first day's presentations with a detailed Story of the British H.G. Wells stamps issued in 1995 explaining in detail what could be collected for this issue.

Rare material from Scandinavian collectors was shown next day. The first was by **Kjell Nilson** who presented a study of *Swedish Postal History from 1939 until 1948*. This included postal rates in and out of Sweden, returned mail originally sent from Sweden, censorship of mail, mail taking mysterious routes and mail to and from internees and prisoners of war. **Tom Komnaes** presented *Norwegian Skilling Covers* between 1855 and 1877. Tom's presentation focussed on rates, routes and destinations. He began with domestic covers, followed by covers to a variety of destinations including some very rare examples. **Peter Wittsten** presented *Mail between Sweden and Denmark between 1658 and 1874*, which showed the development of rates for both prepaid and unpaid letters and included some very rare items. Then **Douglas Storckenfeldt** showed *Iceland to 1901*, illustrating the early stages of Icelandic Classic philately. Rare covers were illustrated from the Skilling stamps (1873 – 1876) and the original Aur

stamps (1876 – 1901). **Birthe King FRPSL** completed the presentations with her exhibit entitled *The Loss and Restoration to Denmark of North Slesvig*, which also included some very rare material.

The annual RDP Ceremony followed these presentations. This was held at the Grand Hotel in Stockholm. The ABPS Congress Medal for 2019 was presented at this ceremony to Gerald Marriner FRPSL. He was nominated by the Channel Islands Specialists' Society.

Next year the ABPS Congress will be at Market Harborough and will be separated from the RDP Ceremony which will be held at London 2020. *Gerald Marriner*

How Did It All Start? - A volunteer comes forward

I have given displays across the South-East and South-West, East Anglia and the Midlands for many years on *The British and Foreign Post Offices in China* up to 200 sheets and similarly of *British Borneo* comprising Brunei, Labuan, North Borneo and Sarawak. Also, I have more recently written up collections of my *Queen Astrid of the Belgians, Nurse Edith Cavell, Fernando Po* and *Jeremie* (Haiti) to give various combinations of these four for a whole evening's display.

Like most of us I had started as a small child, given it up until I went off to boarding school at age 13 and then started collecting more thoroughly anything that took my fancy. In the late 1960s I was a struggling clerk at Westminster Bank in Banbury. Our new Branch Accountant was having to finance another divorce, so I bought his collection of Hong Kong and British Borneo. Whilst marriage and an expensive move to London curtailed my activities, divorce gave me more time to concentrate and, joining various specialist societies (SSS, HKSC & MSG), I expanded and specialised until now.

Why Queen Astrid? Most of us had in our collections the black bordered stamps issued in mourning for her, and I read a history of Belgium since Independence in 1830 which further piqued my interest in the beautiful "Snow Queen" who died tragically so young. Around then I was offered a block of nine of these mourning stamps with the unlisted (by SG) curl on forehead error on the centre stamp, and this prompted further collecting, especially of postcards and paper ephemera.

Again, I had read a book about Nurse Edith Cavell that prompted me to start buying related postcards to such an extent that I twice went to Norwich with my collection, first for the bi-annual exhibition at her home village of Swardeston, and in 2015 for the magnificent memorial exhibitions at various venues in Norwich itself on the centenary of her execution by the Germans in Brussels. I have been lucky enough to acquire some quite rare items via eBay, etc.

I always liked the name of Fernando Po, and I found that my second wife had lived there for 7 years in the 1950s when her father worked for the British Consulate. Having found a few nice items eg a British Bank of West Africa lost draft Indemnity, I started acquiring postcards, postal history and paper ephemera from that island, a centre of the British anti-slave trade.

Finally, Jeremie - the only place in the world named after me (but spelt with an "ie" rather than a "y"). "The town of Poets" from where the father of the noted French writer Alexandre Dumas came - his grandmother was a slave and you can see the Creole blood in his photos. The town has also suffered from multiple disasters, hurricanes, earthquakes and so on, culminating in its complete destruction in 2016 just as it was rising again after the 2010 earthquake and this in one of the poorest nations on the planet and the poorest in the Americas. Again this collection comprises postal history, postcards and paper ephemera.

Oh dear, put me in front of a keyboard and I get verbal you-know-what!

Some Responses to Mervyn Benford on p 52/3 of the Spring issue

Royal Mail's distribution business is heavily automated. There is no latitude for dealing with mail as the Danish PO does, although that is something that we in the trade have suggested. I have also suggested that they adopt the Mailer's Postmark Permit system that the USPS has (see www.virtualstampclub.com/lawrence1.html and pe.usps.com/archive/html/dmmarchive20030810/P023.htm

Both my suggestion and Mervyn's would require the posted items to be handled separately (pouched) at the point of posting so that they are not entered into the mechanised mail system, much like franked mail is put into the system at a different point.

You cannot on the one hand complain that mail is not properly cancelled (para 2), and then say in para 3 "worse were ... large rectangular parcel postmarks". One, they haven't been used for years; two, they were following absolutely the correct procedure and these were applied <u>at the post office counter</u>.

Collectors do not "generate huge sums" - the amount that collectors contribute to the Royal Mail bottom line is very little in terms of their overall operating costs. If they were to <u>stop producing stamps altogether</u> there would be very little impact on the bottom line. They continue to do so because they are expected to by the public and the government.

The cover from the Magyar Society of Great Britain has a stamp which is nothing to do with that (only 20-year-old) society, nor was it posted in 1984 as the stamp was not issued until 1987 and 22p was not the 1st class rate until September 1990 - so philatelic, yes, desirable? It's not used in period so of no value as a collectable item. It's just discount postage. Green ink was used in most postmarking machines in 1992 coinciding with the issue of the Environment stamps (SG1629) so we can't even work out why the stamp was used because it is overpaying the 2nd class rate and underpaying the 1st class rate. And it is nothing to do with Meter slogans.

The last paragraph is interesting. The 2nd class large letter second step rate was £1.10 in 2013 - which is what is actually on the packet. At that time, and still today, Post Offices are required to cancel at the counter stamps on Large Letters and Parcels (but not ordinary letters*). So the fault lies not with Royal Mail but somebody at a post office counter, unless the item was just dropped in a letter box, in which case blame the sender for not going that extra mile. That said, if the Post Office did not cancel the stamps, Royal Mail have little option. Some mail centres have packet stamps which would undoubtedly not find favour; branch delivery offices do not. The (RM) people in my village delivery office have no way to cancel stamps apart from pens, and tend not to. I know of one branch in Glasgow where staff have refused to cancel special delivery mail against all logic and instructions.

Where Royal Mail <u>can</u> be criticised is that they have <u>no system</u> at mail centres for cancelling stamps on packets collected from mail boxes, <u>nor those collected</u> <u>from companies</u>, which includes the attractively stamped auction lots sent out by major auction houses. This mail doesn't go to POs, so cannot be 'cancelled at the counter', so RM should have an alternative system. But mail centres are under pressure to speed throughput and so shift the problem further down the mailchain, to delivery offices where staff are under pressure to get mail delivered or out to local DOs attached to post offices. *Ian Billings*

* I mentioned that Post Offices are not required to cancel ordinary letters; but they are not <u>prohibited</u> from doing so. While some will refuse a request, with a variety of foolish excuses, many will comply - all the staff at my local Crown PO happily cancel everything I send to customers. Sometimes small letters also get a machine cancel, but that is better than nothing. *Examples below*

Bexley

In a last-minute change of programme, outgoing BPS president John Corderoy stepped in to display East Germany from 1945. Its stamps were characterised by the lack of religious imagery, and also of New Years' celebrations. More prominent themes were the Communist party and fairy tales. For the second time, Club stalwart Don Brookfield was awarded the Kent Federation Lingley Shield, in April. Grace Davies offered a vibrant presentation about The Nobel Peace Prize, showing philatelic and nonphilatelic historical material about the awards and awardees. The eccentric Swedish inventor of dynamite died in 1896, establishing the prizes in his will. The first prizes were awarded in 1901. Grace documented how the focus of the prize evolved from pacifism to international stability and peace promotion eq poverty eradication. In early July, former club president Frank **Parsons** showed a detailed *Pre-stamp* Postal History Collection centred around Brighton and Hove, explaining the evolution of hand cancels in the

early period. One piece from 1796 was shown to have left London at 8pm by the night coach, arriving at the coast about 6:15 the next morning, having travelled tens of miles over dark country roads. The second half went into the details of the stamp years, as well as non-stamp material such as an 1838 inspection certificate of a 'headed flyer' – a converted sedan chair with harness for horse – and cigarette tax discounts for OAPs, used up until they were withdrawn in August 1958.

John Jordan gave us a great display on *Antigua* starting with a short history of the Island followed by a chronological order of the Postal History and stamps produced by Antigua from 1763-1967. Between October 1890 and July 1956 Leeward Islands stamps were used in Antigua. From 1903 to 1956 there were also Antigua stamps. Early postal history items of Antigua are hard to find compared with stamps. John showed us a rare postmark of St Stephens (only 6 are known) and the only cover known with a "Swetes" postmark, along

with some forgeries. The first postmark was in 1890. The first air mail was in 1929 when Charles Lindbergh visited the island. Hugh's extensive collection had its origins in Falkland Islands philately in the 1980s, with developments into South Georgia material emerging ten years later. The display included studies of stamp issues, printing and varieties, cancellations and censor markings. airmails, registered and insured mail.



'This is not a subject many know.' is how **Patrick Maselis RDP FRPSL** introduced the display of *Postal Stamps and Postal History of Liberia from 1820 to 1920* by **Bryant E Korn**. The display began with letters sent

before the introduction of stamps in 1860. The first stamp's design depicted Seated Liberty. In 1868 the Liberian Treasury was robbed, including stamps, so the use of stamps was forbidden until mid-1880, mail being sent stampless, except for three known covers, two Official and one Paquebot. The next meeting marked the end of an era: the final meeting held at 41 Devonshire Place. It provided an impressive display by Georg Størmer FRPSL of The First Three issues of Norway, from 1855 to 1868. There were superb covers demonstrating the usage of the stamps. The events

surrounding The Mesopotamia Campaign at the start of WWI, and the subsequent issue of overprinted stamps, was told in May by Freddy Khalastchy FRPSL. A guite extraordinary array of letters tracing the different *Postmarks and* Rates found on Letters of the Grand *Armée* were shown at a presentation by Paolo Bianchi RDP FRPSL in June. This provided an insight into the experiences of the soldiers who fought in Napoleon's Grande Armée during the Russian Campaign in 1812, and in the Second Grande Armée of 1812 to 1813 Richard West

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
