FROM THE CHAIRMAN:

I must begin with many congratulations: Firstly, to the PTS team at Stampex; Suzanne Rae, Megan Tester and Isobel Klempka, three delightful young ladies who are full of ideas and always open to suggestions for improving our flag-ship UK exhibitions. This time, PTSinspired talks/ discussions, interviews and tours through the exhibits were amongst the innovations. Secondly, on Stampex Thursday, the new Royal Philatelic Society opened its doors for the first time at 15 Abchurch Lane

in the City of London. A triumph over many adversities, thanks in no little measure to the tenacity, perseverance, and I suspect sheer "bloodymindedness" of Chris King, the well-chosen leader of the move from the old home in Devonshire Place. Of course thanks are due also to many others, notably Past and Future Presidents and Council members who have done an outstanding job for what is, after all, the ABPS's Senior Society. Many enjoyed the Australian States Displays from Her Majesty the Queen's collection, put together by Ian Greig and Ralf Vousden; many congratulations to all of them for all their efforts.

Of course, the second display at the new Royal on September 26th was an event particularly close to my own heart - a display by the North Region. I was really looking forward to this but unfortunately was unable to attend as I was unwell. However, all the reports that I have heard suggest that it was both very well attended and very well received. Congratulations must go to Northern Regional Representatives, Yvonne Wheatley FRPSL who coordinated the exhibits, and Barry Burns FRPSL who produced the booklet.

Returning to ABPS matters, we wish Bill Hedley success. He has been nominated by ABPS to be President of FEPA the European body in charge of organised philately throughout the continent. If successful this will be a great honour for him personally, and also for ABPS, whose voice will be heard all the more clearly on the European Stage. Bill will be replaced as Chairman of the Exhibitions and International Committee by Simon Richards, the Treasurer of the Royal, and an experienced exhibitor and juror. Having known Simon for a number of years I am sure that he will do an excellent job in this role.

So what next? Great Britain will play an important role at the major Postal History event at Sindelfingen in Germany. The British delegation is led by the irrepressible Alan Holyoake RDP, so it will be lively! I was meaning to attend this event in 2019, as it is one of, if not the main, Postal History Show in Europe and I have never been. However, the Scottish Federation wanted *Golf* at their biennial Dundee Weekend, and the dates clashed, so Sindelfingen will have to wait another year! Finally, I hope all societies now have a "Stamp Day" meeting in May, as close to the 6th May as possible.... If not please try again next year.

It is always sad to record these closures in our amendments page, but even sadder to record that some societies have withdrawn from ABPS affiliation. ABPS needs your support as it represents you all on the international scene at European and Worldwide levels. If we have no National Association we lose our voice in the broader world of philately. We also will lose all prospect of FEPA* and FIP** support for the international events like London 2020. We are one of the leading philatelic nations in the world and ABPS is absolutely essential to that. It always astonishes me that individuals object to paying realistic amounts for society subscriptions, federation and national affiliation fees but will happily pay substantial sums for items in auctions. Golfers will pay hundreds of pounds for the right to play on their home course (weather permitting) and have the use of the club house - we seem to think that 50p to £1.50 for a fortnightly or even monthly meeting is all that our hobby is worth. Strange - perhaps this is a topic for each and every AGM throughout the land. Not what can we get out of our societies and associations but what can we put in. If you cannot persuade your society to affiliate to Federation or ABPS why not become a personal supporter, Friend or Patron?

More positively we have had Stampex in September and personally I had a very good time. I didn't spend as much as usual but I did find a few items and a lot of friends - some old, some new. After that I went to my first specialist society weekend with the Germany & Colonies Philatelic Society in Coventry. I went with some apprehension as to the suitability of my *Baden* material. Those present were very welcoming and gave me some useful pointers to further information. The variety of material on display exceeded my wildest expectations. I now understand why specialist society weekends are so well reported. Whether anyone else will provide a report I don't know but I am happy to say that I found the whole experience very enjoyable. A positive AGM lasting only 30 minutes, a very useful bourse and a quick, efficient and lucrative auction - can't be bad.

France & Colonies PS - Our 70th Anniversary

The Society was launched in the early 1940s as the 'France & Colonies Stamp Club' by a stamp dealer called Thomas South Mack, initially as a commercial venture for his stamp business which also provided a newsletter, a new issue service and an exchange packet. After his death in 1948 the club was relaunched at its AGM on 21st May 1949 as the 'France and Colonies Philatelic Society of Great Britain' offering extra services such as regional meetings, auctions and an expertisation committee. It is from this date that we calculate our anniversaries and hence the 70th anniversary this year. The achievement was celebrated at our annual weekend in March at Charlecote in Warwickshire. Mick Bister related the founding of the Society to the attendees after which

glasses (of champagne of course) were raised to honour the 1949 committee and to toast the future of the Society. In the following month we published a special edition of our Journal featuring an illustrated article *From Stamp Club to Philatelic Society* relating our history. Although we no longer have any founder members, our two longest serving ones were invited to contribute. **George Nash** (Member N°30) reminisced about the Society in the 1950s and **Bill Mitchell** (Member N°50) wrote on the issues of Mauritania. With the Anniversary edition of the Journal members received a facsimile of the first F&PCS Newsletter dated June/July 1949. This was a surprise to everybody as the original copy had only recently surfaced in the archives of a late member. The cherry on the anniversary cake was a review of the special edition of the Journal in the May edition of the French philatelic magazine *Écho de la Timbrologie. Mick Bister*

The Netherlands Philatelic Circle – 70 years

The Circle brings together people interested in Dutch philately, with members in the UK, the Netherlands and further afield. We study the philately not only of the Netherlands, but of her former colonies (Netherlands East Indies, Netherlands New Guinea, Netherlands Antilles and Suriname) and Indonesia. It was formed in 1949 by the expansion of the Netherlands Study Circle, a group of enthusiasts mainly based in Glasgow, to include members drawn from the rest of the UK and overseas.

We publish ongoing information on the stamps and postal history of the above territories, providing a forum for members to exchange specialist knowledge, and opportunities for them to add to their collections by buying material from packets and auctions. Members can borrow items from our library of more than 400 books, journals, monographs and articles. They receive three copies of *The Netherlands Philatelist* annually. It was first published in 1949, containing articles based on the research of members and translations of articles published in Dutch. A Newsletter, also published three times per year, includes details of new issues and special cancellations, notes of relevant articles published elsewhere, forthcoming events and a members' Q&A, which offers expert answers to queries. We hold an annual weekend Congress at a hotel in the UK, which includes talks, displays, an auction, a bourse, a group dinner and a separate non -philatelic programme for partners and guests. We also meet informally at Exhibitions.

Gibraltar Study Circle will be celebrating 50 years in May 2020. They visited Gibraltar in October as part of the Royal 150th Anniversary celebrations.

London 2020 oversubscribed

London 2020, the international stamp exhibition to be held at the Business Design Centre in London's Islington from 2nd to 9th May next year, is substantially oversubscribed. So many collectors wanted to exhibit at the event, that an allocation of the



frames available has had to be made. Equally, all the stands have been sold, and there is a waiting list.

The exhibits will be shown in two sections. The first half (Saturday 2nd May to Tuesday 5th May) will include Postal History, Revenue, Open, Picture Postcards, Postal Stationery, Modern and part of Youth. The second half (Wednesday 6th May to Saturday 9th May) will have Championship, Traditional, Aerophilately, Thematic and the rest of Youth. One Frame exhibits will be shown alongside their parent class.

Applications for the Literature and Digital Literature classes can still be made, until 31st December 2019, through National Commissioners in the usual way. For those wishing to book a hotel in London during the exhibition, please use the hotel booking facility on the website *www.london2020.co/hotels*.

Philatelists from all over the world are being invited to be patrons of the exhibition to support it financially. Details can be found at *www.london2020.co/supporters*, but a major new benefit for patrons is a preferential rate on bookings at a nearby hotel. it into 50 smaller units, advertised it in Stamp Magazine "Classifieds", and waited for the orders to roll in... I'm still waiting, 48 years later !....

2 Three years later, attending my first public stamp auctions I wondered how some bidders seemed to buy everything, paying the highest price? It didn't occur to me that they were probably Auction Bidding Agents, paid by absent (dealer) bidders to represent them. I wondered why two collectors sitting side by side muttered to each other "he's a dealer" as if that justified him paying the highest price...

...but did it really? What was the real reason? How could a Dealer pay a higher price than a Collector? It doesn't make sense, does it? Collectors are customers. Customers usually pay the highest price, unless... for a Collector, this was...

Wrong Presentation Wrong Place X therefore Wrong Price X

3 Fast-forward 48 years later to a British Empire collection, lot #1 in an International Stamp Auction – Estimated at \$3,000, but we were the highest bidder at \$21,000 – YES – some 78/higher. Including Buyer's Premium in the extraordinary sum of \$4,788 we achtally paid GBP\$25,788– upon a \$3,000 estimate. however, we broke it down into sets, singles, mini-collections etc. We made a profit. Understanding the problem... 1 always re-

member the car trade had their own little 'bible' - Glass's Guide, I've no idea, I've not even looked - in this internet-dominated world, it may even have disappeared. Well, there's an insider Stamp Trade publication for Stamp Dealers called "The Philatelic Exporter". There's nothing that special about it - and you won't learn much or find massively reduced prices by subscribing - BUT - it is a forum, a paper focal point, a last bastion' in this on-line transparent world that we inhabit__ whereby dealers (and auctioneers) can try and comnumicate with each other. I publish my own articles there...

Recently I discussed the outcome of my 10 years' simple research, asking dealers and anctioneers 'what is your biggest problem?'

To a man, (why are we almost all men), they replied – "my biggest problem is stock, if I can get more of the right stock I can sell it easily"

Strange that, nobody ever asked me the same question back – bemises my answer would have been entirely different (and 1 don't treat it as a problem) – I seek to satisfy collectors

This is the reason why my company has such massive advertising. This is the reason why we spend up to 8% of larmover – up to \$220,000 per annum in marketing costs. (Most dealers don't even sell \$200K per annum).



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5 Why is that? Because, as the world revolved the Stamp Market, imperceptibly *Changed*, and incrementally – Massively

So, although few will tell you this, it's clearly evident that the problem for most Sellers of Stamps today is no longer absent stock - but absent collectors in the place they choose to sell their stamps in. Simply put, other Dealers, Auctions, Stamp Fairs have not invested in marketing to have a strong Customer-core. To be fair, this is not true of all - but it is true of most - so that our nearest competitor 'Apex' had 800 bidders in a recent auction. In my most recent 20,000+ lot UPA 68th Auction we had 2.184 different bidders from 58 different countries, 95% of whom were Collectors. Some other welladvertised auctions only have 200 bidders (a high percentage of whom are dealers - so that, essentially they are Dealer dominated auctions) - so that when you sell through them you're paying up to 18% (including VAT) seller's commission and the buyer is paying up to 25% and more in Buyer's Premium, credit card fees, on-line bidding fee, delivery and insurance etc... AND all of that so that your stamps may be sold. wait for it - TO DEALERS (and some collectors), but Dealers, that naturally must make a profit to survive

Now, let's examine the cost implications Example: Your stamp collection sells in public auction for \$\$00. Upon a 25% buyer's premium, the dealer pays \$1,000 and it could be more. He breaks it into \$2,000+ selling price (much lower and he'll go out of business). The auction charges you a seller's commission of up to 18% (VAT included) upon the \$800 sale price. This is GBP\$144. Therefore you receive approaching \$656 - which is approximately 33% of the dealer's \$2,000+/- retail selling price - BUT ... now that we have identified the problem

Why Pay an Auction to Sell to Dealers: <u>Sell</u> to Collectors instead ?In our example with buyer's premium, sellers commission, lotting fees, extra credit card charges, VAT and even insurance - you're already being charged in different ways up to 40% of the selling price to sell, possibly or probably, to the wrong person. 

A Blue Plaque commemorating FRANK BELLAMY (1863–1936), astronomer and philatelist, and his niece ETHEL BELLAMY (1881– 1960), seismologist and astronomer, was unveiled at 2 Winchester Road, Oxford, OX2 6NA, on Tuesday 8th October.

Frank was born in Oxford, the son of a bookbinder, and educated at Magdalen College School. In 1881 he became an assistant at the University Observatory and was set to work on the Astrographic Catalogue, an ambitious international project to map all the stars, shared out between eighteen observatories around the world. His assignment was to take photographic plates, measure and

reduce thousands of star images and prepare them for publication. The initial work took ten years and he then undertook work for other zones such as those of the Vatican, Hyderabad and Potsdam observatories. Over 46 years he photographed and catalogued over a million stars. In this he was more than ably assisted by his niece Ethel recruited for the work when she was only seventeen. Both were later made honorary Oxford MAs and Fellows of the Royal Astronomical Society. He resigned from the Observatory in 1936 after a strong disagreement about future directions with the new Savilian Professor, H. H. Plasket. Frank died only two weeks later and is buried in St Sepulchre's Cemetery, Jericho, Oxford.

He is also an esteemed figure in philatelic circles and founded the Oxford Philatelic Society in 1890, serving as secretary and treasurer until his death. He was made a Fellow of the Royal Philatelic Society. His stamp collection, started when he was five years old, comprised over 200 000 items and was nationally famous. College Messenger stamps from Oxford and Cambridge were an unusual feature, some now held in the Bodleian collections. The Oxford Philatelic Society made the proposal for this Blue Plaque, recognising his truly remarkable contribution to the intellectual and cultural life of the city in so many areas. He collaborated on initiatives in field botany and meteorology, was a pillar of the Oxfordshire (now Ashmolean) Natural History Society, and a founder member of the Oxford Photographic Society. His images of Oxford are valued holdings in the city archive. He was also Vice President of the Oxfordshire Cricket Association.

His niece Ethel Bellamy not only collaborated on the astrographic work but branched out into a new pioneering field, that of seismology. In 1918 she was

recruited by Professor Turner to operate the seismograph and collate data from 600 stations, all the time working in an unheated hut. She prepared the results for the International Seismological Summary and became editor after Turner's death. During WWII she computed the epicentres herself and was the mainstay of operations during that time. She retired in 1947 when seismology was discontinued at the University Observatory and transferred to Kew. She and her sister Edith, an invalid, had shared a home with their uncle Frank and continued to live at 2 Winchester Road until 1949. She died in a nursing home in Weymouth in 1960. Ethel Bellamy is a striking early example of a woman doing important scientific work in the man's world of that time.

The speakers at the unveiling were Mr Bill Jackson, Past President of the Oxford Philatelic Society, and Professor Karin Sigloch of Oxford University's Department of Earth Sciences. Approximately 30 members of the Oxford Philatelic Society and members of the public attended the unveiling, later retiring to a local pub for a light lunch. Simon Heap

Robert was instrumental in setting up the Trust on behalf of his friend Stuart Rossiter and served as a trustee from its inception in 1985 until 2003.

Robert brought his considerable skills, knowledge and generosity of spirit to everything he did and the Trust was no exception.

Italy and Colonies PS also noted Robert's death. They were on their visit to Naples and remembered him as he used to join them on their visits before his illness.





In September the Postal Museum had Royal Mail Post & Go stamps marking the centenary of several Airmail "firsts" in 1919 – the RAF flights to Cologne, the first flight across the

Atlantic, the first flight to Paris and the pioneer flight to Australia. All were available from its Post & Go machine from 11th September. The stamps featuring the Mail by Air theme, first issued in 2017, replaced the Union Flag design with the 'The Postal Museum/ Airmail 1919' overprint.

In addition to Post & Go stamps, a First Day Cover and a Presentation Pack containing a collector's strip of six 1st class Mail by Air designs are available to purchase from the museum's shop and online until further notice.

The Museum opened its new additional Post & Go machine in the Mail Rail exhibition on Tuesday 29th October. The machine will vend two designs - The Post Office Underground Railway and 1st class Machin, both with a new overprint "Mail Rail" of all values.

The original kiosk in The Postal Museum will remain operational as usual. A first day cover was also available to purchase in the museum shop or online. The Post & Go machines are available at The Postal Museum during normal opening hours. Please see *www.postalmuseum.org* for more information.

From October 2019 to April 2020 the Museum has a temporary exhibition entitled *The Great Train Robbery: Crime and the Post.* This is an event that many of us will remember from August 1963.

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Cambridge

In September President John George put on a very interesting display of GB Queen Elizabeth II pre-decimal commemoratives. The sheets covered the complete range of mint commemoratives spanning a period of almost twenty years. As well as the mint single stamps there were many examples of control blocks, and traffic light blocks. Also he diplayed positional blocks of many of the listed varieties. Within the display there were also postally used commemoratives on cover. The last frame also included some of the pre-decimal Machin stamps. In October we welcomed **Mick Bister** from the France and Colonies Philatelic Society. His display covered French Somali Coast. He started with a detailed history of the introduction of the post in Obock in late 1884 through to the increasing importance of Djibouti from 1893 with the used stamps of the period, including overprints. Photographs, postcards and covers were also on display. New stamps were issued in 1896 available in each area which also included proofs from local printers. We also saw bisects with some on cover, and examples of the second printings. There were many pre-WWI stamps by the French government printers. As WWII developed more examples of mail both in and out were displayed. The post-war era saw many rate changes and more use of local printers. By 1977 the country had disengaged from France and became the Republic of

At the start of our first meeting we observed a minute's silence in memory of Richard Barrett, who was one of our long-standing and regular attending members. Then Paul Green showed his aptly named More from the Green Collection. She included stamps, letters, telegrams and postcards that were produced and sent worldwide for a number of years from the two post offices at either end of the bridge. Patrick Reid brought Postage Due marks for New South Wales covering the period 1891 to 1965. He displayed numerous examples of

There were 371 Zemstvo districts in European Russia, 164 of which issued postal stationery or Post Office stationery. On show was an A to Z of these fascinating issues as stamps, blocks and used on cover from these local areas, some with combinations of Zemstvos from different areas and also with Imperial Postage stamps. Covers to and from foreign countries, bearing Zemstvos were also shown.

There were numerous covers and correspondence linked to key players (Churchill) and events (River Plate). Rod underlined the importance of official slogans, such as 'Idle Gossip Sinks Ships'. Many covers were very difficult to source, the rarest being items of submarine mail. A particular feature of censor marks was the 'homespun' variety, created by individual ships lacking supplies of official equipment. There were exceptions where 'good news' was imparted, having a tonic or propaganda value. Rod spoke of the main ports of

Edinburgh, London and Portsmouth which processed censored mail.

Mike noted that the company was the world's largest by tonnage in 1870. Chile, Panama, Peru and North America. These routes were of strategic importance particularly prior to the opening of the Panama Canal in 1914. The display contained stamps, documents of social importance and postal history. For the second September display we welcomed Alwyn Peel with his entertaining 250th Anniversary of Captain Cook's Endeavour Voyage - the first of his three voyages. In October we

Kong to Europe by this route. He also covered the effects of the 1910-11 Plague in the Harbin region. It is not often that the word 'Philatelist' appears on a Blue Plaque attached to a building marking the home of a celebrated figure. A special event occurred on 8th October with the unveiling of a Blue Plaque to Frank Arthur Bellamy, our founding Secretary and Treasurer, and his niece, Ethel, whose career was also worthy of note. *Dr Simon Heap*

Petersfield and District

Two visitors from Thatcham & District PS undertook a long journey to entertain us at the July meeting. Martin Farr opened by saying that after many years of collecting Commonwealth stamps he decided to make a change and chose China as his subject. His display was primarily of Stories, Scrolls and Legends of Old China much of it consisting of series of coloured pictures of episodes of stories, not unlike the kind of strip cartoons that are more familiar to us. Most of the subjects were fantasies bearing such titles as Romances of Three Kingdoms, 24 Paragons of Filial Piety, and Dreams of Red Mansions. He was followed by Graeme Stewart's show of Letter Boxes, consisting almost entirely of photographs in chronological order. Anthony Trollope, a Post Office inspector in Ireland and later in East Anglia, was instrumental in promoting a post box for Guernsey (1853). The first on the mainland was at Carlisle later that year. Numerous changes of design have since occurred: the slot was changed from vertical to horizontal to keep rain out. green gave way to red (and later to blue on air mail boxes), the door height was raised to avoid jamming, the Royal

cipher was introduced and the '2' of 'E2R' omitted in Scotland when E2R boxes began to be blown up, and oval double-aperture boxes were introduced in busy locations. A comprehensive display of *Waterfalls of the World* was given in August by a well-known visitor **Jean Alexander**. David Allen

Poole and Bournemouth

One of our topics was Flora and Fauna, which spans a vast range of interpretations, many of them utilised by members giving their one frame displays. Tony Arnold began by showing mainly GB FDCs, but also included some stamp club badges featuring "stamp bugs". This was overprint heaven, as stamps of Vichy France, Hitler's 'greater' Germany and its vassal states, and Mussolini's Socialist Republic continued to be used in a gleeful riot of celebratory overprinting ranging from the inked thumb, through cork or rubber obliterations, the use of national symbols such as the cross of Lorraine or pre-war coats of arms or the 'Red' star, to the more formal typeset commemorations of a new state. Forgeries abound, since quantities of such issues were

generally small, and in some cases it is not even clear if the issue genuinely happened for postal purposes. The Great Britain Philatelic

We started our new philatelic year during Stampex in September when a good-sized audience gathered to see displays presented by **Tony Walker** FRPSL and Max Melrose. Tony began proceedings with his display The Royal Navy Air Service Armoured Car Division in Russia in WWI. He explained that it was the Royal Navy's use of aircraft which, surprisingly, brought about the formation of squadrons of land-based armoured cars. He concentrated on three of the squadrons which took part in the war in Russia, supporting his philatelic material with fascinating ephemera. Max introduced us to RAF Airmail APO S40 Cologne & 1919 Railway Strike Airmail. We were told of the combination of the RNAS and RFC to form the RAF early in 1919 and, with the Allies occupation of the Rhine causing a large increase in mail, bombers being converted to mail carriers for the Army postal service at

APO S40. With demobilisation many former RAF pilots became involved with civilian flying related companies. When the railway strike was called, the civilian companies were called upon to operate an emergency air mail service involving London, Bristol, Birmingham Newcastle and Glasgow. Flights took place over six days. The display included mail from several of the routes and, as Max commented, as many flights as possible. 
